Fires at Campbellton.

CAMPBELLTON, July 12.—A serious fire took place yesterday afternoon at the Indian Mission on the other side of the river. The pretty Catholic Church, the priest's house, Peter Grey's, and a house owned by Mr. O'Leary were entirely consumed. The fire started in or near the church, from what cause cannot be found out at present. A strong westerly gale was blowing which fanned the flames and sent the sparks all over the village. The men were all away from home working in the woods and the women had to battle with the flames. Very little furniture from the house and church was saved. Upon the fire being discovered word was sent over to Campbellton for the fire engine and it was taken down to the ferry wharf when Mayor Alexander forbid them to take it over in case of fire here. While debating the question the cry of fire was heard and fire was discovered in Joseph Michaud's house, within a few hundred yards of the ferry wharf. That put a stop to sending the engine over. Water was soon pouring on the house and the furniture taken out. A spark from Shives' mill fell on some sawdust which was around the house. The fire burned through into the cellar and up between the walls, which made it very hard to locate. After cutting up the floor in several places the fire was found and quickly put out, not, however, before the house had been flooded with water and badly cut up. Mr. Michaud and family are away at Nouvelle and a woman was keeping house, but had gone out to watch the fire at the Mission. Mr. Michaud was insured for \$550.

Twelve Thousand Idle Men.

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 20.—There is widespread and general suffering in the several established iron ranges of the Lake Superior district. It is the worse since the black days of 1872. There is scarcely a mine on the Marquette Menominee or Gogebic ranges that is not either completely closed or greatly curtailed in operation. Miners have been thrown out of work for the past three weeks, and now the number of idle men in these ranges is at least 8,000 greater than it was less than a month ago. This tremendous non-employed force decreases in like ratio the business of the railways in that section, and also of the stores and dependent industries. It is probable 12,000 men in the upper peninsula of Michigan and northern Wisconsin are to-day out of work by reason of the closing of these mines. Miners, in many instances, were the sole support of whole towns. There is no other possible source of income, agricultural and manufacturing being practically unknown.

Most of these mines that have suspended operations are still shipping the ore that they mined and put on stock piles. Some few are continuing mining operations with day shifts. Some, however, are so completely shut down that the pumps have been taken out and the mines will be allowed to fill with water.

Exterminate the Potato Bug.

The bugs should be more thoroughly exterminated. Many farmers do not attend to this and others only in part. The result is the pests spread all over the country and eat all they want. The tubers can only grow through the leaves; when the supply is devoured by these bugs the crops must suffer. The result is, we seldom see the fine, large, dry potatoes that formerly were so plentiful all over the dominion. Every farmer should make an effort to clean his crop of these gluttons, and if all would do this the improvement in the crop would repay them for the labor. The cost of the small quantity of Paris green required is very little, so the labor is nearly all that can be counted. And here we may remark that usually far too much of the poison is used. The smallest quantity that can be applied is sufficient to kill the bugs. One pound of Paris green to eighty or one hundred gallons of water is sufficient, provided it is properly applied, which should be done as often as required to kill all. It is a great loss to the country to allow such a valuable crop to be destroyed, when a moderate amount of labor and cost would save it.
