## Prohibition, Pro, and Con.

I cannot say that I can endorse prohibition pure and simple as at present proposed. Humanity fell through prohibition. Adam was prohibited from eating the fruit in the garden of Eden, but he did so and from that day to this prohibited articles have the greatest charm. Were alcohol entirely prohibited men would more eagerly seek for it.

Opium, morphia, cocaine, chloral, ether, or chloroform, are not prohibited but are carefully guarded in their sale. Any one of these used as lavishly as alcohol would do infinitely more mischief, for their greater cost and more terrible effect make them more dangerous. Prohibition of alcoholic stimulants would lead many to fly to these substitutes, if I may call them so, for such they certainly would become. Again, prohibition would set up a vigorous contraband trade, enrich a few daring lawbreakers, and produce effects not at present anticipated.

Why not adopt the "Gutenberg system" as so often recommended, or some other which would work as well? Guard the sale of alcohol as we do other dangerous drugs; teach "Scientific Temperance" in the schools; use all moral means of shewing forth its baleful effects to the young and gradually I believe the evil would disappear, and alcohol would be relegated to the druggists' shelves. Entire prohibition would be a heroic measure, I admit, but heroic methods produce great shocks and often produce effects which they are intended to avert.

Emancipating the negro by "Proclamation" was a heroic method, but while it freed the negroes it also plunged them into depths of poverty and misery, and in consequence thousands of them died within a few years of their emancipation. So also with alcoholic prohibition. Many men would become mere physical wrecks from its complete and sudden withdrawal, while the greed of gain would entice many more into the dangerous practice of smuggling. Now the aim of all law should be to better the condition of the race; so all avenues leading to danger should be guarded and weak feet kept from falling.

Now I think the "Gutenberg system" would provide the necessary guards, and gradually after a few years, alcoholic appetite would so diminish that a drunkard would be as rare a spectacle as it is a common one to day.

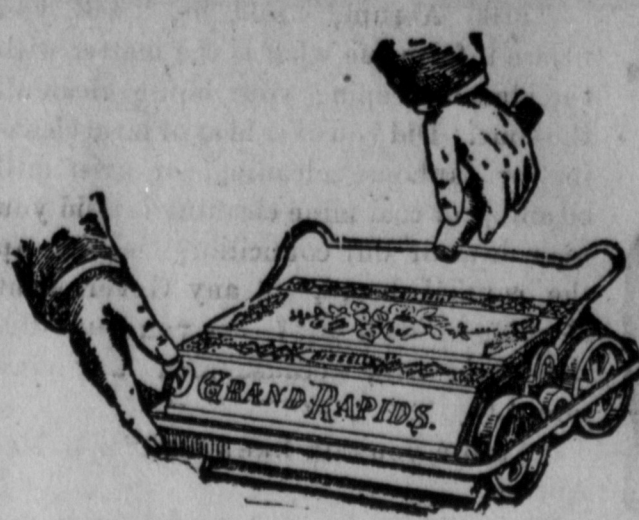

## The Irish Question.

TORONTO, April 6.—Mr. Blake, says a Globe cable, spoke at Glasgow on Tuesday night to a mass meeting in the city hall. In dealing with the political situation generally, he emphasized the fact that the position and prospects of the Liberal party in Parliament had greatly improved since the opening of the session. This, he said, was partly due to the admirable programme presented and partly to the excellent tactics of the government and excusable tactics of the opposition. He declared that in his judgement the future of the Liberal party depended upon its radicalism, the extent to which they put themselves into intelligent sympathy with the vast body of the masses. Regarding Ulster Mr. Blake said the "opponents of Home Rule say, 'Look at Ulster, its patient, resolute, law-abiding people,' and in the same breath declared, 'You are walking upon a volcano. Ulster will explode.'"
