
SUPREME COURT -The case of George Robertson and John Robertson vs. Oswald Smith, an appeal from the Kent County Court came up for hearing before the Supreme Court at Fredericton last Friday. Mr. Rainsford moved for new trial; Mr. Phinney took the preliminary objection that the appeal had not been entered within the time allowed by the court, and that the terms had not been complied with. Objection sustained and appeal dismissed with costs.

MR. BARNES MAY REMOVE HIS OYSTERS -At Mr. McInerneys-solicitation an order in council has been passed granting to Mr. James Barnes of Buctouche, permission to take up through the ice about \$1500 worth of oysters, which he had deposited in the river, intending to take them up when the ice formed. Mr. Chapman, Fishery Inspector, refused, however, to grant him permission to do so, on the ground that such a proceeding would be contrary to the fishery regulations. The concession was made only after a full presentation of the case, and is a direct re-versal of the decision formerly arrived at by the department.




