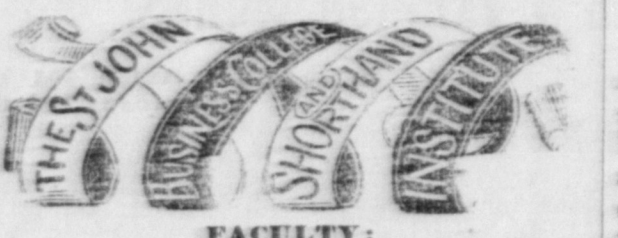

A Morning Bath.

Cold water is a narcotic, as alcohol is. It deadens the sensibilities of the skin and hence prevents the sensation of cold. A Visit to Arabi Pasha.

While in Colombo I drove into the suburbs to visit Arabi Bey, or Arabi Pasha to give him his proper title. The political prisoner of the English Government, he was allowed to dwell within the environment of Colombo, and he chose a cottage surrounded by beautiful grounds on the outskirts of the city. Here he lived quietly with an abbreviated harem and some few Egyptian servants. I found him a portly Arab of about fifty-five. His demeanor was pleasant, though tinged with a weariness that he could not disguise. He conversed fluently in French and spoke but little English with considerable hesitation. He said that he tried to make life as agreeable as possible in view of all the circumstances, but that of course he pined for liberty. He hoped eventually he would get it. He did not care to discuss international politics. I was not presented to Mrs. Arabi. She was probably too numerous. —From "A Peripatetic Philosopher, in Donahoe's Magazine for May.

They Saw Our Lord Rise.

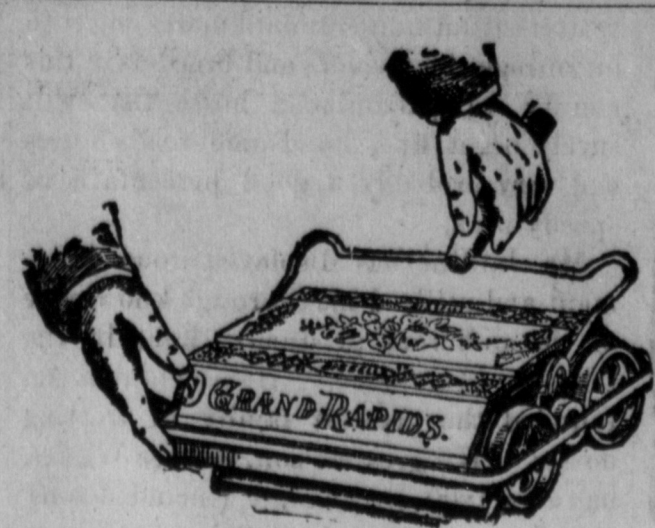
LONDON, April 26.—The discovery of the gospel of Peter is arousing immense interest, exceeding even that caused by the finding of an ancient copy of the gospels at Mount Sinai. The manuscript was found in the tomb of an Egyptian monk. The recital of the passion, death and resurrection of Christ, though differing in some details from that of the canonical books, approaches that of St. Mark. According to the best exegetical scholars in Paris the gospel is copied from a Greek manuscript. At the crucifixion, according to the version, only the hands were nailed. Joseph, of Arimathea, it states, was an influential friend of Pilate and prevailed upon him to obtain Herod's consent to the delivery of the body of Jesus. The soldiers and elders, it is said, witnessed the resurrection. The latter were afraid of being stoned by the Jews. They therefore sent a deputation to Pilate to ask him to forbid the soldiers to divulge the miracle.
