MRS. STEVENS ACQUITTED.

The acquittal of Mrs. Stevens at Dorchester (Thursday) was not a surprise. It was expected by all who had followed the case closely and read carefully the evidence adduced on the trial. At the preliminary hearing all manner of testimony was introduced and allowed, and street gossip, hearsay and conjecture were allowed to take the place of more credible testimony. A number of reports derogatory to the character of the accused and calculated to influence public opinion against her, were also circulated verbally and through the columns of the press. Some of these were promptly denied by those in a position to know the truth, others passed unchallenged and were accepted by many as furnishing a strong presumption of her guilt. When, however, the genuine facts stripped of all these inadmissible rumors were presented before the court it was found that there was nothing that would justify a conviction. The evidence of Dr. Walker for the defence removed any doubt in the matter, and the jury after an absence of only fifteen minutes returned into court with a verdict of "not guilty." The medical men who conducted the post mortem examination do not appear to have covered themselves with glory if Dr. Walker's testimony can be accepted as correct. He declares that the only sure way to tell whether marks on a body are post mortem or ante mortem is by cutting into them. This was not done, and the medical testimony produced by the prosecution was therefore valueless. Messrs. Wells and Powell, counsel for Mrs. Stevens, are to be congratulated on their able defense. The examination by the latter of the medical experts was most searching and thorough and did much to break down the case of the prosecution.

A NEW POLICY.

The Liberal meeting at Ottawa last week was a more successful demonstration than even the leaders of the party anticipated. The attendance was large and the proceedings as harmonious as could be expected in such a large gathering. The only question that called for any difference of opinion was the resolution declaring in favor of a plebiscite on the question of prohibition. Several of the delegates protested against the introduction of this resolution, which they declared would cause a division in the party. There was nothing in the resolution, however, to give rise to any such objection. It goes no further than to ask that the question be submitted to a popular vote. Those who took the ground that the resolution did not go far enough had much more ground for complaint. The usual resolution deploring the gross corruption at Ottawa was more enthusiastically received. Premier Blair, of this province, strange to say, gave it a hearty support. It is understood, however, that he does not intend that the principle advocated by this resolution shall apply to provincial affairs. He believes in running federal and provincial politics on separate lines. The resolution dealing with the Franchise Act was more to the point and expresses the sentiments of many who are friendly to the present administration. The illiberal and cumbersome provisions of this act make it a source of weakness to the party, and the Liberals are not alone in their desire for its modification or repeal. The most important resolution before the convention was that dealing with the future policy of the party on the tariff question. Unrestricted Reciprocity is now a thing of the past with the Liberal party. The new policy declares in favor of a tariff for revenue only, and a fair and liberal measure of reciprocity with the United States, including a well considered list of manufactured articles. Mr. Laurier has evidently arrived at the conclusion that there is a growing sentiment in favor of tariff reform and has resolved to sail with the tide. The government, however, has promised its followers to make a move in this direction, and on the attitude of the of the Conservative party on this question next session will depend in a great measure the success of the new Liberal policy.

The maritime province delegates to the Liberal convention, met at Ottawa Friday and formed a provincial Liberal association. Dr. Borden M. P., occupied the chair and J. H. Logan of Amherst, acted as secretary. The association having been decided upon, L. H. Davis was elected president, C. W. Weldon, and H. R. Emmerson, vice-presidents for New Brunswick, and Premier Fielding and Dr. Borden for Nova Scotia. The president and vice presidents were appointed a committee to select other officers to complete organization. Hon. Mr. Laurier and others addressed the meeting.

Grave Yard Desecration.
