Parliament.

OTTAWA, March 6.—On the motion this afternoon that the house go into supply Tarte arose and presented his long expected Manitoba school resolution which he prefaced with a five hours' speech, the latter half of the time talking in English. The resolution was in substance as follows: Resolved that this House desires to express its disapproval of the action of the Government in dealing with the Manitoba School question and in assuming to possess judicial functions, which assumption is unknown to the law and if acquiesced in now would be subservient of ministerial responsibilities.

Lariviere followed Tarte in opposition to his resolution.

Sir John Thompson, who spoke till after midnight, reviewed the history of this school trouble and of all such troubles in the past, after quoting from the British North American Act and the act constituting Manitoba a province so far as they related to the educational question, went on to show that the government had not promised the petitioners relief, but had said we will test the petition for disallowance in the courts and till that point is decided we will lay the petition for relief to one side. He deplored the course of Tarte and his friends who were trying to inflame the prejudices and passions of the people and were imputing base and unworthy motives to the government.

Hugh John Macdonald followed Sir John and at one o'clock this morning Dalton McCarthy moved the adjournment of the debate.

Hon. Mr. Foster brought down the text of the French treaty and the house adjourned.

OTTAWA, March 7.—This afternoon the Finance Minister brought down the official report of the proceedings at the Washington reciprocity conference of a year ago. The document shows that Blaine refused to introduce any proposition for trade reciprocity that did not discriminate against Great Britain and hand over the making of Canada's tariff to the United States. To Hon. Mr. Foster's statement that Canada could not in honor discriminate against the land that protected her, Blaine replied that England was the Republic's greatest trade rival and he could make no concession in her behalf. The report further shows that Blaine refused to consider any measure of reciprocity in natural products and manufactured goods that did not involve uniform customs and the raising of the Canadian tariff against all other countries to the U. S. standard.

Dalton McCarthy resumed the Manitoba school debate this afternoon, speaking strongly against the government for its dilatory tactics. He held that Manitoba would not submit to federal interference in its educational affairs and charged Sir John Thompson with intimating that relief would be given the minority.

The debate was continued tonight to a late hour by Curran, Devlin, Costigan, Beausoleil and Craig.

OTTAWA, March 8.—The conservative members and senators met in room 16 this afternoon, just before the House opened and presented the Premier with an address expressive of confidence and loyalty and congratulating Canada on having her interests at the Paris Conference entrusted to his able hands.

Sir John's reply evoked most enthusiastic applause.

The debate on the Manitoba School question was resumed this afternoon by Col. Amyot.

Weldon, of Albert, made the speech of the debate, and his exposure of McCarthy's false legal position on this question created a profound sensation. He showed among other things that McCarthy had monkeyed with the authorities, he read to the house and had credited Bagehot with views directly contrary to what he had actually written.

The debate was continued by Casey, Laurier and others until 5.45 this morning when the House divided on Tarte's resolution as follows: Yeas 71, nays 120; government majority 49. Messrs. Pelletier, McCarthy, Dugas, O'Brien, Jeanotte, voted for Tarte's resolution.

OTTAWA, March 9.—The House only sat two hours and a half this afternoon and then adjourned till to-morrow. Everybody was played out after the previous all night session and the proceedings were not therefore at all interesting.

Charlton, Davies, Mills and others criticized some of the items of the supplementary estimates, which were being considered in supply.

OTTAWA, Mch. 10.—The house spent most of the afternoon and all of the evening session in supply on the main estimates. On the item of \$6,500 to complete Cape Tormentine harbour work Davies tried to make it appear that much money had been spent to enable Mr. Wood, M. P., to carry his lumber over the Tormentine Railway to deep water.

Ministers Foster and Ouimet showed from the record that not one dollar had been diverted from the purpose for which it was voted, viz: towards the ferry service between P. E. I. and the main land.

Hon. Mr. Ouimet, in reply to Mr. Davies said that no money would be spent at Cape Traverse until he had fully examined the suitability of that place as the Island Terminus.

