The dredge Canada finished her work at Cape Traverse on Monday last. On Tuesday she went to Cape Tormentine, whence she was to leave as soon as possible for Bathurst, N. B., where she has a large amount of dredging to do.

It is estimated that on Saturday last 300 schooners averaging 12 tons each, entered Shippagan through the gully on their return from the fishing grounds. Fishing for some little time on the banks there has been poor.—Sun.

Rev. Antoine Ouellet, of Shediac, last week celebrated the twenty-fifth anniversary of his ordination. High Mass was celebrated in his church, and the parishioners afterwards presented him with an address and a more substantial gift as well.

Quite a mining boom has broken out in Westmorland. Hon. Pascal Poirier, Hon. A. D. Richard, and Dr. A. H. Chandler have applied for a prospecting license between Dorchester Court House and Kellor Brook and Woodlawn Gold District, Dorchester.

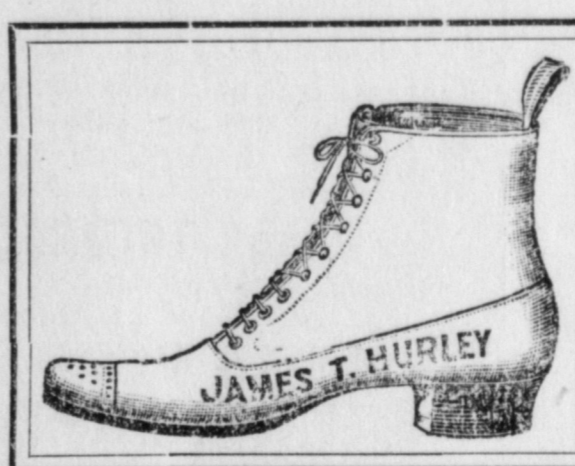
An Edmundston, N. B., dispatch says:—Yesterday afternoon about 5 o'clock Herbert Mercure, son of Peter Mercure, of St. Basile, was killed in Gilbert Guerette's bar-room at the three mile brook. Mercure was fighting with a tramp, a man having but one arm. The proprietor, Guerette, told him several times to keep quiet, but he paid no attention to it. He separated them several times but Mercure jumped again and again on the tramp. Guerette took hold of the deceased and threw him on a pair of scales and fell with him breaking Mercure's neck. He died instantly. An inquest was held last night in the shop of the encounter, and the jury returned a verdict that Herbert Mercure came to his death accidentally.
