A CONVERT TO MOHAMMEDISM.

Alexander P. Webb, the American convert to the Islamite faith, has arrived in New York, and entered upon the work of introducing the doctrines of Mohammed in America. Mr. Webb was born in the United States, and was engaged in journalism there for some years. He was appointed American Consul to an East Indian port, and while there began a study of the Koran and the doctrines of Mohammed, and finally embraced the faith. He has been interviewed by some of the leading New York journals, and is loud in the praise of his adopted religion, and equally severe on the teachings of the Bible. He announces that he is well supplied with Mohammedan gold and will use it in spreading the doctrines of Mohammed on this side of the Atlantic. He admits that the introduction of polygamy into the United States at the present time would bring about evil results, but he believes that the system would be a great blessing "when America becomes moral enough to be able to use the privilege wisely." Christianity, he contends, is indebted for the progress it has made to the energy and enterprise of the Anglo-Saxon race. Islam has not had these advantages, but, nevertheless, has made great progress in the east. Referring to the difference between the teachings of the Bible and those of the Koran he says:

"If you take away from Christianity the ideas of the Trinity, the immaculate conception, and the vicarious atonement, you will have left practically what Mohammed taught, with the point in favor of Islam of a much more thorough and perfect system of spiritual development. Mohammed recognized Christ as a prophet of God. Modern Christianity is not the doctrines of Christ. The present system, called Christianity, was really built upon the teachings of Paul, about three centuries after the death of Jesus; and Paul not only never saw the Prophet of Nazareth, but seems to have had only a very vague idea of what the latter taught.

"Islam gives you the fraternity of the Moslem brotherhood, it gives you cleanliness and prayer, and it gives you the Koran, which is very much better than the Bible. I would not permit the Old Testament to be read by any young person. Many of its passages are unfit to print. There is not an impure word in the Koran."

Mr. Webb is no doubt sincere in his desire to supplant Christianity in America, and introduce Mohammedism in its stead, but no one predicts for him any great measure of success in his mission.

The Auditor-General's report which has at last been placed in the hands of the members of the Assembly shows that the provincial finances are in a much worse condition than was expected. The fine showing promised by the government organs has failed to materialize. A Fredericton dispatch says:—

"After crediting the account with the Maritime bank deposit of \$34,243.74, and interest on the same, \$3,756.26, and \$2,720.34 corporation taxes under the act of last year, and \$1,690.48 for succession duties, amounting in all to \$51,410.92, the current revenue of the province is in debt \$84,218.80, the board of works \$16,872.15, and the lunatic asylum \$3,304.12, in all \$104,394.07. Besides this bonds to the extent of \$149,000 were issued."

The real deficit is computed to be in the vicinity of \$200,000, or about one-third of the revenue. The gross debt has gone up from \$2,484,559 to \$2,729,516.79.

Last Saturday Mr. Phinney brought the matter of the Carleton County election case before the Assembly by presenting the petition of Dr. Atkinson, setting forth the facts of the case and claiming the seat. It is a well-known fact that Dr. Atkinson received a majority of the votes cast in Carleton County in the late election, and is justly and lawfully entitled to the seat now held by Mr. Dibblee. The returning officer, an uncle of Mr. Dibblee, acting, it is said, on legal advice, threw out the returns from one poll where he claimed irregularities had existed, and awarded the seat to his nephew. Returns from other polls contained irregularities of the same nature, but for reasons best known to himself, the returning officer did not see fit to reject these returns. The matter will come up for consideration again Friday, and it is to be hoped the members of the Assembly will approach it in a non-partisan spirit. A great injustice has been done Dr. Atkinson, and as there is no provision in the election law for appealing

to the courts in matters of this kind, the Legislature is the only tribunal to deal with the case.

The interim report of the tax commission, submitted to the Legislature last week, does not recommend any very wide departure from the present mode of taxation. The commissioners suggest that the amount of income exempt from taxation be increased from \$200 to \$500, that a certain proportion of personal property be also exempt, that moneys invested in mortgages on real estate be entirely exempt, and that only the interest derived therefrom be taxed, that poll taxes shall be increased from one-sixth to one-fourth of the whole amount levied, and that the exemption of \$500 allowed to widows and unmarried females apply only in case the whole estate is worth less than \$1000. Other changes of less importance are suggested.

Legislature of N. B.

(Continued from Page 5.)

FREDERICTON, March 12.—Mr. Phinney presented the petition of Marcus C. Atkinson, M. D., setting forth that in consequence of the misconduct of the returning officer in the election in Carleton, an improper return of members to represent that county had been made, that the members returned had not been elected by the popular vote and praying that the circumstances attending that election might be inquired into by the committee of privileges.

Mr. Phinney moved, seconded by Mr. Stockton.

"Resolved, That the petition of Marcus C. Atkinson this day presented to this House and read at the clerk's table praying that this Honorable House may inquire into the facts stated in said petition and that the conduct of the election held in the county of Carleton in the month of October last past of two members to represent the said county in the house of assembly and that the writ for the election holden in and for the same county of Carleton in the month of October last past and the return of the sheriff of the said county thereto, and all other papers and records thereto relating, be referred to the committee on privileges with power to the said committee to send for persons and papers and examine witnesses, and report the evidences so taken to this house with all convenient speed.

