Mr. Wallace Steeves, of Lower Cover dale, Albert Co., while cutting the boughs from a tree, fell, striking his head against a small stump. When found, he was lying dead with his head crushed in where it had come in contact with the stump.

Fredericton Gleaner: Reports from the Northwest Miramichi are to the effec that there has not been nearly so much lumber cut there this winter as last owing to the lack of snow and the consequen improbability of getting any large quantity out of the streams.

The Detroit Free Press has been inform ed that one of the queerest railroads on this continent is the Salisbury & Harvey, in New Brunswick. It is but 20 miles long, and, although it connects with the Intercolonial road, an admirably constructed line, it is confessedly unsafe. A printed notice hung up in the cars cautions passengers that it is well to get out and walk on reaching a certain bridge, and it was long the custom to push the cars over this crazy structure before the mighty engine was trusted upon its rotting timbers

By the discharge of a gun in the hands of some unknown person last Monday morning at Osborne Corner, Albert Co. about seven miles from Hillsboro, two boys were shot, one being a son of John Osborne, the other Henry Shaw, both of Osborne Corner. The two boys were at school and during the morning intermission went into a piece of wood in the rear of the school house, where they received the shot, but by whom or how they cannot tell, as they did not see any one around. The Shaw boy had one of his ears pierced by the shot, but with the Osborne boy the case is very serious, and may prove fatal.

The Supreme Court delivered judgment to-day on the writ of error in the Welton-Randall conspiracy case. Justices Hanington and King did not hear the argument and took no part. The Chief Justice and Justices Palmer, Fraser and Tuck had lengthy written judgments, the reading of which occupied from eleven until two o, clock. Justices Tuck and Palmer went for reversing the judgment of the St. John County Court and quashing the conviction taking the ground that the companies alleged to have been defrauded—the Total Abstinence and Golden Rule Alliancewere doing business illegally in Canada and there could be no conspiracy to defraud an illegal transaction. The Chief Justice and Justice Fraser took the opposite view on the point, but were in favor of a new trial, on the ground of improper admission and rejection of evidence and misdirection of the trial judge. The court being thus divided, Justice Tuck withdrew his judgment, so that the judgment of the court is for a new trial.





The town of Tapelo, Miss., was destroy ed by a severe storm Thursday. The little town of Velly, 15 miles from Memphis, on the Memphis & Birmingham railway, was wijed out during the same storm. No lives were lost.

The trial of Edward Samuel Wesley DeCobain, formerley Conservative mem per of parliament for east division of Belfast, took place here last week. DeCobain was charged with unnatural crimes. He was convicted and sentenced to a year at and labor.

M. Alexejeff, mayor of this city, was hot last week at a meeting of the City Council and died shortly afterwards. Adrianeff, the murderer, refuses to make a statement as to his reason for shooting. The police are firm in the belief that the crime is the outcome of a Nihilist plot.

A great whiskey war is on in Osage county. The people are up in arms against he Kansas city houses that are running joints in several towns. At O-age City on Sunday a carload of liquor was seized and destroyed in the presence of a large hrong. The State Temperance Union will wage a vigorous war on "joints" all ver the State.

The court of arbitration appointed to adjust the Behring Sea seal fisheries distute met on Thursday in Paris. The meeting was formal, credentials being presented, and was organized by the election of Baron de Courcelles as president. The court adjourned till April 4th to examinthe arguments of the United States and Great Britain.

Because of the great number of young men leaving Ontario for the United States the customs officials at Cape Vincent, N. Y., have had a spotter ascertaining whether the alien act was being infringed on. Several young men, after arriving at the Cape, were sent back, as it was discovered hey had secured positions in cities in the United States.

Madame Fortin, arrested some time ago charged with poisoning her husband, has been liberated, the analysis of the contents of the deceased's stomach having shown no trace of poison. The medical men, in fact, said Fortin had died of inflammation of the lungs. The widow will now have her innings and declares she will get even with those who caused her arrest.

A fearful blizzard visited St. Johns, Newfoundland, on the 19th inst. It was the worst experienced in twelve years. The streets were snowed under to the extent of three feet. In the country the snow is ten feet deep in places. All railway lines are blocked. At Salmon five men were drowned by the swamping of a herring skiff. It is feared that other disasters have occurred.

A cablegram from London to the New York Evening Post, says the Ulster agitation is assuming the form of calling seriously for intervention of the government. The secretary of committee issued a manifesto from Belfast summoning the Royal Irish constabulary to attend the conference whereat they may arrange to organize themselves despite all rules of service to the contrary. The manifesto adds those punished for partaking in the movement will receive a cash indemnity.

A fire occurred at Hastings, eight miles But bear in mind ye sorrowing friends, from Amherst, in a dwelling occupied by Charles Travis, a prominent farmer. The flames spread to the barns and outbuildings in which was stored a large quantity of hay, grain, farming utensils and stock. Everything was completely destroyed, Cyrus Travis, a brother of Charles, went into the barn to save three horses. He was overcome by the smoke in the barn and perished in the flames. His charred remains were found in the debris. The deceased was 60 years old and married but had no children.

Mr. Alexander Belliveau, of Lower Town, Ottawa, has received information from Michigan that his son was eaten by wolves a few days ago. The unfortunate young man was foreman of a gang working on the construction of a railway in the northern part of the state. He and a friend while out hunting were attacked by a band of wolves, and although they discharged their rifles into the pack the wolves overpowered them. Belliveau's companion climbed a tree to escape them, and from there he saw his companion torn to pieces by wolves at the foot of the tree on which he was perched.
