### THE TARIFF.

The Dominion Government has evidently been forced to the conclusion that the country desires a reduction of tariff duties. and is shaping its course accordingly. Hon. Mr. Foster has been appointed to feel the pulse of the people on this question, and as a beginning he has sought the advice of the wholesale importers of Montreal and other large cities. That these gentlemen are competent to give good advice and should be consulted in this matter is admitted, but there is a general demand that the Finance Minister proceed further with his inquiries, and learn the opinion of the consuming classes as well. The Toronto Empire, the leading government organ, advises him to consult all classes, and particularly points out to him the necessity of interviewing representative farmers and laboring men. That there is a very general desire among these classes for a thorough revision of the tariff, appears to be admitted on all sides. The attitude of Dalton McCarthy in the Comsuccess that has attended and is attending are particularly pleased. his movement in favor of tariff reform, have probably opened the eyes of the government to the necessity for a change. The people of Canada were informed that a liberal measure of protection was necessary for a time to build up the infant manu. facturing industries of the Dominion, and that when these were once built up and able to take care of themselves, the tariff would be gradually lowered. In the United States the same excuse was given, and the people accepted it. Instead of lowering the tariff, however, the government of that country continued raising it. until the people would stand it no longer. The sweeping victory gained by the Democrats there, last election, was simply a protest by the people against an unjust and unreasonable measure of protection The tariff of Canada has never been as high as that imposed by the McKinley Bill ; yet there is a strong feeling through. out the country that it is about time some of these protected industries were able to take care of themselves, and that our tariff should be modified to a certain extent. This feeling has no doubt, made itself apparent to the government and the Minister of Finance has been sent out on a pilgrimage of inquiry. He would do well to accept the advice tendered him by the leading organ of his own party, "Consult the farming and laboring classes." That the cholera will visit the United States and Canada this year, is feared by all who have given the matter much attention, and the health authorities o many of our cities and towns are taking active measures to guard against its introduction. The reports of the presence of the disease in many parts of Europe, show that it has not died out and that it only awaits the coming of hot weather to renew its ravages. The history of this epidemic shows that it has never entirely diappeared in one year. On the contrary the second and third years have in every instance proved to be the most disastrous. The World's Fair too, and the crowds that will wisit this side of the Atlantic from the cholera-infested countries of Europe, will make it more difficult for the health authorities to carry out a rigid system of quarantine inspection. Whether or not, we are in much danger here, should not prevent us from taking every precaution to guard against the introduction of the disease Now, that shipping has begun, we may expect vessels from the principal and Kingston at 3 o'clock. Latest statistics concerning this system of dealing with the liquor traffic show that the city of Christiania, with 160,000 inhabitants, has now only twenty-seven cafe-restaurants, shops, etc., retailing liquor ; Stockholm, with 260,000 inhabitants, 143 such places ; Gothenburg, with 106,000 has 40. Under our system the County of Kent with a population of less than 25,000, has twenty licensed bars. The city of St. John with about 40,000, has 100

licensed saloons.
