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GENERAL NEWS.Boston was visited last week by a
\$5,000,000 fire. Four lives were lost and
more than thirty persons injured.The conservatives have unanimously
decided to move as an amendment to the
motion for the second reading of the home
rule bill, that it be read six months hence.There are about five million bushels of
Manitoba wheat yet to be shipped to
the east. About 3,500,000 bushels are
at Fort William and 400,000 at Port
Arthur awaiting the opening of navigation
while it is estimated that there is close to
one million bushels yet remaining with the
farmers.In view of the promises of aid to the
Ulster Unionists received from Canada, in
the event of a Dublin parliament being es-
tablished the Unionist members of the
house of commons from Ulster have ad-
opted a resolution, thanking the Canadians
for their offers of help to resist the hateful
yoke of home rule.The following cable appears in the Globe
dated London, March 9—There is a rumor
current to the effect that Earl Aberdeen
will not succeed Lord Stanley of Preson
as governor general of Canada, but will ac-
cept the position of viceroy of India, and
that Lord Brassey is going to Canada in-
stead. I believe, however, that there is no
warrant for the statement and have every
reason to expect that Lord Aberdeen's
selection for Canada, as originally announ-
ced, will be adhered to.A special from Key West, Florida, says
that another filibustering expedition is to
sail from Key West, it is said against one
of the Central American states. It is be-
lieved to be destined, however, to liberate
Cuba from Spanish rule. The United
States government has evidently had in-
formation of this proposed expedition and
means to prevent its sailing from Florida,

and colds.Fichtenwarth, a village of 1100 inhabi-
tants on the lower Austria, was swept by
a terrific thunder storm last night and this
morning. The storm lasted 15 hours dur-
ing which the lightning was almost in-
cessant. Twelve horses were struck dead
in the streets and seven perished in burn-
ing buildings; all trees near the town were
levelled to the ground and many cattle
