## Parliament.

OTTAWA, Feb. 21.—As soon as the House opened this afternoon, Dutton McCarthy presented about a trunkful of petitions signed by several thousand members of the Patrons of Industry, etc., in favor of land twine, free oil, etc.

Dr. Bergeon presented the petition of the Catholic Mutual Benevolent Association for incorporation, and other members presented divers and sundry petitions against the admission of the H. A. H. Club.

Mr. Belley of Moncton and Dr. Spence continued the budget debate at 4 o'clock.

Mr. McMillan of Huron resumed the debate after recess.

Dr. Bergeon followed Mr. McMillan and Tarte had the floor at midnight. Tarte closed a little after midnight. Smith moved the adjournment of the debate. The House then rose.

OTTAWA, Feb. 22.—An impression that the session will close in four weeks was fading away. Over a week has been wasted in mere idle talk, and the House is of eloquence are still wide open.

After a vote is reached in Mr. Laurier's amendment and the motion to go into committee of ways and means there is likely to follow a long debate on Dutton McCarthy's resolution in favor of preferential trade arrangements with the mother land; and that in turn will be succeeded by Tarte's resolution on the Manitoba school question about which several French members desire to talk to their constituents.

The House today is practically deserted but as the speakers are talking to the country and not to their associates they do not mind the empty benches in front of them.

Smith of South Ontario, Charlton, and Wilson of Lennox, spoke on the budget debate.

The debate was continued till midnight the chief incident being the speech of Calvin of Frontenac, Conservative, who stated that he would vote for Cartwright's amendment.

Weldon of Albert has given notice that he will ask for the production of all correspondence in possession of the Govt. relating to the disallowance of the Nova Scotia Mining Act in answer to the petition of McKee, M. P., and others relating to this subject.

OTTAWA, Feb. 23.—The budget debate, which has been exceptionally dull for many days, took on a more robust tone this afternoon, when Davies, of P. E. Island, who leads the little band of Liberals from the Maritime Provinces, let fly his most fiery darts at the conservative party, the policy of protection and the conduct of the government, the Finance Minister being the special object of his attack.

Davies spoke at the outset from the anti confederation standpoint and intimated that the Maritime provinces were really responsible for the N. P. and that they were now working out a righteous retribution. He said the people were fleeing from the provinces by the sea to the United States. He charged the government with having rendered reciprocity with the United States an impossibility for years to come. Cockburn followed Davies.

The House sat till after midnight when the budget debate was stood over till next week. Supplementary estimates will be considered tomorrow.

OTTAWA, Feb. 24.—The House spent the greater part of this afternoon and evening in committee of supply, considering the supplementary estimates.

Only one division was forced and that was on the item to reimburse Judge Wilkinson of Northumberland, for posting electoral lists, which was carried 42 to 15.

Kenney, of Halifax, brought up the inefficient manner in which the Allan Line was performing the Atlantic mail service, instancing the recent trip of the Moravian between Liverpool and Halifax, in which the steamer averaged but 7 1/2 miles an hour. In advocating an ocean mail service creditable to Canada, Kenney presented Halifax as the best terminal port in the Dominion.

Hazen advocated St. John's claims and advantages, and other members put in pleas for Louisburg, St. Andrews and Quebec. This debate was followed by an attack by Col. Prior on Hon. Mr. Tupper's conduct concerning a marine hospital dispute in Victoria, B. C.

The Premier defended the absent minister and assured Prior there must be some misunderstanding that he would try to clear up.

Sir John Thompson will leave for Paris on the 10th prox.

It is expected that the government will deal with the New Brunswick governorship matter to-morrow.

## Recipes.

OYSTERS ON TOAST.—Drain the liquor from a quart of oysters; cut each into four pieces, and strain through coarse muslin back into the sauce. When it boils again dip out a small cupful and keep it hot. Stir into that left on the range a liberal teaspoonful of butter rolled in a scant teaspoonful of cornstarch. In another vessel heat half a cupful of milk. Stir the oysters into the thickened liquor; season with pepper and salt, and cook, after they are scalding hot, five minutes before adding the milk. Line a hot platter with neat slices of crustless toast, buttered, wet with the reserved liquor, and cover with the oysters.

