CAPTURED ON THE WING.

A Man From Buctouche Makes a Futile Attempt to Skip Out.

Some time ago a rumor was current in Buctouche to the effect that a man named Francois Landry intended to make his exit on the quiet to the United States.

A short time ago he conducted a business in the former place and became heavily in debt owing to the firm of W. H. Thorne & Co. of St. John, the sum of \$365.

Immediately upon his intended departure being made known a young man from Shediac was sent to Buctouche to watch him and prevent if possible his leaving the country.

The young man in question arrived in Buctouche Wednesday night and yesterday morning verified the rumors and upon approaching the station beheld his man accompanied by his wife and one child, boarding the train. He immediately telegraphed to Moncton to have an officer meet the train on its arrival here with papers and everything requisite for Landry's arrest.

In the meantime the local detective boarded the same train and during the journey engaged himself in conversation with Landry. Upon their arrival at the B. & M. station here he was somewhat disappointed when he learned that there was no officer. He, however, followed Landry to a certain residence in this city and after placing his man proceeded to an attorney of the town and had papers drawn out for his arrest. Whether or not Landry was suspicious of the young man, was not apparent, for after dinner he purchased a ticket and had his baggage checked for San Francisco, after which, he started about two o'clock and walked to Berry's Mills. Deputy Sheriff Sweeney in the morning received an order from Judge Peters, of St. John, authorizing him to arrest Landry and not grant him any bail.

The sheriff by investigating, ascertained that his man had been seen walking up the north track and he accordingly telegraphed to Berry's Mills and received a reply that a man answering the description was there. The sheriff, accompanied by the other man in question, took the express last night and arrested their man at the latter station, not however without experiencing resistance, kept him in the station all night and brought him back to Moncton on the Quebec express this morning, where after considerable parlying he settled up. He had in his possession bank notes worth \$2000 payable in New York. He took this morning's accommodation north for his destination. An amusing incident occurred before the departure of the train. He had hardly got seated in the car when he was accosted by a well known business man of Moncton to whom he owed a bill as follows: "Are you from Buctouche?" "Yes!" "Do you know a man at that place by the name of Landry?" "Yes, I know D. Landry!" The Monctonian asked him if he knew Frank Landry, to which he replied in the negative after which the train moved out, and the business man jumped off with an expression of disappointment hovering over his features. The latter subsequently received the money from Mrs. Landry. — Transcript.

