NO PLACE LIKE HOME.—Mr. Arthur O'Leary and family, who left here last summer, for Yarmouthville, Maine, returned last week. During their absence his little daughter Esther died of croup. Her body was brought back to Kingston and buried in the R. C. burying ground there, last Friday. Mr. O'Leary has come to stay. He moved into his house on Court street Tuesday.

THE EXODUS.—The Moncton Transcript states that about 200 families belonging to Rev. Father Michaud's congregation, Buctouche, have left for the United States. This information has probably been furnished the Transcript by the reverend gentleman himself, and may be accepted as correct. It will give to outsiders some idea of the magnitude of the exodus of French Acadians from this county.

ARBOR DAY.—Arbor day was generally observed in the public schools of this county last Friday, though the rain in the forenoon prevented the planting of many trees. In the afternoon the weather was fine, and teachers and pupils actively engaged in cleaning up the school grounds. The grammar school grounds present a much more creditable appearance than formerly. A few trees were brought by the pupils and set out along the fences. Nearly all the trees set out in former years, have died.

PROTECTION AGAINST CHOLERA.—Mr. Geo. V. McInerney, United States Consular agent at this port, has, under instructions from the head office, issued the following notice to masters of vessels sailing from here to ports in the United States:—In view of the possible introduction of Cholera and other infectious or contagious diseases into the United States from foreign countries, your attention is specially called to the provisions of the Regulations requiring that a Bill of Health shall be procured from a Consular Officer, and you are hereby notified to comply with the same, and obtain a Bill of Health at this Consular Agency prior to sailing to a port in the United States.

Consular Officers are instructed to notify the proper authorities by telegram, if necessary, of any refusal on the part of masters to take out or receive Bills of Health.

A DIFFICULTY OVER A HORSE RACE.—The difficulty which arose in connection with the shutting out of some of the horses in the races at Kingston last March on account of delay in getting in their places at the starting point, threatens to develop into a full-fledged law suit. The horse of Clovis Chase, Buctouche, and one belonging to John P. Legere, were entered, and trotted the first heat, Legere's horse taking first place in the heat. When the second heat was called, these horses were not in their places, so the starters declare, and the remaining horses were started without them. They were not afterwards allowed to take part in the race. Chase claims that he was not allowed sufficient time to change his sulky and that the horses were started ahead of time, for the express purpose of shutting the two Buctouche horses out of the race. He has demanded from Martin Lanigan, secretary, the return of his entrance fee, and threatens suit unless it is returned forthwith.


