Hon. Mr. Foster Banqueted.

ST. JOHN, May 18.—The Foster dinner at the Institute to-night was a highly successful affair, and was attended by about 150 representatives and conservatives from all parts of the province. With Mr. Foster were three of his colleagues, Messrs. Bowell, Angers, and Daley, representing Ontario, Quebec and Manitoba. Mr. Burns, of Gloucester, was present, as was also Mr. Wood, of Westmorland, Mr. Weldon, of Albert, and Mr. Powell, M. P. P. Frederickson was very strongly represented. Major Vincent came down from Woodstock to attend the dinner, as did also Mayor Chipman, of St. Stephen. The chair was occupied by Mr. W. H. Thorne, who presided in a dignified manner. The speakers beside the guest of the evening were Messrs. Bowell, Powell, Angers, Daley, Hon. John Boyd, Burns, Wood, Weldon, Mayor Peters, C. H. Everett, John H. Parks, Geo. Robertson, and A. A. Stockton. Mr. Foster spoke for an hour and ten minutes, mainly in justification of the government and its policy. He declared the National Policy would be adhered to and only such modifications in details would be made as the government ascertained from interviews with merchants, manufacturers and others were necessary. For the next six months, the Government would be engaged in hearing all classes who had any information to give in regard to the tariff and any changes that were found to be necessary would be announced. The dinner broke up at an early hour.

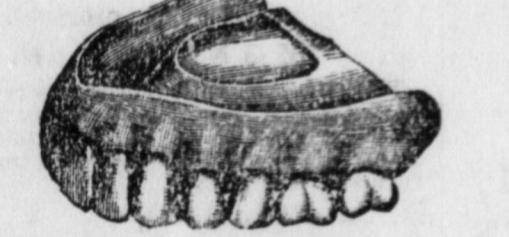