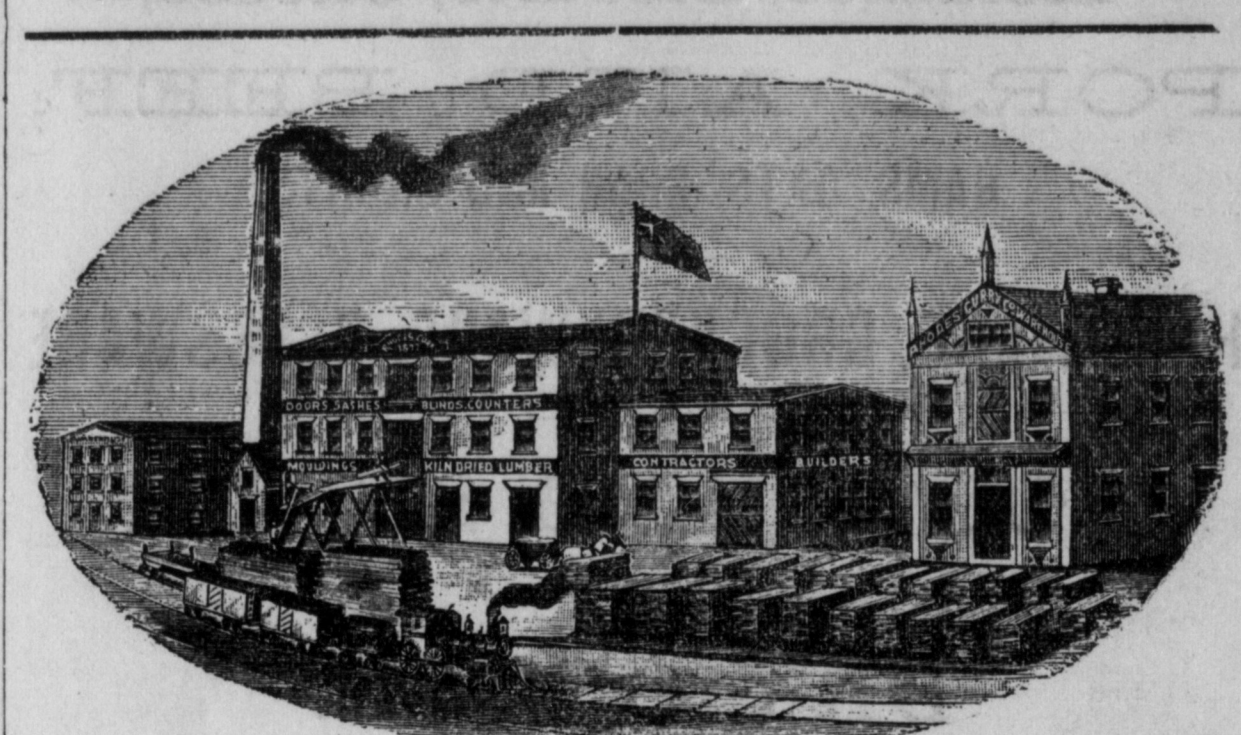

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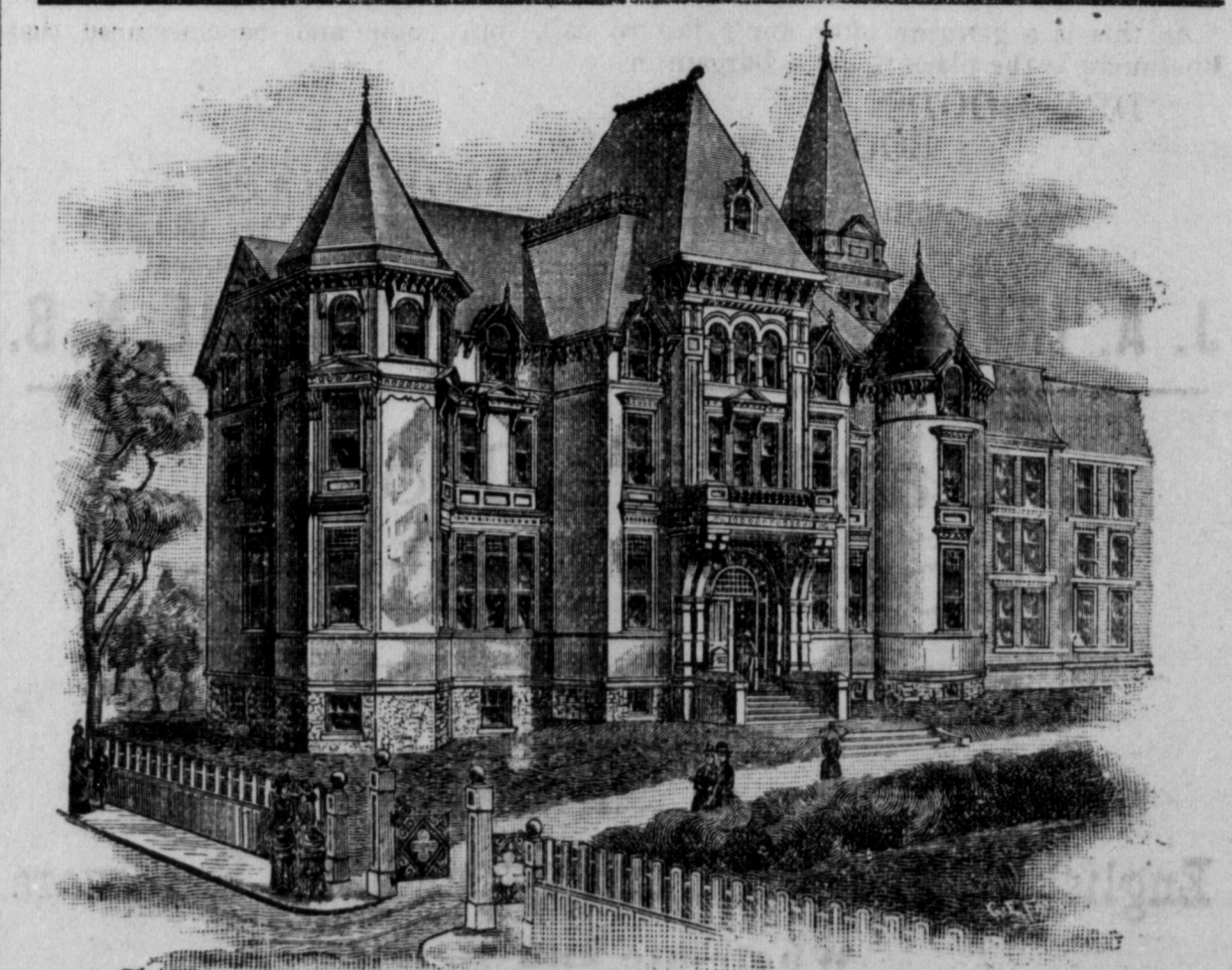
