THE BUCTOUCHE RAILWAY BRIDGE.—A correspondent writes from Buctouche: The government engineer should take a look over the Buctouche and Moncton Railway bridge, at Buctouche as it is far from safe. Report says they will quit running trains over it in a few days, and stop on the other side.

SHIPMENTS TO THE WEST INDIES.—Mr. R. C. Tait of Shediac, last week made a large shipment of farm produce to the British West Indies. Last fall Councillor Simon Bourgeois, of Cocagne, shipped 150 barrels of potatoes to the same place. The returns received by Mr. Bourgeois were highly satisfactory, and several of our local buyers are talking of engaging in the potato trade with the West Indies next season.

BANQUET TO MR. GOGAIN, M. P. P.—The friends of Mr. John E. Gogain, M. P. P., in Dundas intend giving him a banquet at the Bay View Hotel, Cocagne, on the evening of the 6th instant, on the eve of his departure for Fredericton to attend the session of the local legislature. Councillor Simeon Bourgeois is chairman of the committee appointed for the purpose, and Mr. Louis L. Legere secretary. More than one hundred invitations have been issued. Mr. Gogain is deservedly popular in his own parish.

HORSE RACES AT BUCTOUCHE.—The horse races advertised to take place on the ice at Buctouche on Wednesday, the 8th inst, are engaging the attention of some of our sportsmen, and no doubt several of the Richibucto and Kingston flyers will be entered. The first race will be a free-to-all, open to all trotting or pacing horses owned in the counties of Kent and Westmorland; purse \$75.00; heats, best two in three. The second will be a gentlemen's driving race open to all horses owned in the parishes of Wellington and St. Mary, for a purse of \$24.00; R. A. Irving, secretary and treasurer. Arrangements have been made to put the course in perfect condition for trotting, and a good race may be expected.

CLAIM AGAINST THE MUNICIPALITY.—Warden Bernhard was in town Monday consulting with R. Hutchinson, Esq., clerk of the peace. It appears that Dr. J. A. Leger, of Shediac, performed some services for the Board of Health of this county at the request of the late Dr. E. H. Legere, then chairman of the board, and rendered his bill for the same at the last July session of the Council. The bill was referred to last January session, but the matter was not brought up in January. Dr. Leger has now instructed his attorney, Mr. W. A. Russel, to bring suit for the amount against the municipality. Mr. Hutchinson has written, asking Dr. Leger to let the matter stand until next July, when the Council will have an opportunity of inquiring into the bill.

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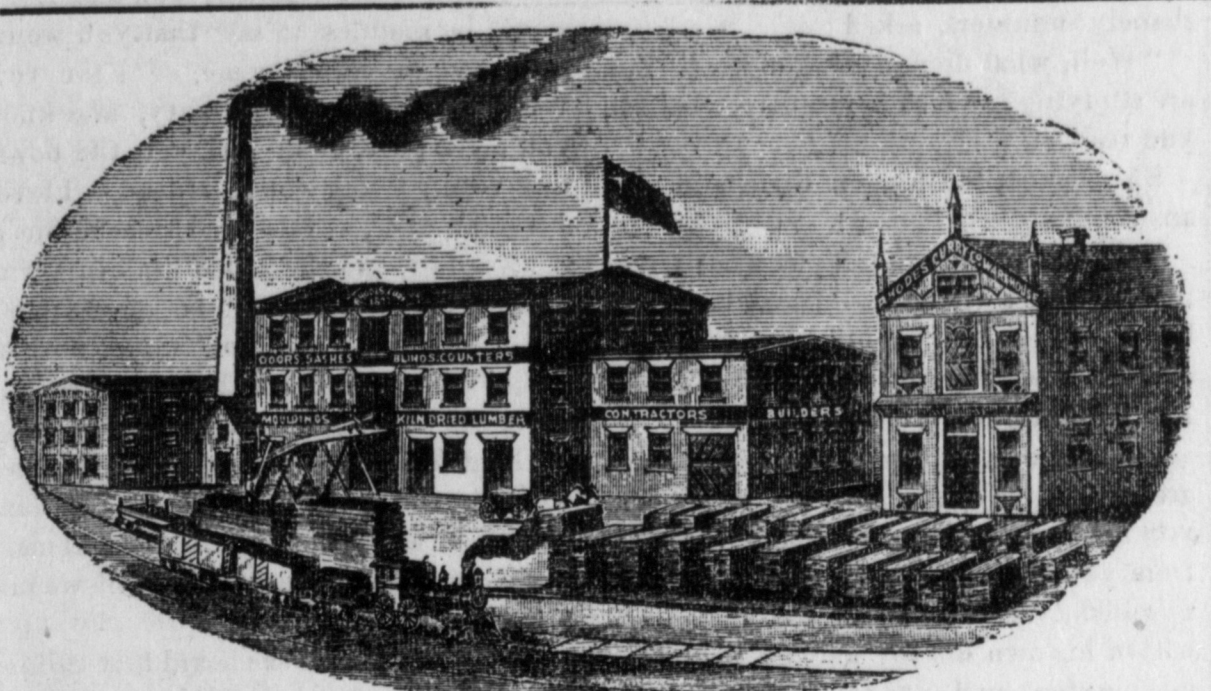

