PARTY POLITICS.

Under the parliamentary system prevailing in Canada, in common with other countries under like constitutional usage, government by party is a necessary feature. While it has its advantages, and may tend in the absence of any better system, to give stability and strength to the administration of the day, and establish confidence in the policy of the country for the time being, it undoubtedly has its drawbacks and disadvantages, especially when, as is too frequently the case, the desire to hold or obtain a party advantage leads to the rejection of proposition emanating from political opponents, which under other circumstances would commend themselves to all as being in the general interest.

During the present session of the Legislature at Fredericton two such incidents have occurred. The first was in connection with the resolution moved by Mr. Phinney to refer to the Committee on Privileges and Elections, the petition of Dr. Atkinson, of Carleton, in which he alleged that through the gross misconduct of the sheriff of that county he had been deprived of the seat in the Assembly to which he had been undoubtedly elected. To any fair-minded unprejudiced person this would appear to be a reasonable proposition, even if it had not been well established by numerous precedents in the British as well as in the Canadian Parliament and our Provincial Legislature, that a reference to and enquiry by the committee into the alleged circumstances was the proper and constitutional course. Nevertheless we find that the leader of the House, Mr. Blair, ignoring the well established practice in such cases and disregarding what it is reported, was well known in the Assembly to be the wish of a considerable number of his supporters, called upon his followers to vote down the resolution; not because it was wrong in itself, but because it might result in a fair-play to a political opponent whose presence in the House he feared, and because it had emanated from a member of the opposition.

The next incident arose in connection with the resolution moved by Mr. Stoefton which enunciated the undoubtedly correct proposition that the Crown, or the Executive Government, should not be entitled to any advantage over the citizen in the collection of debts; that in the event of a failure such as that of the Maritime Bank where the government and private parties had money on deposit, the government should not be privileged to come in, demand and receive payment in full while the individual lost everything. In this instance also, it is said, a large majority of the more independent members of the House favored the proposition of the leader of the opposition, but Mr. Blair's jealous and spiteful disposition again controlled him and again under the snap of the party whip, the resolution was voted down.

Mr. Hill, of Charlotte, who is recognized as one of the best informed and fairest-minded men in the House, and who endeavors to treat all questions from an independent standpoint, on both occasions spoke strongly in favor of and voted for the resolutions. His course will, no doubt, meet with the approval of all unprejudiced persons.

On the other hand the narrow and unstatesmanlike course pursued by Mr. Blair must necessarily tend to discredit him in the House and in the country, and to confirm the opinion entertained by many who have watched his course that he regards all public questions from a selfish standpoint. Such conduct if persisted in must necessarily bring upon him the condemnation of all fair-minded men in the Legislature as well as in the country.

A REDUCTION NEEDED.

It is to be regretted that the measure introduced by Mr. Charlton in the Commons to reduce the rates of letter postage was not introduced earlier in the session. As there did not appear to be the slightest chance of passing the measure at that late day, the discussion excited little interest and a very few of the members took part in the debate. Sir Adolphe Caron in a brief speech declared that he was opposed to the measure. He did not think the revenue would suffice for the postal service if the rate were reduced unless the postage were reimposed upon newspapers, or the extent of the service curtailed. If the postmaster-general had taken the trouble to glance over the postal returns of England and the United States he would have seen that a reduction in the rates of

postage did not necessarily mean a reduction in the amount of postal revenue. When through the efforts of Rowland Hill "penny postage" was adopted in England, it was found that the large increase in the number of letters mailed more than met the loss occasioned by the reduction in the postage. In 1834 the United States reduced the rate of postage from three to two cents per ounce, and within five years the annual postal revenue increased over fifty per cent. Would it not be well to try the experiment in Canada.

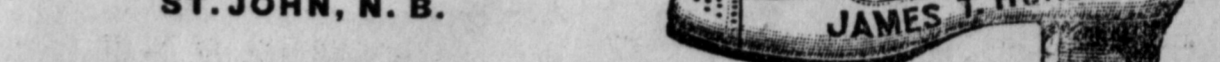

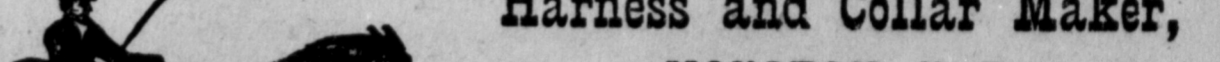
