A SURVEY OF THE HARBOR.—Mr. McInerney writes us that he has secured from the public works department, the promise of a hydrographic survey of Richibucto harbor next summer with a view to the erection of a southern breakwater which has been so long asked for by the ship-owners of this port.

PASSED HIS EXAMINATION.—We are pleased to learn that Dan Woods, son of Philip Woods, the popular proprietor of the Commercial House, passed a successful examination in telegraphy at Campbellton, last week. Dan has been for the last three months in the employ of the I. C. R. R. at Kent Junction.

THE POTATO TRADE.—Mr. Blake, a Boston potato buyer, was in Moncton on Saturday, on his way to Buctouche to buy potatoes. Mr. O. M. Melanson, of Shediac, shipped two cars from St. Anthony last week. Buyers are also reported doing considerable business in Bathurst, shipping to Montreal and other points in the upper provinces.—Times.

MISS ELLIS MARRIED.—The Charlotte-town Guardian says:—"A quiet wedding took place at the residence of Mr. R. L. Roncke on Thursday evening. Mr. Netus Stanlake and Miss Hannah Ellis were the happy principals at the ceremony which was performed by the Rev. C. F. Lowe." Miss Ellis formerly resided in Richibucto with Mr. and Mrs. K. B. Forbes. Her many friends in this place join in wishing her much happiness.

BUCTOUCHE.—The Methodist Church at Buctouche has lately been provided with four handsome lamps. They give a brilliant light, and are a great improvement.

A few of the young people of the village organized themselves into a party one evening last week, and drove out to the house of Mr. A. Potts, where a very enjoyable evening was spent.

Smelts are very scarce around Buctouche now, and times are very quiet.

DEATH OF MR. JOHN GLENDENNING.—We regret to have to announce the death of Mr. John Glendenning, one of our oldest and most respected citizens, which took place at his home in Galloway last Monday. Mr. Glendenning came to this county from Dumfries, Scotland, when but nine years of age and has resided here ever since. He has been for many years an elder of the Presbyterian church, of Kingston, he leaves a widow and ten children. The remains were buried in the Kingston burying ground Wednesday afternoon. Deceased was 85 years of age.

SUPREME COURT.—The case of George Robertson and John Robertson vs. Oswald Smith, an appeal from the Kent County Court came up for hearing before the Supreme Court at Fredericton last Friday. Mr. Rainsford moved for new trial; Mr. Phinney took the preliminary objection that the appeal had not been entered within the time allowed by the court, and that the terms had not been complied with. Objection sustained and appeal dismissed with costs.

Queen vs. Hugh M. Ferguson and James Stothart. Mr. Rainsford moved for leave to enter cause on the Crown paper. Leave granted.

MR. BARNES MAY REMOVE HIS OYSTERS.—At Mr. McInerney's solicitation an order in council has been passed granting to Mr. James Barnes of Buctouche, permission to take up through the ice about \$1500 worth of oysters, which he had deposited in the river, intending to take them up when the ice formed. Mr. Chapman, Fishery Inspector, refused, however, to grant him permission to do so, on the ground that such a proceeding would be contrary to the fishery regulations. The concession was made only after a full presentation of the case, and is a direct reversal of the decision formerly arrived at by the department.

NEW MILLS.—We have received for publication from Mr. P. McNichol, of New Mills, a letter in answer to "Topsy's" of last week, denying that he is the writer of the correspondence signed "Truth" which appeared in THE REVIEW, and demanding an apology through the public press. We have also received for publication three other communications on the same subject. We have thought it best not to publish the correspondence, as we have been requested by several of our subscribers in that vicinity to refrain from publishing anything more in connection with the matter, as the controversy has given rise to much hard feeling. We regret that we have been the innocent means of disturbing the good feeling existing in the place. In justice to Mr. McNichol, however, we are compelled to publish his denial of the authorship.

