Point Sable.

July 22, 1893.—The lobster packing
season is over. We deem it would be pro-
fitable to the readers of THE REVIEW to
know somewhat of the season's catch, and
first we will visit the most northerly fac-
tory in the county, at Eel River. This
factory is owned by W. S. Loggie, Esq.,
of Chatham, but is operated by Messrs.
Goinett and Dujas on their own account.
They have three boats and have packed
about 400 cases. Messrs. Goinett and
Dujas fish their own traps and look after
the outside work. White King David and
his queen have charge inside. Our next
factory is the one on Spruce Point, owned
by W. S. Loggie, and under the manage-
ment of Robt. J. Stothart, of Lower New-
castle. This is Robert's first season, and
he complains sorely of the scarcity of girls,
but in other respects he is well satisfied.
Mr. Stothart thinks, by cultivating the
power of magnetism, he will not have any
scarcity of girls next year. He intends
enlarging his buildings and putting on sev-
eral more boats this season. This year he
had two boats, and his pack was 200 cases.
Robert has been ably assisted by Ex. Coun-
cillor O'Leary, who has had large expe-
rience in lobster packing. We next visit
the factory of the south shore, this is a
new factory put up last year by Mr. Robt.
McKinnon, of Richibucto. It is owned
by Messrs. Richard & Richard O'Leary,
of Richibucto and is managed by Dicko, and
has been most successful this season. They
have eleven boats, and their output will be
about 1400 cases. The manager is not a
married man, and hence Dicko has lots of
female help. In looking around this fine
factory, we notice our old friend, Mr.
Long. Mike has done fairly well at the
fishing, but somehow Michael seems to
have something on his mind, as he seems
a little dull. Mr. James Kelly is also
here, and we are pleased to find he has
done exceedingly well. Mr. Kelly is liv-
ing at the Batterie with his family, but
intends shortly to go back to his winter
residence. We hasten on, and in a few
minutes we are at the Sabin factory, owned
by W. S. Loggie, and managed by Wm.
McDermid, of Pokenouche. This fac-
tory operates eight boats, and has packed
500 cases; there is a freezer in connection
and Mr. McDermid intends filling it with
mackerel, the price he is now offering be-
ing 1½ cents apiece, which is very low.
He intends building a very fine house for
his family, and so become one of Sabin's
ratepayers. We find here, too, our old
friend, the sea captain. He in a few
words goes back to the days of his youth,
when he carried 680 lbs. of iron, when he
crossed the Atlantic in one of Kent's noble
ships in company with an Indian, and
when and how he knocked some of Eng-
land's prize-fighters out of their boots.
But time hastens on, and so we bid the
old tar good-bye, and soon we are at
Messrs. Fred Dagle and Antine Muzeral's
factory. This is a new factory erected
last year. They have three boats, and
only had a half pack. We next visit
Simon Joe Muzeral's factory. Mr. Muz-
eral had two boats, and did only fair work.
We set sail for Kouchibouguac factory,
owned by W. S. Loggie, and managed by
Robt. Gregan. Lobsters have been better
this year. Mr. Gregan has 7 boats, and
his pack has been five hundred cases.
There is a large freezer in connection, and
salmon have been very plentiful this sea-
son. This is as far south as we intend go-
ing, and so we set sail northward, and, as
night has overtaken us, we ask our com-
panion where is the light house that we
were promised? What about our better
mail accommodations? Our M. P. is
very eloquent on many other
subjects, but what we want and what we
demand is a small beacon light at or near
the Batterie, and our mail service increased
to two trips per week from 1st May to
1st November. What is G. V. thinking
about? What about the great convention
held at Ottawa last month? What about
the cases of Liberal literature that are
flooding our land? What about the rum-
blings concerning a general election that
are filling the air? We have no notion at
present of forgetting our worthy M. P.,
but, like a dear soul, don't forget
yourself.

In our rambling remarks we may state
that we are sorry to see our friend, Ex-
Councillor O'Leary is not in the packing
business. He is devoting his time to his
farm, and also to the manufacture of his
patent medicine, which is such a boon to
the community.

We are very much pleased with the
look of the crops, the late rains having
helped them nicely.

Overcrowded.
DENVER, July 20.—The closing of many
of the silver mines and smelters, and the
reducing of the working forces of coal
mines, railways and manufacturing in the
state because of the reduction of the price
of silver has caused a deplorable condition
of affairs among the laboring classes. It is
estimated that to-day there are in Denver
10,000 men unable to secure employment.
There are 20,000 in outside towns in the
same condition, one-half of whom are
making their way to this city where they
will become a public charge if conditions
do not speedily change. In order to avoid
this state, all the commercial bodies in the
city will meet with the representatives of
the eastern railways at four o'clock this
afternoon when the latter will be asked to
make a \$5 rate from here to the Missouri
river for this class of people. It is argued
that these men are not paupers, but if they
can get into the agricultural districts they
will be able to secure employment in the
harvest fields where men will soon be in
demand.
