

LOCAL NEWS

DISTRIBUTING BOUNTY CHECKS.—Fishery Inspector Chapman is busy distributing some 1,200 bounty checks to the fishermen in his district, which includes Westmorland and the north shore counties.—Times.

BUCTOUCHE BRIDGE.—Repairs had been begun on the part of the Buctouche bridge destroyed by fire last September, and the work is being pushed forward rapidly. More than fifty teams were engaged in hauling stones last week, a number of men were also at work with shovels.

Ex parte Lowery—Gregory, Q. C., shows cause against a rule nisi to quash conviction under Seaman's act; Phinney, Q. C., contra; court considers.

Placide Richard vs. Docithee Casey—Phinney, Q. C., moves for a new trial; Gregory, Q. C., contra. Verdict set aside and new trial ordered.

THE STORM.—The storm on Monday was the most severe that has been experienced here this winter. Snow began falling at an early hour and continued steadily and very fast until evening. Altogether about five inches of snow fell. The drifting continued all day Tuesday. The roads in some places are badly filled in, but on the ice between here and Kingston the travelling is good.

LUMBER OPERATIONS.—Government scaler, John Stevenson, returned Saturday from a trip through the county. He reports that large quantities of pulp-wood have been got out along the I. C. R. in this county for shipment to the United States. Scarcity of snow has been a great drawback to lumbermen, and it is feared that much of the lumber yarded, will not be got out this season. In some districts, lumbermen are thinking seriously of bringing their teams out of the woods. The snow which fell Monday will help them out to a certain extent.

ANOTHER MAN WITH OYSTERS.—The Chatham World in referring to the reversal of the decision of the fisheries department, regarding the removal of Mr. Barnes' oysters says:—The refusal was an idiotic piece of official and officious interference. Why shouldn't any man take up whenever he will, the oysters he has out in the water? To found this with oyster fishing is a fair sample of official stupidity. Mr. Hatton was refused the privilege of taking up his oysters. We wonder if he has been placed on an equality with Mr. Barnes, or if he is still under the ban.

SMELT SEASON CLOSED.—The smelt fishing season which closed last week has been a very profitable one to the fishermen and fish-dealers of this county. The weather continued hard through the entire season and no losses occurred through soft weather. Between 500 and 600 tons were shipped from here. About 200 tons from Buctouche, and over 100 tons from Cocagne. This simply means that the county is richer to the extent of \$75,000 than it was last fall. The smelt houses have been moved off the ice and the harbor wears a deserted appearance.

THE STORER-ROBERTSON SUIT SETTLED.—A large number of persons assembled in front of the Court House at 12 o'clock Tuesday to attend the equity sale in the Storer-Robertson suit. H. H. James, the receiver, announced a postponement of the sale until three o'clock in the afternoon. In the meantime the parties arrived at a settlement of the case and at three o'clock the receiver announced a further postponement for a fortnight to allow the parties to perfect their settlement. By the terms of settlement Mr. Robertson gets control of the entire business.

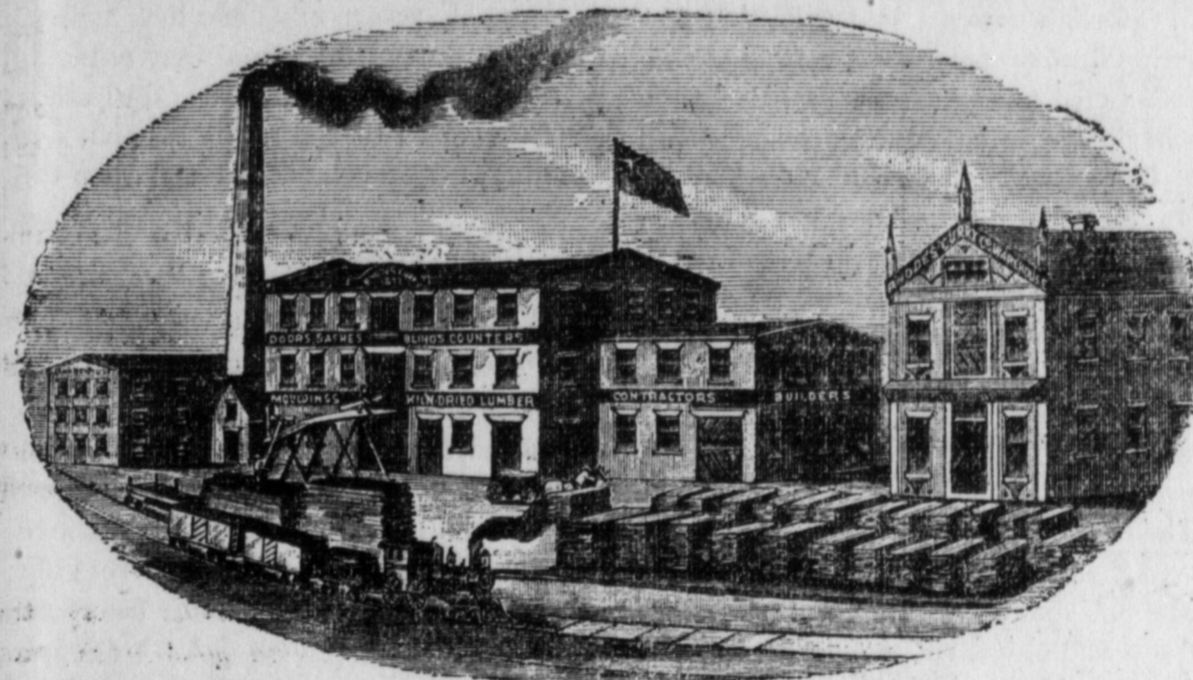
