Lawlessness at Cocagne.

Editor Review:

Lawlessness and lawfulness are words of vastly different meanings, but to a certain class of our citizens it is a matter of utter insignificance which is which. In a community like this where law-abiding citizens are supposed to form an overwhelmingly large majority of our people, or where lawlessness is supposed to be unknown, it sounds a little strange that such is the case, yet the case it is.

Many of our residents who profess to be law-abiding are so when nothing can be gained by being adverse to it, but just put the law between them and a few dollars and see what they'll do. They would set the law at naught without thinking of it twice.

The first and most open of this class of people is the unlicensed tavern keeper. He generally has good chances of retreat should an attack be made on him. He, as a matter of fact keeps the worst and most poisonous quality of intoxicating drinks which he manufactures from a small proportion of liquor. He can thus sell this mixture at lower prices than the keeper of good liquors can, and thus he is patronized by the poor classes, who care nothing about the quality of the liquor, as long as they can get "drunk" by it.

Of this class of saloons there are at least four in this parish. At twenty dollars for each license there would be a saving of at least eighty dollars on the taxes of this county if these public nuisances were forced to "toe the line" as they should be. But for the sake of twenty dollars they will carry on this underhand business. The liquor authorities should be a little more strict and give the people of this county fair play and not let such people rule the place.

Then there is the unlawful lobster fisher. Of these a large number of our fishermen form a part. This was the case last year, but the reverse is expected this season under Chapman's keen watch. Last summer and autumn a number of the fishermen who had made nothing during the season, thought that they were justified in fishing after the season closed in order to make up for their loss. They accordingly daily visited their traps early in the morning, and returning brought the lobsters to the woods where they were canned, and at night they were hauled up to our merchants who readily bought them. This kind of business was carried on for two or three months and was openly talked of by our people. Some of these fishermen made as much as \$200 each after the

close of the season. Yet in spite of all that was known of it, no one had courage enough to notify the authorities that the guilty parties might be brought to justice. Then again there is the illegal oyster fishers and shippers. This class of people engage in the unlawful work mostly at night. After the oyster fishing season closes the prices paid for the bivalves are then highest so large numbers engage in fishing them, and sell their ill-gotten gains to local dealers who ship them mostly to Moncton. This trade is carried on at night and in spite of the strict watch kept up at Moncton, they were taken in and sold in large quantities. It is known that Chapman found several boats engaged in fishing last summer when he visited this place.

Still again there is the smelt fishermen. It is well known that smelts caught with hooks can be sold before the smelt fishing season opens. Thus all the smelts that are caught by nets or otherwise before the season opens are bought by our merchants and shipped as smelts caught by hooks. To this they swear. Men who swear to a lie when they know it to be so are dangerous men and should be avoided. They are willing to swear their honor, good name, (if they have any) and honesty away for the almighty dollar.

A Double Hanging.

MONTREAL, May 18.—A despatch from Towanda, Pa., tells of the hanging of two Hebrew murderers, Blank and Rosenweig at that place this morning. These men were captured at Montreal and spent a couple of months in this city before being captured. During the time extradition proceedings were in progress they murdered in the Dutch Mountains, Pennsylvania, near the New York State Line, a Jewish pedlar named Marks and hid his body in the woods, where it was found by searchers. The disappearance of Blank and Rosenweig directed suspicion to them and detectives traced them by means of Mark's trunk, which they had shipped to New York. Then they came to Montreal, where they were arrested by local detectives, extradited and taken to Towanda. After having been found guilty of the murder they were hanged to-day. A notable fact in connection with these hangings is the statement made by the Jewish rabbi that they were the first Jews ever executed in the United States. Two Hebrews previously sentenced for murder in New York had escaped death by suicide. Another renounced the Hebrew faith before the day of his hanging arrived.

A Monster Ship.

