Value of Ashes.
Wood ashes are a potash manure, and
have a lasting influence; the good effect
can generally be seen for a number of
years. The gain to be derived from their
use will depend upon the amount of avail-
able potash in the soil; but few of our
farms are so rich in this manure but that
an application of ashes would do good.
They are helpful on all impoverished soils,
and especially to sandy land, but their
action does not depend entirely on the
potash and phosphoric acid; the alkaline
nature of the lime renders them very valu-
able to soils containing organic matter, as
they act as a liberator of fertility.
