

**LOCAL NEWS.**

**STRANDED.**—A report from Cocagne says that last Tuesday's storm was the worst that has visited there for years. The schooner Azof, Captain Wm. Trenchholm, which had just arrived was driven ashore and is now up hard and dry. It will be some time before she can be floated again.

**ARBOR DAY.**—In accordance with the provisions of Regulation 20 (2) of the School Law Manual, I hereby appoint Friday, May 19th to be observed as Arbor Day.

Teachers will please to observe the conditions referred to in the section above named, Sub-Section (b.) Geo. Smith, Ins. of District No. 2.

**LANDED AT LAST.**—Mr. J. T. Forbes returned from Buctouche Saturday, where he has been engaged the past month in moving a church for Mr. James Barnes. Owing to the building going through the ice just as it was nearing its destination, the work of removal was prolonged some two or three weeks. After considerable difficulty, however, it has been got out of the river and is now safely landed at its destination.—Times.

**DIED.**—On the morning of the 23rd instant, at the residence of Robert Hutchinson, Esq., barrister, of acute cerebral meningitis, William I. Graham, aged seven years and three months. He was only about thirty hours ill. He was brought up by Mr. Hutchinson and formed a part of his family. He was a remarkably bright and intelligent boy, and much liked by all his youthful companions. All connected with the child have the sympathy of the community.

**LOBSTER PACKING IN DUNDAS.**—Notwithstanding the failure which attended last season's operations, the lobster fishermen of Cocagne are getting their boats and rigging in readiness and making active preparations to go into the packing business this season on a large scale. Mr. Simeon Bourgeois, who does the largest business, has 120 men engaged to run his factories, and purposes doing a large business in mackerel as well. Several others are engaging in the business on a smaller scale. Everything points to a favorable season.

**RAILWAY MEETING.**—A meeting of the stockholders of the Buctouche, Richibucto Cape, and Prince Edward Island Railway Co., was held at Buctouche last Thursday. Messrs. Geo. V. McInerney, Secretary, Hon. P. S. Poirier, Solicitor, Fidele Poirier and W. J. Brat, were present. Mr. McInerney explained the nature of the legislation enacted at Ottawa last session in regard to this company, increasing the capital stock, etc., after which the meeting was adjourned, to enable Dr. DeBertram and some of the P. E. Island stockholders to be present.

**FIRE AT THE B. & M. RAILWAY STATION HOUSE, MONCTON.**—At 14 o'clock Tuesday the fire alarm was sounded for a fire in the Buctouche station house. The fire started in the attic, presumably from the the flue, but did not force its way through the building except in the immediate proximity of the chimney. The firemen were quickly on the scene, especially No. 1 Co. who had their hose attached to the hydrant about three minutes after the alarm struck. The second floor of the building is occupied by Mr. Matthew Colburn, and on the first floor is the office of Mr. Frank Hall, local manager of the B. & M. Railway. Not much damage was done except by water the fire being confined to the attic.—Transcript.

**MR. LAW'S LOSS.**—Mr. Robert Law of Kingston met with a severe loss a few days ago, inasmuch as the produce of his magnificent mare that was bred to Kingston last spring, only lived three days. Mr. Law was anticipating grand results from this strain of breeding, and well he might, as his mare to the eye of an expert is just the required matron to couple with such a horse to produce the stock that the market now demands, that is a horse of fair size, high finish, with trotting action and able to handle a family carriage at the rate of ten or twelve miles an hour. This is the style of horse that is now saleable in the cities of the Dominion and the United States. But Mr. Law, who is acknowledged one of the advanced farmers in Kent, having devoted time and thought to the question of horse breeding as it may be profitably prosecuted in this county, feels satisfied notwithstanding this serious loss, that his ideas are correct and will try again on the same lines. He gives as his reasons for so doing, something as follows:—His mare is of good size, very well proportioned, descended from good, sound healthy stock, and very kind in disposition; while Kingstone is descended from both sire and dam from the greatest horse stock ever produced in any part of the world, being a combination of the great trotting sire Hambletonian, 10, and the world renowned thorough-bred four mile running horse Lexington. This combination of blood Mr. Law considers quiet satisfactory to breed to, especially as he finds it in Maud S. 2,083, Clingstone 2,14, Nutwood 2,183, Cora Belmont 2,24, Nontide (5) 2,20, Jay-Eye-See 2,10, Nelly Mason 2,14, Bella Vera 2,083, Snuol 2,081, Direct (Jr.) 2,083, Ryland T. 2,114, Delmarch 2,113, Kremlin 2,073, and many others of the same combined blood noted for both speed and horse race qualities.

