TROUT FISHING REGULATIONS.—His excellency, having in view the better protection of speckled trout in the province of New Brunswick, is pleased, under the provisions of section 16 of The Fisheries Act, chapter 95 of the revised statutes, and by and with the advice of the Queen's privy council for Canada, to order that section 11 (a) of the general fishery regulations for the province of New Brunswick, established by the order in council of the 18th of July, 1889, chapter 70 of the consolidated orders in council of Canada, in so far as it relates to speckled trout, shall be and the same is hereby rescinded, and the following substituted in lieu thereof :-

"In the province of New Brunswick, no one shall fish for, catch, kill, buy, sell er have in possession, any speckled trout (salvelinus fontinals) between the 15th days of September and the 31st day of March in each year, both days inclusive."




