Legislature of N. B.

FREDERICTON, March 18.—Hon. Mr. Mitchell made his motion referring the accounts and auditor general's report of last year to the public accounts committee. Carried.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell submitted the report of the medical superintendent of the lunatic asylum.

Hon. Mr. White introduced a bill relating to the N. B. Real Estate Association and to change the name of the N. B. Real Estate Loan and Trust Company. Adjournd.

FREDERICTON, March 20.—Hon. Mr. Mitchell submitted his bill providing for the redemption of debentures falling due in 1894, 1895, and 1896. Mr. Killam in the chair. Bill agreed to.

Hon. Mr. Blair introduced his bill providing for Boys' Industrial Home. Mr. Killam in the chair. Agreed to with amendments.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie introduced a bill further amending chapter 10 of Consolidated Statutes.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell committed a bill amending the St. Stephen incorporation amendment act. Mr. Lewis in the chair. Agreed to.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson committed a bill in addition to an amendment of Chapter 20 of Consolidated Statutes. Mr. Killam chairman.

After supper the bill was further considered and agreed to with amendments.

Hon. Mr. Mitchell committed a bill to encourage the development of nickel mines. Mr. Killam chairman. Agreed to with amendments.

Hon. Mr. White introduced a bill in addition to an amendment of Chapter 33 of the Consolidated Statutes relating to admission of Attorneys.

Mr. Powell introduced a bill amending Chapter 49 of the Consolidated Statutes.

Hon. Mr. Blair introduced a bill amending the law incorporating Owen's art gallery.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie introduced a bill to facilitate the transmission of timber down rivers, lakes and streams.

Hon. Mr. Blair introduced a bill to amend an act authorizing James E. Whittaker, trustee under the last will and testament of Charles Whittaker deceased to convey a certain lot of land on King street, St. John.

Adjournd. FREDERICTON, March 21.—Hon. Mr. Mitchell introduced a bill further amending the act amending chapter 63 relating to coroners' inquests.

Hon. Mr. Blair introduced a bill amending the public health bill of 1890.

Hon. Mr. White from corporation committee submitted a report.

Mr. Phinney gave notice of motion for a detailed expenditure on the Kouchibouguac and Millstream bridges as given in auditor's report.

Adjournd. FREDERICTON, March 22.—Hon. Mr. Tweedie introduced a bill to further amend the general mining act. Also a bill amending the act authorizing the municipality of Northumberland to lease by public auction the Chatham public wharf.

Hon. Mr. Blair presented a bill to provide for the maintenance of a boys' industrial home.

Mr. Pitts gave notice of a motion for Monday next that a committee of seven members be appointed to whom should be referred the petition of Henry Chesnut, Wm. Lemont, J. A. Vanwart, and 113 other ratepayers of York praying that such orders and regulations may be recommended as will carry out the purposes of our free school law; that all regulations contrary thereto may be rescinded and that the administration of law may place all on a footing of equality, with power to send for persons and papers and examine witnesses and with instructions to report to the House all evidence taken before them and all proceedings of said committee.

Mr. O'Brien committed a bill, Allen in the chair, in amendment of chapter 99 of Municipalities (non-resident peddlars) after a long discussion the bill was thrown out on division.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie committed a bill to facilitate the transmission of timber down rivers, lakes and streams. Wells chairman. Agreed to.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson introduced a bill to change the time of holding the sittings of certain county courts.

Mr. Killam introduced a bill to provide for supplying the City of Moncton with water.

Mr. Alward introduced a bill in addition to the act authorizing assessment in the city of St. John in aid of the free public library. Also a bill relating to the Consolidated Electric Company (Limited).

Mr. Gogain gave notice of inquiry for Saturday next as to whether it was the intention of the government to rebuild the Cocagne bridge during the present year.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson committed a bill—Flewellling in the chair—in amendment of the act relating to the education of the blind. Bill agreed to.

Mr. Powell introduced a bill relating to sittings of the circuit and county courts of Westmorland.

Mr. Powell introduced a bill making the city of Moncton liable for expenses of the imprisonment of certain persons convicted of summary offences.

Mr. Wells introduced a bill for establishing and maintaining a police force for

the City of Moncton. Also a bill amending the acts incorporating or relating to the town of Moncton.

Adjournd. FREDERICTON, March 23.—The house went into committee on further consideration of ways and means, Killam in the chair.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie seconded by Hon. Mr. Mitchell, moved that the committee proceed to the consideration of the report of the lumber commission submitted to the house last session.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie moved, seconded by Hon. Mr. Mitchell, a resolution that it is expedient that the leases to be granted for timber crown lands of the province after the expiration of the present leases, shall contain a condition among others that the Lieut. Governor-in-council may increase the rate of stumpage and mileage upon land held under lease at any time or from time to time during the continuance thereof. Carried without division.

Moved by Hon. Mr. Tweedie, seconded by Hon. Mr. Mitchell, resolved that after the expiration of the present leases of timber crown lands, the leases be offered at public competition upon the condition that the same shall be renewable annually at the pleasure of the Lieutenant-governor-in-council and for a term not exceeding — years.

Hon. Mr. Tweedie, seconded by Hon. Mr. Mitchell, moved that the blank be filled with "twenty-five."

Mr. Powell, seconded by Mr. Stockton, moved that it be filled by "ten."

After a debate lasting until midnight Mr. Powell's motion was lost on the following division:

Nays—Blair, Mitchell, Emmerson, White, Tweedie, Labilloy, Connell, Gogain, Lewis, Russell, Theriault, Blanchard, Sivewright, Smith (Westmorland), Flewellling, Scovill, O'Brien (Charlotte), Baird, Diblee, Robinson, Dunn, McLeod, Wells, Ferris, O'Brien (Northumberland)—25.

The original motion carried on a reverse vote.

Adjournd. FREDERICTON, March 24.—Mr. Stockton moved seconded by Mr. Phinney:

Resolved that in the opinion of this house it is desirable that legislation should be had so that no bond, covenant, or other security made or entered into after the passing thereof by any person to Her Majesty, her heirs or successors, or any person on behalf of or in trust for Her Majesty, her heirs or successors as represented by the government of this province or any department thereof, shall bind the real or personal property of such persons or persons so making and entering into such bond, covenant or other security, to any further, other or greater extent than if such bond, covenant or other security, had been made or entered into between subject and subject of Her Majesty, and also so that the real or personal property of any debtor to Her Majesty heirs or successors, or any person or persons in trust for or on behalf of Her Majesty, her heirs or successors as represented by the Government of the province or any department thereof for any debt thereafter contracted shall be bound only to the same expense and in the same manner as the real or personal property of any debtor when a debt is due from one subject of her Majesty to another.

Hon. Mr. White moved, seconded by Mr. Flewellling, that the question be not now put, which was carried on the following division:
