

LOCAL NEWS.

SUPREME COURT.—Four Kent County cases came before the Supreme Court at Fredericton last week. Three, the Queen vs. H. M. Ferguson and James Stohart, Placide Richard et al. vs. Wm. Main, and John vs. George Robertson vs. James Brown, stood over until next term. In the case of Clarke and Loüsbury vs. James Johnson, an action of trover for a wagon purchased under a lien note and sold by purchaser, Mr. Phinney supported appeal, Mr. Blair contra. Court considers.

DOGS POISONED.—The dog-fend is abroad again. No fewer than seventeen canines in this town came to an untimely end last week. A large number of cats shared the same fate. A number of dogs poisoned were fine animals, and their owners are making very serious threats as to what will be the fate of the poisoner if he can be caught. Those who are distributing the poison have not shown much concern as to where it was placed, and as a result a number of more useful animals have been poisoned. We would advise the perpetrator, whoever he may be, to be more careful or he may be called upon to answer a far more serious charge than that of dog-poisoning.

A HARDWOOD OPERATION.—Mr. James Brown, of Welford, bought the timber on a hardwood ridge near Harcourt station last winter, moved his rotary mill from Richibucto to the ground, erected camps for men and horses, cut and hauled three hundred thousand feet of birch planks in six weeks, and now has his mill at the railway siding ready to be transported back to Richibucto. He came to Chatham Wednesday afternoon, sold his whole cut to Mr. Neale, and returned with the cash Thursday morning. He made a fair profit on the operation, and gave employment to thirty men who would otherwise have been idle. If the snow had lasted three weeks longer which would have enabled him to cut one hundred and fifty thousand more, Mr. Brown's profit would have been much greater, as there would have been no more expense for stumpage, camp building, road making and mill moving.—Chatham World.

COUNTY COURT.—The April term of the Kent county court opened here last Tuesday, Judge Landry presiding. The jurors in attendance were Clifford Atkinson, Dositheo Richard, Thomas McNeil, Wm. Potts, Peter L. Richard, Benedict Hains, Wm. H. Waman, John P. Bell, David Dightman, Thos. Dunlay, Robert Campbell, Roderick McDonald, Sylvester Maillet, Arch McIntosh, Adam T. Coates, John D. McMinn, Abram Dickinson, Henry Hickey and James H. Powell. There was no civil business before the court. In the queen vs. Alex. Maillet charged with uttering forged documents and receiving money fraudulently, four separate indictments were preferred. The accused pleaded guilty to the charge of receiving money fraudulently and a nolle prosequi was entered as to the other indictments. His Honor in passing sentence declared that the prisoner's previous good character and the mitigating circumstances surrounding the case, induced him to be more lenient than he otherwise would have been. The sentence imposed was two months in the common jail. Court then adjourned sine die.

FISK JUBILEE SINGERS.—The Temperance Hall was comfortably filled last Thursday evening to greet the Fisk Jubilee Singers. Owing to the absence of one of the tenor singers Mr. C. W. Payne, who was called home by the illness of his father the programme advertised was not completely filled. Those who came expecting to hear some good music did not go away disappointed. The voices of the members of the company showed a thorough training and those who are competent to speak on matters of this kind, declare that the blending of the voices was perfect. Mr. J. W. Caldwell who possesses a deep, rich base voice was repeatedly applauded. He gave "Rocked in the Cradle of the Deep," and responded to an encore by singing "Old Black Joe" and others. The chorus "Laugh and grow Fat" elicited much applause. Mrs. Jennie Jackson DeHart the soprano soloist sang "Way down upon de Swanee River," but showed a decided improvement in "When I've nothing else to do" as an encore. The medley, by a quartette was one of the features of the evening. They closed the entertainment by singing "God save the Queen."

TWO MORE KENT COUNTY CASES.—Judgements were given last Monday by the Supreme Court in the following cases: George Robertson and John Robertson, assis. vs. Wm. Wheten, appellants, and Oswald vs. J. B. respondent.—In this case C. A. Palmer, for appellants, moved for rule calling upon respondent to show cause why a rule dismissing the appeal should not be set aside on the ground that at the time said rule was granted the attorney for respondent had not taken out his certificate, J. D. Phinney, contra. Judge Palmer delivered judgement of court refusing the rule, the Chief Justice dissenting.

Lowery.—This was an action for services rendered by a stipendiary magistrate Richardson at Richibucto under the Merchants' Shipping Act. The point was whether there was such evidence of ill-usage on the voyage as would entitle the plaintiff to his discharge, which was necessary under the act before he could recover his wages. The judgement of the court is that there was not. The rule was consequently made absolute for certiorari, G. F. Gregory for plaintiff, J. D. Phinney for defendant.
