MR. JARDINE'S HORSE.

A Fine Pedigree.

Last week Mr. Wm. Jardine returned from a visit to the various horse breeding farms throughout the New England States. He purchased two standard-bred horses—a four year old stallion, and a yearling filly. The stallion is a fine looking bay horse, 15½ hands high, weighing about 1020 lbs. When fully developed he will tip the scale at 1100 lbs. His breeding is most fashionable. His sire, Wilkes, 8571, is a son of the celebrated Alcyon, that is looked upon by many horsemen as the greatest son of George Wilkes. Augusta, the dam of Mr. Jardine's horse, is by Judge Advocate, a producing son of Messenger Duroc by Hambletonian, 10. Messenger Duroc has been for many years the premier stallion of Mr. Backman, of Stonyford farm, N. Y., the birthplace of Electioneer.

Alcyon (2.27), the sire of Wilkes, 8571 lived only ten years, yet his 2.30 list at the close of last season included 30 trotters and 3 pacers with records from 2.08 to 2.30. Among these may be mentioned Martha Wilkes, 2.08 (race record, second heat, 2.08½), McKinney, 2.10 (2.12½ at 4 years), and Alcyon, 2.15. His get are noted for gameness, beauty and style. Alcyon was a most beautiful horse, and in the show-ring in New York a few years ago he gained the first prize for beauty, style and action, defeating the hitherto invincible Mambrino King which had been styled "the handsomest horse in the world." The only other horses that have ever beaten Mambrino King in the show-ring are Alcantara and Quartermaster, brother and son respectively of Alcyon.

The dam of Wilkes was Molby by American Clay, 34, which of all the Clays is most famed as a sire of brood mares. Wilkes is ten years of age, is owned by C. H. Nelson, of Waterville, Maine, and all his stud service has been in that state where he has access to a class of mares but little superior to our own. It is unfortunate that such a horse is owned by C. H. Nelson. He (Mr. Nelson) is so much interested in his peerless stallion, Nelson, (2.10), that he spends his time and energy in training him and his progeny. It is remarkable that in the face of these adverse circumstances, Wilkes has already four horses in the list coming next to Quartermaster among the producing sons of Alcyon. Of these, three are out of non-standard dams and all entered the list at four years of age. The other one in the list is Col. Osgood with a record at five years of 2.19½. Two of Wilkes' get, viz., St. Croix and Fred Wilkes entered the list last year, winning races and trotting under 2.30 at the Maine State Fair, Lewiston, Maine, and at Eastern Maine State Fair, Bangor, Maine, in each instance over a half mile track. A yearling by Wilkes won a race at the Franklin County (Maine) State Fair last fall, and in the show-ring at Maine State Fair, Bangor, Wilkes himself won first prize in his class as a trotting stallion. As a two year old, Wilkes in his only race distanced his field in 2.42.

Mr. Jardine expects to train his horse in the fall and will be disappointed if he fails to trot in 2.30. The fact that Wilkes has produced

trotters from non-standard mares ought to encourage the farmers and breeders in this county to patronize a horse that will surely beget fine, handsome road horses and very probably a good percentage of speedy ones.

Mr. Jardine has displayed good judgment and utilized his thorough knowledge of the different producing lines in the selection of a horse. Hambletonian, 10, founded the greatest family of trotting horses. His greatest son, George Wilkes, has over 1200 descendants (included sons, grandsons, etc.) in the 2.30 list. Alcyon was one of the best, if not the very best, of George Wilkes' sons, and Wilkes, the sire of Mr. Jardine's horse, is the second producing son of Alcyon. The majority of the bread-winners of the trotting turf belong to the great family founded by George Wilkes.

There is every reason to believe that Nelson will have a theatre in the near future, and one which in point of architecture will do credit to the leading city of West Kootenay. Arrangements have already been made to secure its erection. It will seat 500 people, and cost \$10,000.

The London Mercantile Association, Limited, is seeking a charter to enable it to start a branch business in this city.

Among the government estimates is the sum of \$30,000 for public works in West Kootenay. One item provides for an \$8000 Court House in Nelson.

The incorporation of the Silver King Mining Company will shortly be announced. The company will have a capital stock of \$2,000,000.

The New Brunswick contingent in Nelson is almost as large and influential as the colony from England. It had an addition lately by the arrival of L. R. Harrison, a lawyer from St. John.

People are passing through here by the hundreds on their way to Kalso. It is forty miles from Nelson, and is said to be one of the richest mining camps in the world. Last June Kalso only had about 100 people. It has now a population of 3,000 and expects to reach 10,000 before fall. It has four miles of sidewalk, water-works, opera house, two newspapers, telephone, hotel, etc. etc.
