Charlo Notes.

A large crop of potatoes was dug last fall in the county of Restigouche. Before the season closed large quantities were exported, chiefly to the upper provinces and to the United States. Potatoes are now in demand and as soon as the weather permits several shipments will be made. Prices are likely to be high.

The firm of Hayes, Gray & Co. have been manufacturing large quantities of cedar shingles in their mill situated at the mouth of the river Charlo. The partnership has been recently dissolved; Mr. Hayes having retired, to the deep regret of the people of this vicinity. The firm will hereafter do business under the style Gray & Co.

Many of the portable shingle mills around here are running night and day. A good price for shingles is expected when the season opens. Mr. Samuel Laughlan, of Black Point, and Mr. John Culligan, of Jacquet River, and others are doing an extensive business.

An extensive lumber and fishing business is being done on the Baie Chaleur this season.

When the spring opens hundreds will be employed in the various mills.

The smelt industry was never so profitable as it is in the county of Restigouche this season. Those who were prepared for fishing have been doing well. Others are actively preparing to share in the spoil.

Parliament. (Continued from Page 5.) OTTAWA, Feb. 20.—Hon. Mr. Ouimet laid on the table the annual report of the public works department.

In reply to a question, Hon. Mr. Foster said the government was not yet prepared to give particulars of the treaty signed with France.

Hon. Mr. Ouimet said the copper work on the roof of the St. John custom house was being done under the supervision of Mr. Adams of the public works department by day's work; that the successful tenderer did not proceed with the work, and that the copper required was furnished by W. H. Thorne & Co. at 14 cents per pound for the original quantity and at 15 cents for additional copper.

The balance of the afternoon was taken up with a continuation of the budget debate.

The budget debate was continued to-night by Mr. McDonald, of Huron; McLellan, of Glengarry; Devlin, Craig and Choquette.

Mr. Belley, of Chicoutimi, moved the adjournment of the debate.

The company have a very promising business and have declared a dividend on their first year's operations, which is highly satisfactory to the shareholders. To Test the Purity of Water. Test for Lime.—Into a glass of water put two drops of oxalic acid and blow upon it. If it gets milky, lime is present.

Test for Hard or Soft Water.—Dissolve a small quantity of good soap in alcohol. Let a few drops fall into a glass of water. If it turns milky, it is hard; if not, it is soft.

Tests for Iron.—Boil a little nut-gall and add to the water. If it turns grey or lake, black iron is present. 2. Dissolve a little prussiate of potash, and if iron is present it will turn blue.

Test for Acid.—Take a piece of litmus paper. If it turns red, there must be acid. If its precipitates on adding lime water it is carbonic acid. If a blue sugar paper is turned red it is a mineral acid.

Test for Carbonic Acid.—Take equal parts of water and clear lime water. If combined or free carbonic acid is present, a precipitate is seen, to which, if a few drops of muriatic acid be added, an effervescence commences.

Test for Magnesia.—Boil the water to a twentieth part of its weight, and then drop a few grains of neutral carbonate of ammonia into a glass of it, and a few drops

of phosphate of soda. If magnesia be present it will fall to the bottom.

Test for Earthy Matters or Alkali.—Take litmus paper dipped in vinegar, and if on immersion the paper returns to its true shade the water does not contain earthy matter or alkali. If a few drops of syrup be added to a water containing an earthy matter it will turn green.

Hanged Though Innocent. The most sensational judicial murder of this century was the execution of Eliza Fanning, in her time one of the most beautiful women of London. She was scarcely eighteen when charged with poisoning the family in which she was a governess. It was proven conclusively that she herself had become ill from eating the poisoned food. Her innocence was established at the trial, but the recorder before whom the case was heard conceived so great a prejudice that in his final charge he passed only upon the evidence against her. She was executed, and as she stood robed in white on the scaffold between two old offenders who were suffering a like penalty, she cried: "Before the just and Almighty God, and by the faith of the holy sacrament I have received, I am innocent of the offense of which I am charged."

Before the funeral it was discovered that the poison was in all likelihood administered by a maniac who had been sheltered in the house at the time of the poisoning. Ten thousand persons attacked the house of the prosecuting lawyer, and only a large military force prevented death and destruction by the infuriated mob. On the day of the funeral half of London appeared on the streets through which the cortage passed, and only the presence of troops prevented another riot.

Rough on the Parson. When a stranger makes his appearance in the backwoods of Maine he is naturally presumed to be on the lookout for game. Last summer a distinguished prelate of the Episcopal Church found himself stranded in a small village in that region, and was compelled to put up at a farmhouse. "Do you have many Episcopalians down here?" he enquired of a very hospitable hostess. "Well, really now, I don't know," she answered. "Our hired man shot some sort of a queer critter down back of the barn the other day, but he claimed it was a woodchuck."

A Great Season for Maple Sugar. "Unless I am greatly mistaken," said Loren Cushman the other day, "the coming spring will be a great season for maple sugar making. It is well known to those who have engaged in that business that a good season always follows a winter that furnishes abundance of cold weather. The maple sap is always sweeter after a period of intense frost, and furnishes a larger percentage of sugar. Not only that but the trees yield a larger quantity of sap after a cold winter than after a winter that has frequent thaws and periods of
