THE FIRST SETTLER.

SOLOMON POWELL OF LONG ISLAND, N. Y.

The First White Man Who Lived in Richibucto—The Story of His Trials and Privations as Told by a Correspondent.

(Telegraph.)

Solomon Powell was born in Poughkeepsie, New York, of Welsh ancestry, and Quaker parentage. When quite a young man he removed to Long Island, and there lived and prospered in his business as a blacksmith until the breaking out of the revolutionary war. Being a loyal subject of the king he refused to make or repair arms for the enemies of his majesty. He was seized and put in a place of confinement. After a time he made his escape by night. There being a light snow on the ground at the time, he got on the top of a fence, and ran a long distance, knowing that he would be made for him as soon as he was missed. The next day a band of rough men entered his house searching every nook and corner for him, and demanding that food should be prepared for them, shoving their swords through and under the bed where the children were sleeping, and telling his wife that they meant to remain until he was found. One wonders now why they should make such a time over a quiet peace-loving man, but we must remember that it was a new country, where a good smith was a valuable man, one that was a good lock-smith and acquainted with all the branches of his trade, as they knew him to be. Once at liberty he knew not whither to direct his steps, or who were enemies or who friends, but made his way to the residence of his widowed mother, and found to his surprise that his brothers were divided on the great question of the day, some taking part with the rebels, while more of them, like himself, remained loyal. His mother being a staunch Quakeress was very decided in her views on the subject, and argued if they would only have patience the king would see his mistake and all would yet be well. Our friend Solomon, however, found there was to be no rest for him, and resolved to make his way to Nova Scotia. In the meantime he had communicated with his wife and told her of his plans, but he found many difficulties in the way, and he endured many hardships and privations before he reached the St. John river where he remained till his family could join him. He lived for some time about Sheffield, but owing to the freshets and other causes he became dissatisfied. After the close of the war his younger brother Jacob who had a good knowledge of business, was engaged as clerk for one Mr. Pagan of St. Andrews. He with a party of others went prospecting through the province, and on his return told his brother of a river called by the Indians Richibucto, that it was teeming with fish, and an abundance of trees suitable for timber. The Indians too were disposed to be friendly, and there were no whites in the place. This decided him; he took his canoe, an Indian guide, went up the St. John through the Salmon river and down the Richibucto. He was so much pleased with the place that he went to work to prepare a home for his family. A long story might be written of the difficulties he had to contend with in getting back and forward, and the dangers and delays in getting his wife and children there. Fish and game were plenty, but the great trouble was to get bread the first few years they lived there, there being no market nearer than St. John for the furs he could collect. The Indians had great confidence in him from the first, and would give him almost anything for the knives he made them. When they had been living there about six years, a few French families settled on the Aldouane, a branch of the Richibucto, where some of their descendants still reside. About the same time Jacob Powell laid the foundation of the firm which was known as that of Pagan & Powell, which for years did a large and successful business. About the year 1810 or 1812 the two elder sons of Solomon Powell built the first vessel that was ever launched into the Richibucto. The younger of the two sailed in her to Newfoundland, and on his return was lost with all on board. Other brothers took up land on the river, as is seen by the old grantees, namely, Abram, Louis and James, but never settled upon them, preferring to take their families to some more settled part of the country, and made homes for themselves in Ontario, not far from Toronto, where many of their descendants are.

still to be found. The mother of these men when quite an old lady removed from the States, and a stone which marks her resting place, may be seen in the old graveyard, one of the oldest in the province, on what is known as the Cape Farm. The widow of Solomon Powell, who survived him many years, used to tell many touching stories of her trials and hardships. The anxious days and nights she spent when her husband and elder sons were away from home on their long trips to and from St. John, of her fear of the Indians, of her desire to return to some more civilized spot. Her husband used to tell her she would live to see a coach and pair drive through the town, which she did in 1837.