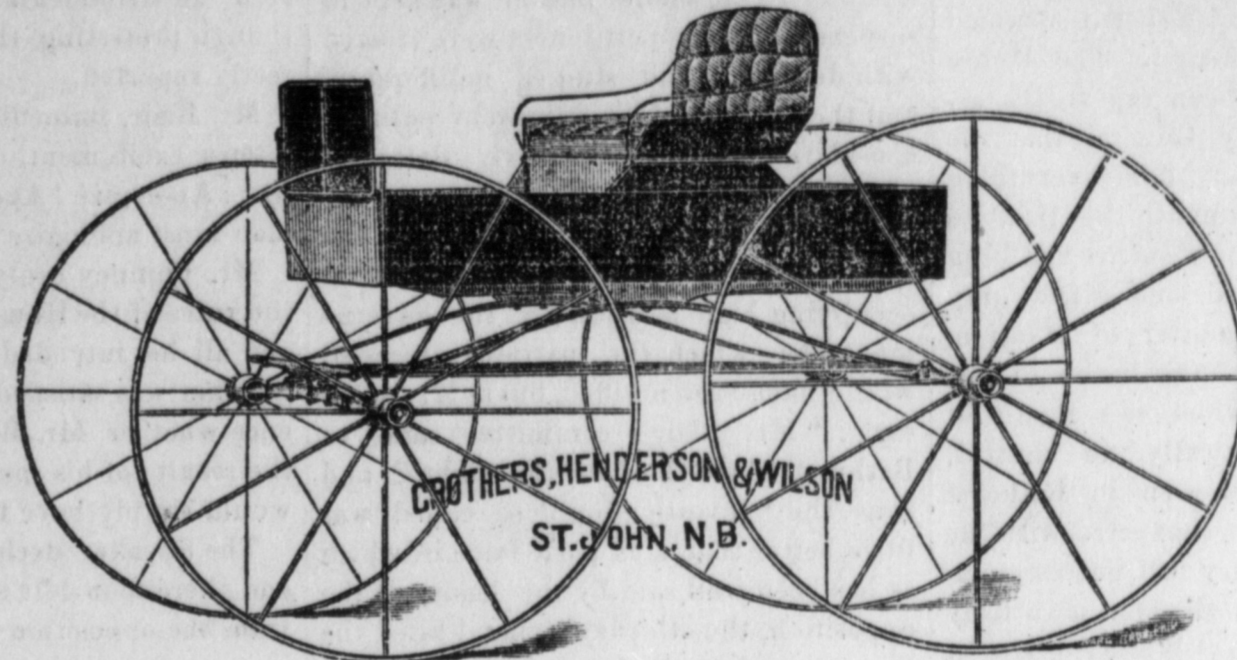

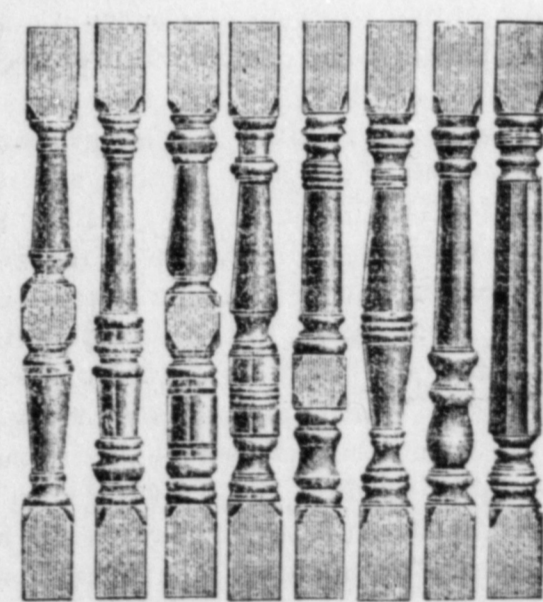