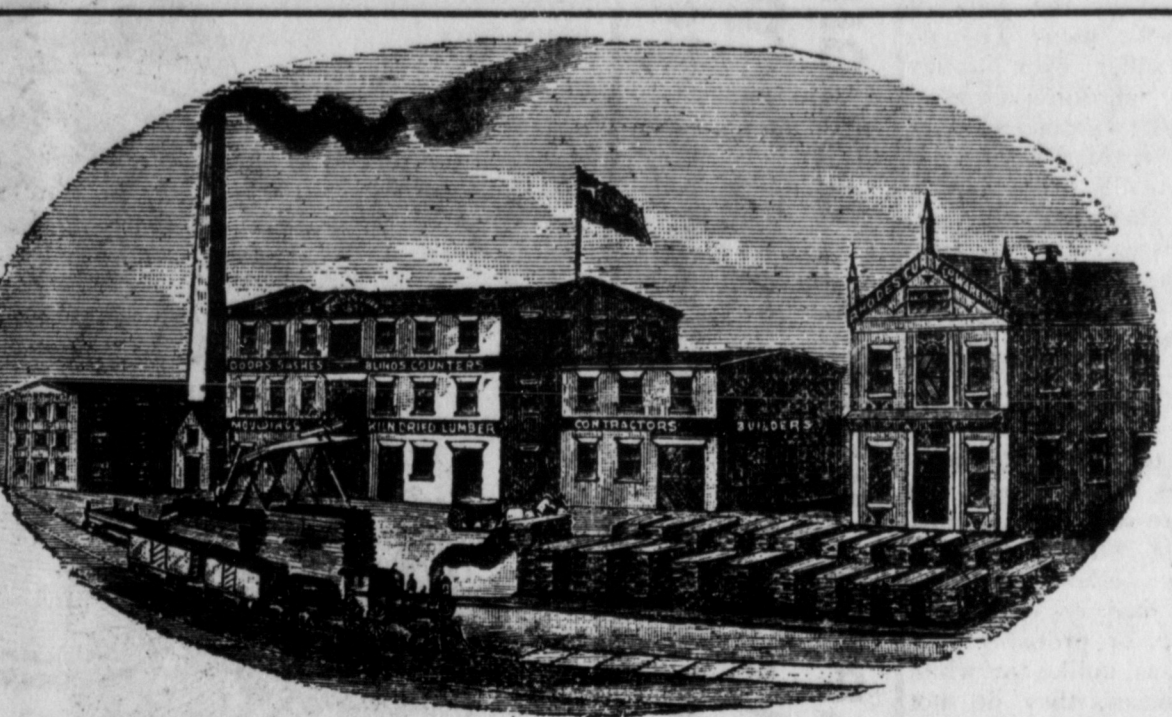

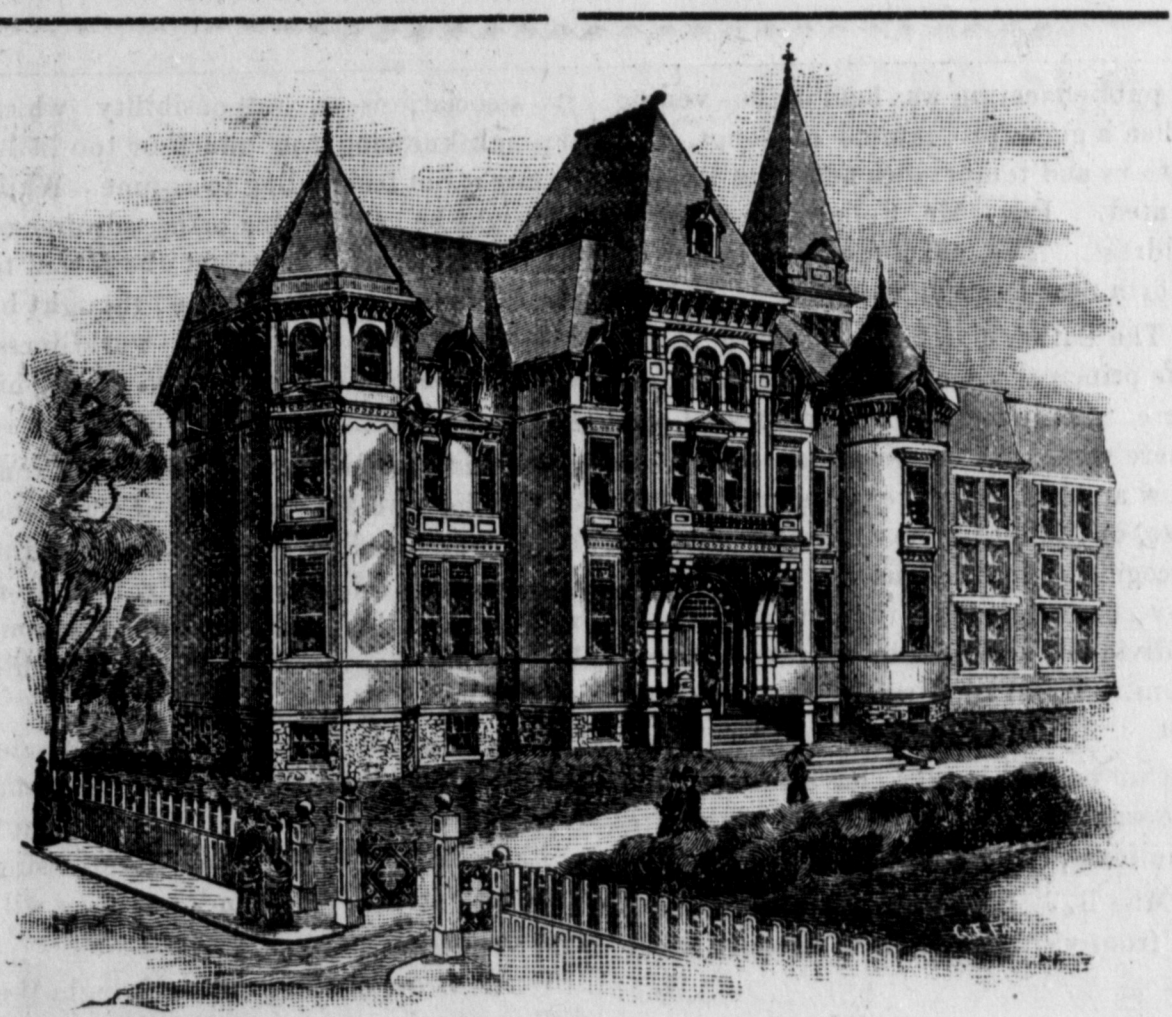