Hon. Mr. Blair said that while he fully realized that under the rule a matter of privileges may be taken up immediately he did not think this was just such a matter of privileges as ought to be sprung upon the house on Saturday afternoon with so many members absent and without the house and the gentleman, (Mr. Connell) whose seat was attacked, having any opportunity whatever of considering it. He would suggest that the matter might be allowed to stand over until Monday or Tuesday next. Otherwise he should ask the house to vote the motion down.

After further discussion by Mr. Stockton, Hon. Mr. White and Mr. Phinney, Mr. Hill stated that while such a motion did not require two day's notice, yet according to the very right and equity of the matter it was just such a motion as should be announced by notice. He thought it a pity that Mr. Phinney had not seen fit to accept the Attorney-General's suggestion. He would move that further consideration of the matter be postponed till Tuesday next.

Mr. Phinney said that while it was clearly the duty of the house to deal with the matter at once he would defer to the suggestion of the member for Charlotte if he would extend the time till Friday next. He would have to attend the Kent circuit court next week and did not wish to be absent when the matter came up for consideration.

Mr. Hill then moved in amendment to Mr. Phinney's resolution that further consideration of the matter be postponed till Friday next, which was carried without division.

FREDERICTON, March 13.—Mr. Stockton moved, seconded by Mr. Pinder, for motion re warrant for expenditure, etc., between the close of 1892 and March 10th, the present year. Mitchell said the information would be furnished without an address.

Mr. Lewis presented the first report of the contingent committee.

Mr. Mitchell submitted the auditor general's report for last year.

Mr. Mitchell introduced a bill providing for redemption of provincial debentures falling due from next year to 1896 inclusive.

Mr. Emmerson introduced a bill in addition to the amendment of Chapter 20 of the Consolidated Statutes.

Mr. Blair introduced a bill relating to the Supreme Court and to practices and procedure therein and providing for the establishment of a Boy's Industrial School.

Stockton gave notice of motion for a statement of sums borrowed from any bank and of any amount due at the close of the year with the rate of interest charged.

Ulster Will Resist.

BELFAST, Ire., March 2.—More than 5000 persons attended the great Orange meetings here to-day.

Dr. Kane, who presided, said that Ulster was prepared to defend herself to the last against the proposals of the home rule bill. The men of Ulster need not feel, however, that they would be alone and unaided in the fight for their liberties. They had the sympathies of Englishmen of all classes throughout the world. He had received letters from military and police officers in England and Ireland and telegrams from Canada and Australia promising co-operation with the men of Ulster if the latter resorted to arms to defend their liberties against the tyranny of their historic foes. A hundred thousand Orangemen were ready to resist to the death the home rule bill.

William Johnston, M. P., for South Belfast, who called the meeting, concluded a violent speech by swearing on a Bible that he would never submit to the laws of a Dublin Parliament. Dr. Kane then tore to pieces and threw to the floor a copy of the home rule bill, and the meeting adjourned.

This evening effigies of Mr. Gladstone and Mr. Morley were burned in High street in the presence of a cheering crowd of thousands.

Columbus With and Without a Beard.

Some one has noticed the fact that there is a curious difference between the appearance of Columbus as depicted on the new one-cent stamp and as depicted on the two-cent stamp. On the one-cent stamp, which shows "Columbus in sight of land," clad in his best and with cleanly shaven face, while on the two-cent stamp, which shows "the landing of Columbus," he appears with full beard of goodly length. Now, as not more than twelve hours could have intervened between these two events the question arises as to the beard. It is clear that Columbus either raised that beard in that short time or put on false whiskers. As for us, we incline toward the latter explanation. But why Columbus felt it necessary to enter the new world in disguise we will leave to some more abstruse student.—Boston Journal.

To Bridge The Straits.

LONDON, March 6.—The House of Commons is to be asked this session to sanction the construction of a bridge across the straits of Dover, connecting England and France. Messrs. Schneider and Hersent Frenchmen, and Sir John Fowler and Sir Benjamin Baker, engineers of the Forth

bridge, are responsible for the latest designs, which provide for a bridge on the Cantilever principle, carrying a double line of rails with a clear headway underneath of 200 feet. The bridge will consist of 73 spans, alternately of 1,630 and 1,310 feet, supported on 72 piers. The cost is estimated at \$163,750,000, and the period required for construction seven years.

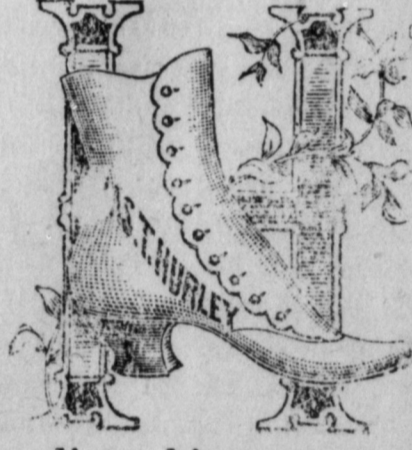