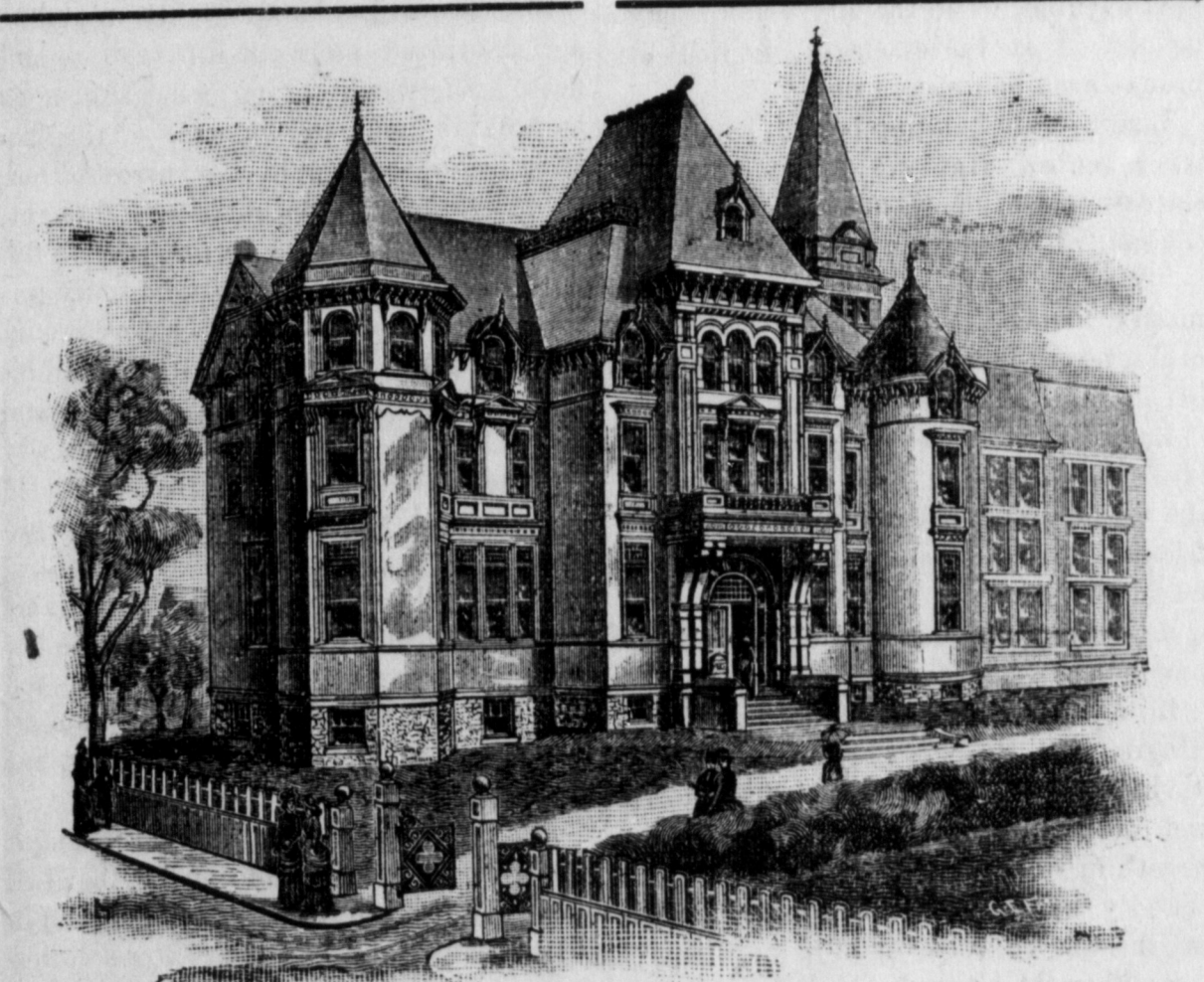
