## Legislature of N. B.

FREDERICTON, March 9.—The members were sworn in at 12 o'clock by the Chief Justice. The only absentees were Messrs. Shaw and Powell. The opening proceedings this afternoon drew a large crowd of spectators, and the scene was quite a brilliant one, the galleries and floor of the House being thronged with ladies. Sir Leonard Tilley was met with a guard of honor from the infantry school, and a salute was fired. John P. Burchill, Northumberland, was chosen Speaker.

His honor approved of the choice of the House in the usual way and then delivered the following speech:

Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly.

It affords me sincere pleasure to meet you for the first time since the recent reference to the electorate on your assembling for the despatch of public business. I am happy in being able to acknowledge the many blessings the people of the province have enjoyed in the past and which, thanks to the mercies of a kind Providence, are still being continued to us. I am sure that the occasion upon which we now assemble will occur to you as one of special interest. Since you were last convened the constitutional change involved in the extinction of the Legislative Council has been brought into effect. You are now invested with all these powers which since the province was organized you have shared with another legislative branch. This change has greatly added to your responsibilities but I look to you with confidence to persevere unimpaired the traditions of the provincial legislature and justify this reform which has so long been the subject of public expectation.

In taking leave of you at the close of the last session I expressed the hope that the substantial grant which you have placed at the disposal of my government in aid of

OUR AGRICULTURAL INTERESTS would have the effect of stimulating and encouraging our farming population. I am gratified at now being able to inform you that my expectations in this regard have been more than realized.

The past year has witnessed a constantly increasing interest among the agriculturists of the province in their noble calling. Greater attention than ever has been given to dairying. Many cheese factories and creameries have been established, and several dairy associations have been formed throughout the province. We have every reason to believe that the good work so auspiciously begun will have a marked effect in greatly increasing the prosperity of our people. Encouraged by the results of their efforts during the past year, my government will, with your approval, continue to give still further encouragement in this direction. It is a subject of much satisfaction to me to be able to apprise you of the successful termination of the litigation with

THE MARITIME BANK so long pending and of the recovery by my Government of the entire amount involved in that litigation. The result is especially gratifying as it has established beyond all future controversy the status of the executive of the provinces of Canada and has recognized that a direct relationship exists between the provincial executives and the Sovereign of the empire. The commission appointed to inquire into the report upon the subject of civic and municipal taxation has made considerable progress in its work and has submitted to me an interim report which I will cause to be laid before you. The labors of the Commission have not been concluded but it has been deemed advisable to submit to you and disseminate throughout the province at an early date the suggestions which the Commission have thus far made in order that they may become the subject of public consideration and discussion. Among other subjects of importance which will engage your attention during the present session will be the question of leasing

THE TIMBER LANDS of the Crown. Arrangements under which these lands have been held by operators during the past ten years will in a few months come to a termination, and it will be your duty to consider and determine upon the conditions under which these lands shall after that period be operated. My government will lay certain proposals on this subject before you to which I invite your thoughtful attention. You will have observed with increasing satisfaction the growth of interest now displayed in the MINING CAPABILITIES OF THE PROVINCE. Some changes in the law regulating this industry have been suggested by the experience of the last two years and will be submitted for your approval and you will be invited to consider whether it might not be in the public interests to still further stimulate and encourage investigations into the character and extent of our mineral resources. It has long been felt that a pressing need existed in the province for the establishment upon a permanent basis of a reformatory prison or industrial school for boys. Such institutions have been in useful and successful operation in the other provinces of Canada and the time appears to have arrived when action on the part of the legislature on the subject cannot only be taken with advantage but when it can no longer, without the gravest consequences, be deferred. The necessity of supplying this want seems to have been devolved upon the provincial authorities under our

and bills, therefore, will be laid before you dealing with this interesting and important subject. I have directed the accounts of the year and expenditure as well as a statement of the receipts and payments of the current year up to the opening of the present session to be laid before you. Estimates of the probable incomes and expenditures of the current year will also be submitted and I think you will find that the estimates of expenditure have been prepared with due regard to economy and at the requirements of the public service. Bills in consolidation of the game laws, to regulate the practices and procedure in the Supreme Court; to consolidate and amend the act relating to Stenographic reporting in the supreme Court; relating to bills of sale; to make provision for the appointment of women under the School Board in the cities and incorporated towns and other measures of importance will be laid before you.

I rely with confidence upon your zeal and devotion to the public welfare.

The address in reply was moved by Mr. Mott, of Restigouche, seconded by O'Brien of Charlotte.

Mr. Stockton criticized the address and was answered by Blair. Alward followed criticizing the address which then passed without division.

Mott moved and O'Brien, Charlotte, seconded that the address be engrossed, signed by the speaker and presented to His Honor. Carried.

On motion of Mitchell, consideration of supply was fixed for Tuesday next.

Mitchell submitted a memorandum of agreement with McDade and Ristein for reporting and publishing official debates.

Blair, Mitchell, Emmerson, Stockton and Phinney were appointed to name all standing committees, while Mott and O'Brien (Charlotte) were appointed a committee to present the address to His Honor.

Mr. Stockton introduced a bill respecting crown debtors.

Attorney General Blair said he had doubts as to whether Mr. Stockton was competent to introduce such a bill and would look into the matter.

Adjourned.

FREDERICTON, Mar. 10.—Attorney General Blair objecting to further progress in Stockton's bill respecting crown debtors Mr. Speaker decided that the bill could not be further advanced.

Mr. Stockton introduced bills amending the law relating to documentary evidence in certain cases, further amending chapter 65 of schools, and also respecting the use of tobacco by miners.

On motion of Mr. Mitchell, Mr. A. E. Killam, Westmorland, was appointed deputy speaker, and Rev. R. W. Weddall, chaplain.

Mott, from the committee to present the address in reply to the speech from the throne, reported that the committee had attended to its duty and Mr. Speaker read His Honor's reply thanking the House for its address.

Mitchell submitted returns from the Commissioners of General Public Hospital, interim report of tax commission Northumberland, St. John City and County, Kings County and Woodstock civic indebtedness, reports of schools and board of Health, Dominion Safety Fund Association, steamer Florenceville and steamer Flushing.

Stockton gave notice of motion for particulars of warrant of expenditure from the close of the year till March 10th.

Pinder gave notice of inquiry as to whether or not any steps had been taken to repair Nackawick Bridge.

Emmerson submitted the board of work's report and Tweedie submitted the crown lands department report.

Adjourned.

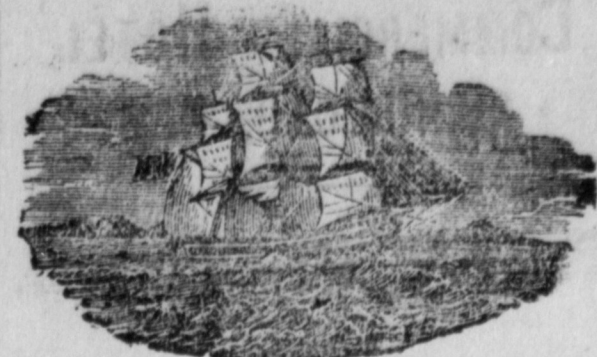