OATMEAL AND APPLE PUDDING.—Put in a saucepan one and a half pints of milk and bring it to a boil; then throw in gradually about half a cupful of oatmeal. Boil for fifteen or twenty minutes, then turn it into a bowl and add two teaspoonfuls (or about half a pint) of stewed and pulped apple or apple sauce, a teaspoonful of sugar, a flavoring of lemon and a couple of beaten eggs. Bake in a moderate oven until set. The whole should be like a thick batter before baking. It is rather difficult to give the exact quantity of oatmeal, but throw in enough to make a thin porridge.

GOLDEN CREAM CAKE.—Cream one cupful of sugar and one-fourth cupful of butter. Add one-half cupful of sweet milk, the well-beaten whites of eggs, one and one-half cupfuls of flour, through which has been sifted one and one-half teaspoonfuls of baking powder.

Cream for Cake.—Beat very light the yolks of two eggs, one cupful of sugar and two teaspoonfuls of rich sweet cream. Flavor with vanilla.

GEMS.—Try these and see how nicely they are. Three eggs, well beaten, two cups of milk, one teaspoonful baking powder and half that quantity of salt, two cups of flour. Sift the salt and baking powder in the flour, add the eggs slowly to the milk, then stir into the flour. Beat well; have gem pans ready heated and greased. Bake in rather quick oven.

LEMON CAKE.—Two cups of sugar, one of butter, four eggs, one cup of sweet milk, three cups of sifted flour two teaspoonfuls of baking powder and one of lemon extract. Cream the butter and sugar, add the well beaten yolks of the eggs, then alternately the flour (with the baking powder sifted through it) and the milk, lastly the essence. Beat well and bake in two layers. Beat stiff the remaining whites, add the juice of a small lemon and enough powdered sugar to make rather stiff icing, and spread on your cake.

TO SAVE DENTIST'S BILLS.—Do not forget in cleaning your teeth that the deposit of tartar more frequently forms on the inside. Save your old table napkins to polish the teeth. After using the brush, go over the teeth with the napkin, especially on the inside surface close to the gum. Occasionally clean both teeth and gums with common salt. ## How to Tell a Thief.

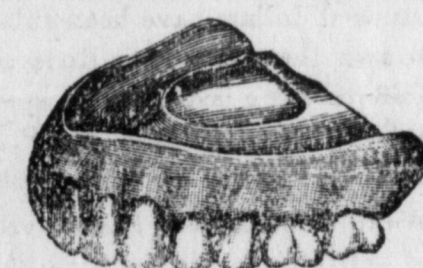

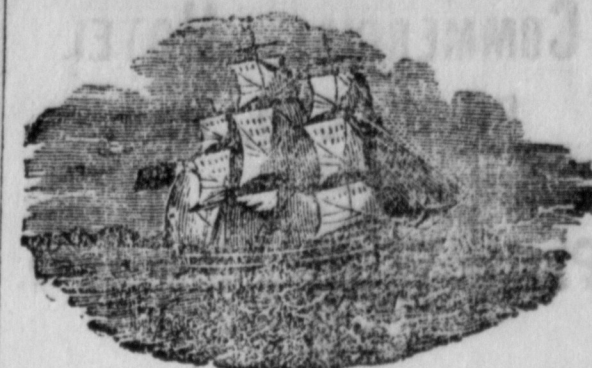

NOTICE is hereby given that the Moncton and Prince Edward Island Railway Company will apply to the Parliament of Canada at the next session thereof for an amendment to the Act incorporating said Company to the following effect: namely to increase the Capital Stock to \$1,000,000 and to give the Company power to issue Bonds to the extent of \$1,500,000, such Bonds to be issued on the Railway, Ferry, Boats and all the property of the Company if the Company see fit so to issue the same or \$1,000,000 of the Bonds may be issued on the Ferry, Boats and property connected with the Ferry and \$500,000 may be issued on the Railway of the Company as the Company may see fit.