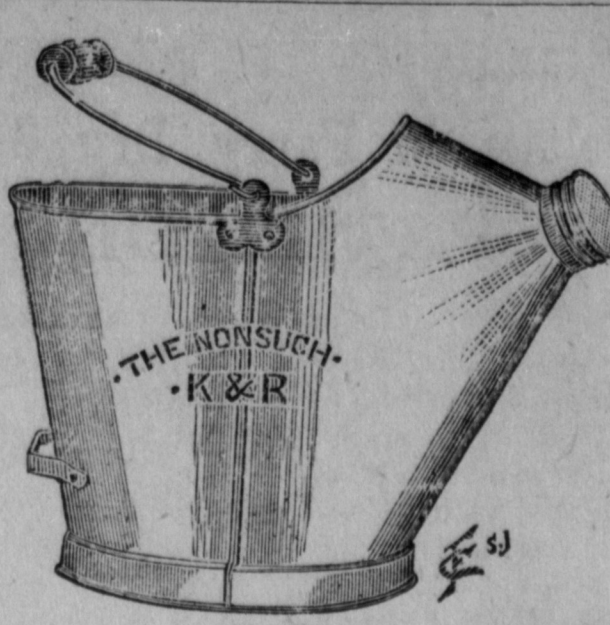

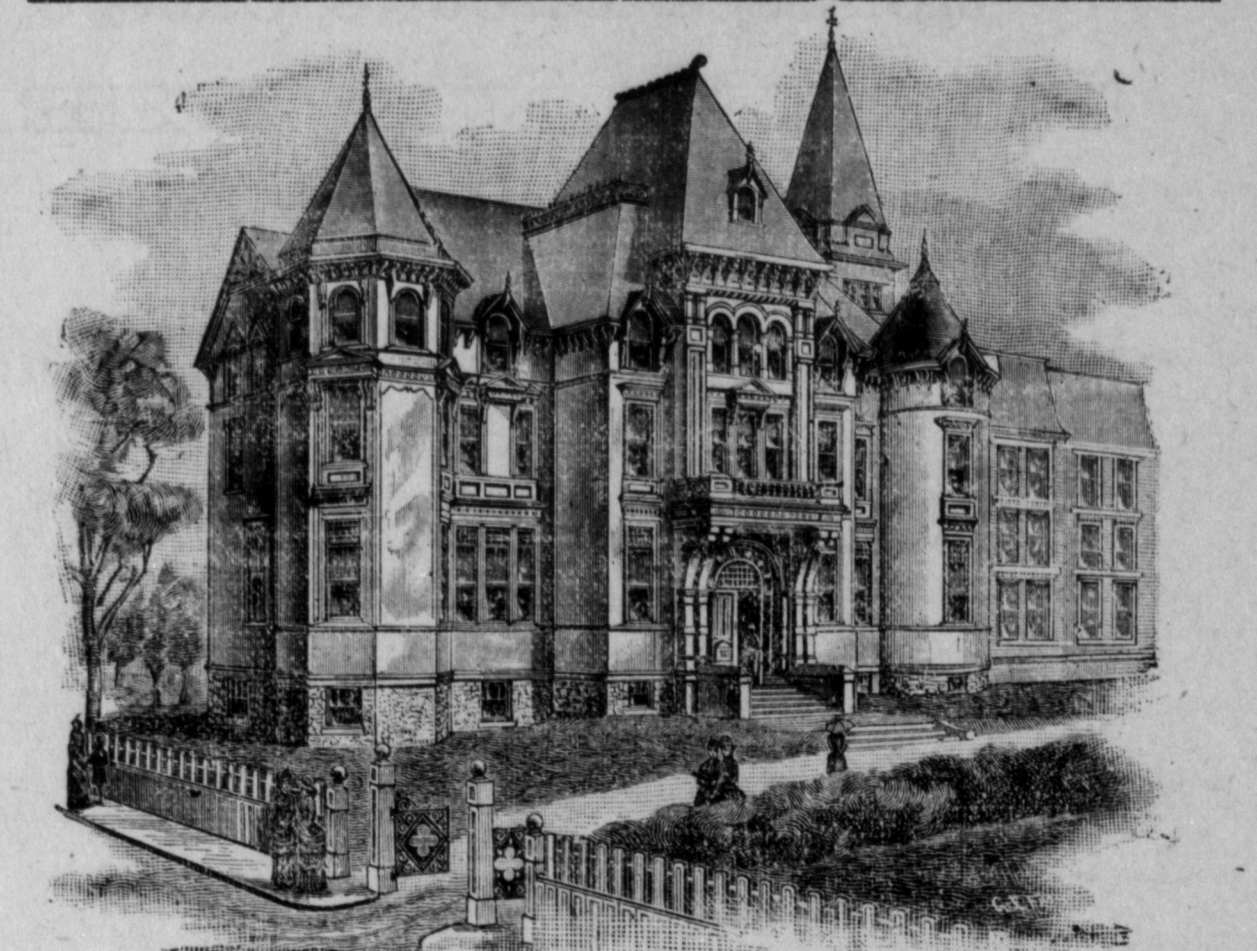
