A Tale of the Sea.

LOS ANGELES, Cal April 5.—The steamer Los Angeles from San Francisco, arrived at Redondo to-day, having on board Captain William Drummond and three of the crew of the ship King James, previously reported abandoned and on fire about 250 miles off Point Conception, where the first mate and sixteen men landed. The captain and his companions were picked up off Hueneme this morning. Their boat when they left the burning vessel on March 30th, contained sixteen men. The next day the boat capsized and four men were drowned. The captain and his boy and the remainder of the crew climbed upon the keel of the boat and righted her. The boat was full of water. They remained to their waists in water fourteen hours, when eight men, including the captain's son, exhausted and chilled, expired. When picked up the men had been five days without food or water. They were so weak they were unable to stand.