LONDON, May 15.—The White Star line has given an order to Harland & Wolff, the ship builders, for the construction of a steamer 800 feet long, which the firm is confident will beat anything afloat. The only difficulty for such a gigantic vessel will be the shallow water at the Mersey bar, but the White Star Company is arranging to have larger tenders meet the great steamship farther out. The firm is at present hurrying the completion of the Gothic, 500 feet long and of 8,000 tons. The Gothic is being built on a new principle as to the engines and steering gear and it is expected to equal the speed of the Campania and her sister steamer, as yet unlaunched, the Lucania. The Gothic will be launched about the end of June.

Twenty Lives Lost. CLEVELAND, O., May 17.—The storm of rain and wind which began at noon Monday continued almost without cessation until evening, producing a flood unprecedented in the history of Northeastern Ohio and Northwestern Pennsylvania. Thus far 14 lives are known to have been lost and great damage done to shipping. The loss to other property amounts to a hundred thousand dollars.

CLEVELAND, Ohio, May 17.—The life saving crew of this port, started to rescue a crew of men in a skiff on Lake Erie today, when from some unknown cause the life boat capsized and six of the seven men were drowned.

STALLION GOLDLEAF.

Goldleaf is the son of Rysdyk, 653, Sire of Clingstone, 2.14, Victor, 2.214, Geo. M. Rysdyk, 2.25, Maud A., 2.264, Bertrac, 2.274, Dam, Oakleaf, by Sunshine, (thoroughbred.) He is bay in color, with two hind ankles white. He stands 16 hands high and weighs 1100 pounds. He is perfectly sound, and has an excellent set of feet and legs, with plenty of bone and substance, good back and loin, well muscled and springy ribbed, splendid head and neck, well put on, oblique shoulders, and deep chest, and a fine main and tail. His finish style and action are perfect, and though never handled for speed, he shows a natural and frictionless gait, and will go fast if developed. He can now show a 2.40 clip. He has good stifle action, and opens up wide when he moves.

Goldleaf is bred for speed, his veins being rich in the famous Hambletonian blood flanked by the very best strains of imported thoroughbred. He took first prize at the Sackville, N. B., Exhibition in 1886 and 1888. (He was not shown in 1887.) He is 12 years old on June 20th, 1892, and for so young a horse is a remarkably successful one.

Goldleaf's colts are claiming attention wherever shown, and carry off honors in the face of the weightiest competition. Mr. H. A. Whitney, Mechanical Superintendent of the Intercolonial Railway, Moncton, has two fillies sired by Goldleaf, aged four and five years respectively, full sisters and well matched, that were driven in double harness on the streets the past winter, and pronounced by all to be a very handsome team. Warden J. B. Foster, of the Dorchester Penitentiary, has a five-year old that took first prize at the Sackville Exhibition. 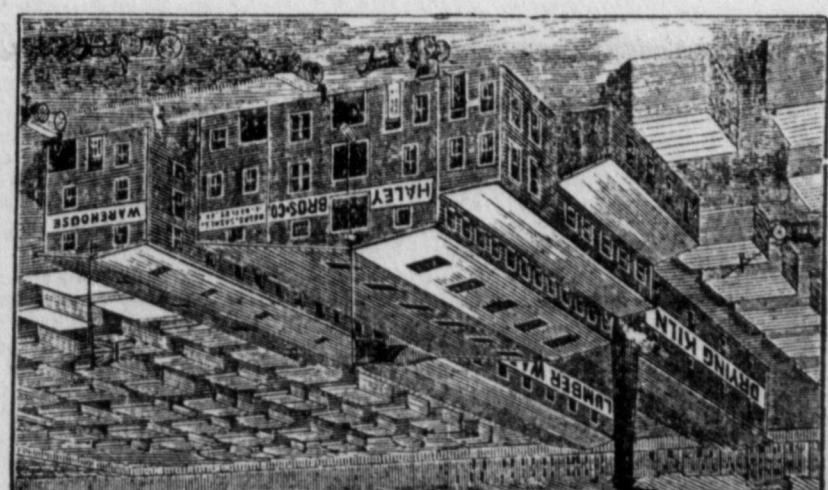
