LUMBERMEN FEELING BETTER.—Reports from up the rivers are to the effect that all the lumber in the streams is in a fair way to be got to the mills. The rain storm of last week caused the water in the streams to rise rapidly, and Friday and Saturday the driving was good. The men are concerned to get all their lumber to the mills without further difficulty.

DWELLING HOUSE BURNED.—The dwelling house of Mr. Wm. Potts, at Potts' mill near Buctouche, with nearly all its contents was destroyed by fire on Monday of last week. The men were away when the fire occurred, and scarcely anything was saved. The house and furniture were insured for about half their value. Mr. Potts and family are now living with his son, Mr. Albert Potts about half a mile from the mill.

NEW BOATS.—A number of new boats have been completed and launched this spring. John Long built two during the winter, and expects to have a third completed and ready for the water in a few days. Joseph Mischeau, James Irving, and Paul Legoo, each launched a boat soon after the ice broke up. George Amereaux put one in the water Saturday, and Albert Long is building a new pilot boat which he expects to have ready for use in a short time.

SUNDAY SCHOOL CONVENTION.—Rev. Mr. Lucas, Field Secretary of the N. B. Sunday School Association, will preside at a convention of the Sunday school workers of the parish of Richibucto, to be held in the Presbyterian Church, Kingston, Thursday afternoon and evening. An interesting programme has been prepared, and addresses, bible lessons, etc., will be given. The afternoon session will begin at 2, the evening at 7 o'clock. Everybody is cordially invited to attend.

THE B. & M. RAILWAY.—Steps have been taken to put the B. & M. Railway track in better condition than it has been for some time. A working train is now engaged ballasting and putting in a new siding at Moncton. A large quantity of logs, railway ties, cord wood, and other wood stuff has been got out at different points along the road, and shippers are complaining of a scarcity of cars. These, together with the stone from the Cocagne quarries will keep the road busy during the summer. It is said that repairs will soon be begun on the Buctouche railway bridge. A small freight house has been erected on the south side of the river for storing freight until the bridge is completed.

THE MILL CREEK BRIDGE.—The people of Buctouche and St. Mary are complaining of the delay in repairing and putting up the bridge at the mouth of Mill Creek. This bridge was taken down about two months ago under the directions, it is said, of one of the defeated candidates in the last local election. It has since remained down, and those travelling over the road are compelled to go out of their way several miles over bad roads in order to get past it. It would take only a short time to put the bridge in condition to permit travel over it, and parties interested feel that it is high time steps were taken to have it repaired. The delay blocks travel over one of the principal roads of the county and is little short of an outrage.

A NEWSPAPER SOLD.—Mr. A. Dennis, of the Pictou Standard, has sold the New Glasgow Enterprise to Mr. A. P. Douglas for \$4000.00. The Enterprise was founded by Mr. Dennis in 1888. Its chief mission was to gather news from all sections of Eastern Nova Scotia and it has admirably succeeded. Pictonians abroad call the Enterprise their weekly letter from home. Mr. Dennis who will give his whole attention in future to the "Colonial Standard," has a bright newspaper career. From his connection with the Winnipeg Sun down to the present almost everything he has touched has been a success. The Standard has been brought to present high standing among maritime weeklies by him. It will be remembered Mr. Dennis married a Kent Co. lady last summer—that event was the greatest success of his life.—Moncton Times.

SETTLED IN ALBERTA.—Mr. C. C. Carlyle is convinced of the large circulation of THE REVIEW in the New England States.
