



To the court—The abrasions he saw or the spots on the limbs were in his opinion caused by decomposition. This closed the case for the crown. DORCHESTER, N. B., June 19.—When the court met to-day Mr. Powell moved for the prisoner's discharge, first, on the ground there was no evidence to leave to the jury; second, no evidence of violence having been committed; third, that if violence was committed there is nothing to connect the prisoner with it ; fourth, that even if there is such evidence there is no evidence to show it was in excess of that punishment which a person standing in loco parentis was justified in administer-ing; fifth, if there is evidence of violence there is none that it caused Mabel's death ; sixth, there is no evidence of any fear on part of diseased such as would be neces sary to produce death by shock. Judge Landry refused the motion, but said he would reserve the points raised by Mr. Poweil. Adjourned till nine o'clock tomorrow. DORCHESTER, June 20 .- When the court opened, Hon. Dr. Pugsley submitted the plans of the Stevens residence, Moncton, which has been prepared by his honor's order, for use in the case J. Elbert Church, M. D., was the first witness called this morning by Mr. Powell. He was present at the examination of the body of Mabel Hallet Stevens. Was employed by Mr. Stevens to watch the inquest on his behalf. Simply watched the proceedings ; did not participate in them. Dr. Mitchell and Dr. Purdy were present. When taken from the coffin there was a mark on the left eye, with discoloration ; a mark on cheek and a slight mark (an old scar) under the hair. That was all he observed on the head and face. Dr. Mitchell pressed on the inner corner of the eye and about a drop of pus exuded. The mark on the cheek was very superficial; appeared like a scratch. but they did not form continuous lines on the body. After death by shock the heart is generally found distended with blood. When at the post mortem, his first impres-sion was she died of shock. Deduced that from failure to find any cause of death. From his reading of the best authorities since then, he was satisfied his first impression was erroneous, there being too much blood in the heart. Agreed with Dr. Mitchell that the marks on the wrists were caused by lifting the body. Saw that the cuticle was broken on the spots on the body. This was the result of post mortem changes, or might have been caused by takin, off the clothing. A post mortem often failed to determine the cause in sudden death. Death might result from pain alone; sudden, as in neuralgia of the heart which he thought would leave no post-mortem effects visible in the heart. The marks on the wrists might have been preduced by pulling on the garments. No posi-tive opinion could be formed astoanymarks without cutting. Putting a child in her room two hours earlier than usual and giving her her meals there for a couple of weeks might have a little temporary W. F.
