RICHIBUCTO, N. B., FEB. 23, 1893 THE IRISH HOME RULE BILL. The Home Rule Bill introduced in the British House of Commons by Mr. Gladstone last week differs materially from the alleged draft of it published a few weeks ago. The composition of the Irish legislature, for instance, differs in some essential features from that proposed by the bill of 1886. The present bill provides for two branches, a legislative council, consisting of 48 members, elected for a term of eight years, and a legislative assembly of 103 members, elected for a term of five years by the present constituencies. It is further provided that the legislative councillors. are to be chosen by electors, possessing a high property qualification, and that in case of a deadlock between the two branches of the legislature the two bodies are to meet in joint session and the pas sage or rejection of a measure is to be decided by a majority of their joint votes. All money bills must originate in the popular branch of the legislature, and to this body the executive council must be responsible. The jurisdiction of the Irish parliament is intended to cover all Irish affairs. Imperial affairs are defined in the bill, and are, of course, to remain under the jurisdiction of the imperial parliament. The imperial parliament will regulate the customs and excise duties and post office matters, but all the revenue so collected will be turned over to the Irish government. Restrictions are also provided to secure religious freedom, to protect public education and to assure personal liberty. Appointments to the Irish judiciary and constabulary are to be made by the imperial authorities for a period of six years longer, after which time that power will be handed over to the Irish parliament. As regards Ireland's representation in the Commons, it is provided that the number be reduced from 103, the present number, to 80, to correspond to the proportion of the Irish population. The Irish members are not to vote on matters expressly relating to Great Britain, nor on taxes other than those levied on Ireland, nor on the appropriation of money for other than imperial services. The bill has been accepted by both factions of the Irish Nationalists as "a satisfactory scheme of Irish National self government," and as the Liberal party appears to be satisfied with the measure there is every prospect that it will pass the Commons. It is equally certain that the Lords will reject it. What course Mr. Gladstone will then pursue is, of course, a matter of doubt. It is said the Radical wing of the Liberal party
