KENT COUNTY BOYS SUCCESSFUL.—The Kent County students were very successful in the examinations at St. Joseph's college, Memramcook, last week. Wm. O'Leary received the degree of B. A., with honors. He was also the winner of the Powell Premium, a set of books awarded for excellence in mathematics. Also a set of books awarded by Rev. Fr. Lefebvre for excellence in Christian Doctrine. DROWNED AT BERLIN FALLS, N. H.—A New Hampshire correspondent sends us the following account of the drowning accident at Berlin Falls, N. H., referred to last week:—

A sad drowning accident happened at this place on May 12th, at 6 p. m., in which Duncan R. Campbell, of Bass River, N. B., brother of Wm. C. Campbell, lost his life. He was working for the Berlin Mills Co., had charge of the pond at night, and was well liked by his employers. On the evening of the accident he left the boarding house in his usual humorous way and walked out on a boom that was a foot above water. He dropped his pipe pole and while stooping to pick it up, tripped and fell headlong into the river. The fresher had not been so high for seven years, and before anything could be done the strong current carried him under the logs.

The alarm was made at once and all the mill gates shut down, a search was begun by the whole crew, and kept up all night. In the morning others took their places and grappled until noon. The search was continued by a few of his friends on the following Monday, but it was useless owing to the high water. Although it was thought by a great many that his body went down river, a constant lookout was kept and on the morning of June 7th, the body was discovered by some of the men not fifty yards from where he was drowned.

The remains were buried by the Berlin Mills Co., who furnished everything that was necessary. We feel very grateful to this company, especially Mr. Brown, superintendent of the saw mill for the best endeavours they made to find the body, and the respect they showed in furnishing teams for the funeral.

Deceased was a widower, and leaves two children who are living with his brother at Bass River.

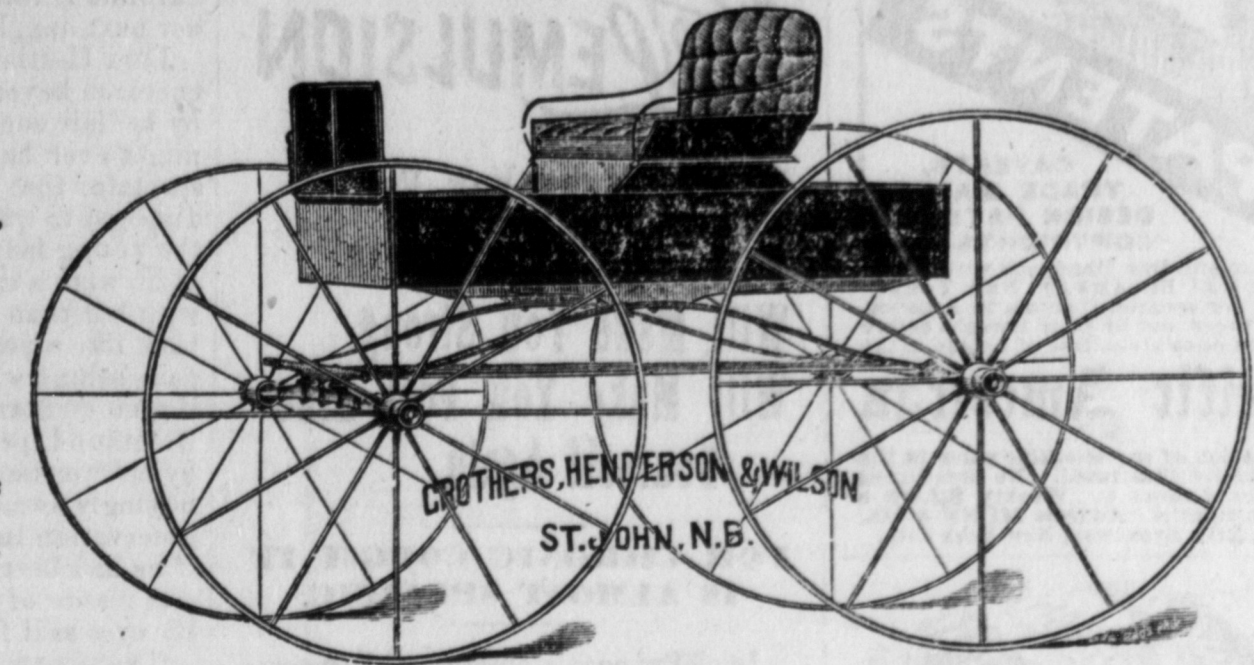
NUGGETS.
