THE FRANCHISE ACT. It is given out in the speech from the throne that measures will be laid before parliament this session for the improvement of the Franchise Act. Those who came to the polls in the county of Kent at the last Dominion election, only to find that their names were not on the voters' list, have probably arrived at the conclasion that the act stands very much iv need of improvement. In the Kingston district, alone, the names of nearly one hundred persons entitled to vote were omitted from the lists. This, we presume, arose from their own neglect. Had they taken the proper steps and made application in the proper manner to have their names added to the lists, it, no doubt, would have been done. Very few men, however, take the trouble to think of these matters until election day, and then it is too late. What is needed is some provision whereby the names of those entitled to vote can be added to the lists without the unnecessary trouble and delay which now attends such a proceeding. Then again it frequently happens that the names of bona fide voters have been placed upon the wrong lists. Cases of this kind gave rise to much difficulty and confusion here in the last election. For instance, one voter who lives in South Branch, and whose name should have been on the list of that polling district, found his name on the South St. Mary list, and was compelled to travel about fifty miles to deposit his ballot. The names of a number of voters in Richibucto were found on the lists of other districts. We do not mean to imply that these mistakes arose through any fault of the revisor. Judge Landry no doubt used all the means at his disposal to furnish correct lists. He is not supposed to know and in fact does not know where every voter in the county lives, and as matters now stand mistakes of this kind are bound to occur. Another improvement could be made in the act by making provision for a revision every year. Young men are continually coming of age and becoming entitled to vote, and they should not be compelled to wait three

The preliminary examination of Mrs. H. T. Stevens on the charge of "feloniously killing and slaying" her adopted child, Mabel Glennie Hallet Stevens, was concluded at Moncton on Saturday and the accused was committed for trial. Bail was fixed at the sum of \$3000, the accused in the sum of \$1000 and two sureties in the sum of \$1000 each. The prominence of the parties interested has given to the case an interest that would not otherwise have been aroused. Reports of the proceedings at the inquest and at the preliminary hearing of the case have been eagerly read in all parts of the province. But, though Mrs. Stevens has been committed for trial, it must not be assumed that there is any very strong presumption that she is guilty of the crime imputed to her. The committing magistrate expressly called attention to the conflicting testimony adduced at the hearing. He, however, concluded that the evidence was strong enough to put the accused on her defence. It is to be regretted that an attempt, has been made to circulate stories regarding Mrs. Stevens, false and calculated to prejudice her in the minds of the public. The charge is a pretty serious one and it is scarcely fair to her, at this time, to attempt to recall every unkind word ever spoken to the child, and to resurrect bits of gossip that have been dead and buried for years. The evidence, if true, would go to show that Mrs. Stevens' treatment of the child was not just what would be expected from a kind and loving mother. Mr. Stevens, however, directly contradicts this testimony, and it would be well for the public to reserve judgement until the matter has been more thoroughly inquired into.

The report of the auditor-general shows that 1716 names were removed from the electoral lists of this county and 376 names added in the revision of 1891.