Mr. Wood indignantly refuted Davies' slanders and gave a history of the Tormentine road, showing that he and others had promoted that work with the best intentions and had freely put their own money into it.

Welsh, Perry, Yeo and Davies complained that justice was not done to the island in public works.

Mr. Casey charged Mr. Wood with having in the past ten years secured for public works in Westmorland four times the total sum spent in that period in all Prince Edward Island.

The House sat in supply till 12:30 this morning.

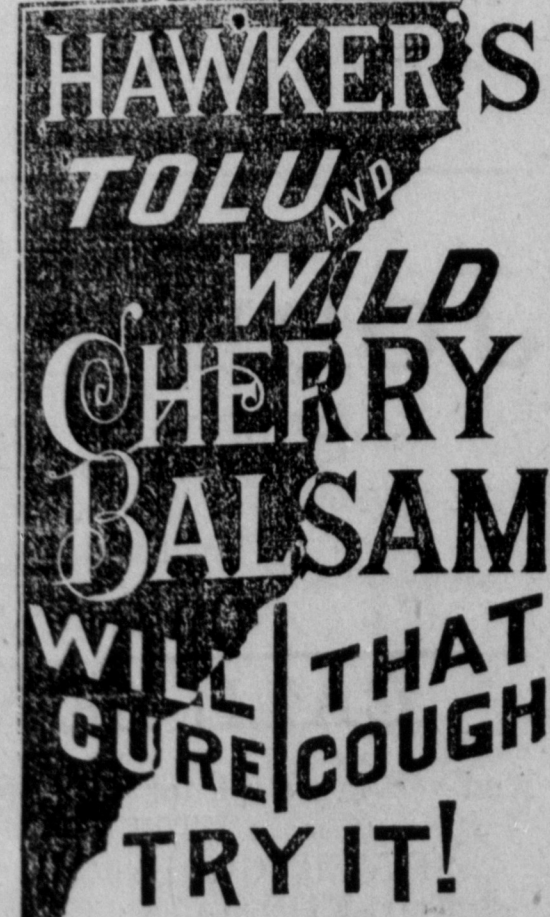

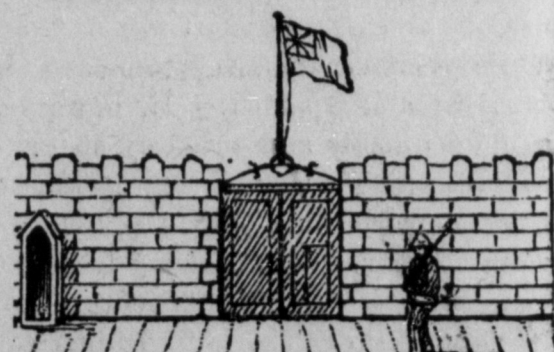

The Queen a Low Churchwoman.

Two views of the Queen's private chapel at Osborne are published by permission in The Million. It is believed to be mainly owing to the too eager attention of the "cheap tripper"—whose obtrusive curiosity, it might have been added, is by no means exclusively confined to the class to which he belongs—that her Majesty has for some time ceased to attend the Sunday service at Whippingham parish church and joined in worship in the little chapel referred to. The first thing, it is observed, that strikes the eye of the visitor is the extreme plainness of the sacred chamber, and the absence of all pomp and glitter in the few and simple accessories of divine worship. There are no gilded canopies, towering candlesticks, silken banners and tinsel scroll-work. Absolutely nothing, with the exception of Sir Noel Paton's fine pictures, finds place in the chapel that is not necessary. Here it is a rule that all the congregation shall be assembled before the Queen, accompanied by the other royalists, enters the apartment, even the officiating clergyman being in his place ready to commence the service the moment the Royal party arrives. The strictest regard is paid to the etiquette of precedence. The Queen cherishes a well-known dislike to anything pertaining to ritual: in fact, Her Majesty has such a leaning to "an entirely unembroidered," form of worship that when at Balmoral she conforms quite readily to the homely observances of Scotch Presbyterianism.
