THE THIRD STAGE.

The third stage of the consideration of the Irish Home Rule Bill was entered upon in the British house of Commons, Monday, and amendments to the measure are pouring in. The great majority of these proposed amendments are being brought in by the Unionists, who are seeking by this means to delay and obstruct the passage of the measure.

A TERRIBLE OUTRAGE.

The Boston Pilot works itself into an awful fury over the fact that a number of the people of New York met to celebrate St. George's day in the church of St. John the Evangelist in that city. It declares that "the celebration of St. George's day in an American church, in the manner in which it was conducted and the sentiments uttered, was a gross insult to the American people and virtually an act of treason."

Meetings are being held in British Columbia favoring the separation of the island of Vancouver from the mainland of that province. The residents of the mainland complain that the island has more than its just share of the representation, and that their wants and wishes are totally disregarded.

The members of the Toronto trade and labor council, took a hand last Friday evening in discussing the probable future of this country. The following resolution was finally adopted:—"That owing to the great conflict of opinion as to the political future of this country, this congress petition the Dominion government to submit to popular vote the question of the maintenance of our present colonial status, imperial federation, Canadian independence, or political union with the United States."

A clever story of another kind is that of the new English novelist, Gilbert Parker, in the same number. "American Society in Paris" is an article of another kind, but one which will interest all who have had occasion to make even a short residence in the French capital. The Cosmopolitan scores a success in producing in its May number, almost simultaneously with the daily papers, an elaborate description of Professor Gray's marvellous invention, the Telautograph, which reproduces the handwriting, or the work of the artist, simultaneously, thousands of miles distant from the place where the writer or artist is sitting. Mr. Howell's purpose in "The Traveller from Altruria" is, month by month becoming more evident, and is now receiving wide attention at the hands of the critics all over the world.

Exodus of Germans.

LONDON, May 4.—The newspapers of Oaessa report that a general exodus of German colonists from Russia to America has begun. The Germans leave because the official prosecutions incited by virulent tirades of the press against the colonist, have rendered their position in Russia insufferable.

Four Fishermen Drowned.

CAPE TRAVERSE, P. E. I., May 5.—Yesterday four fishermen were drowned off here. The unfortunate men left early in the morning to visit lobster traps but were overtaken by a storm and their boat swamped. The names of three of the men are unknown. The fourth is Muncney Muttart, who, during last winter, was captain of one of the government ice-boats.

Brokers and Home Rule.

LONDON, May 5.—The city was the scene Wednesday of an unusual demonstration, 800 brokers, headed by leaders bearing the Union Jack flags and bearing Union Jacks of paper in their hats, in token of their devotion to the cause of the Union, and their opposition to Irish Home Rule, marching in procession from the Stock Exchange to-day to a Unionist meeting at Guildhall. Upon reaching Guildhall, and before entering the brokers sang the anthem, "Rule Britannia," and cheered loudly for the Union, Lord Salisbury and other Unionist leaders. A crowd assembled, evidently not in sympathy with the brokers, and lent variety to the cheers by occasional hoots.

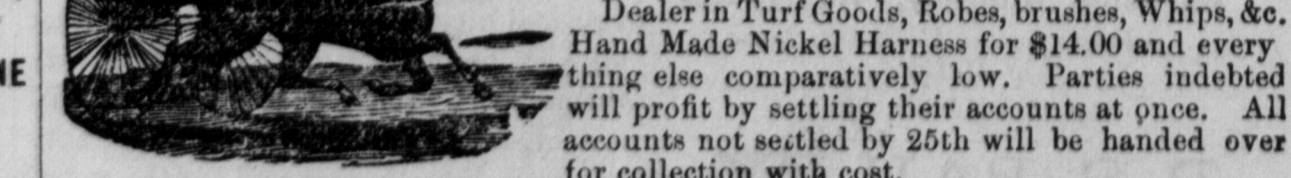
