To the Editor of The Review:

SIR.—Under "Prohibition Pro and Con" L., of Kingston, on the 17th inst., writes what I think it quite fair to style "pure and simple" trash as a whole, and also that the pro might have been left out of the title with propriety.

It would seem that L. is of the opinion that if he had only been in time, fruit would not have been forbidden, no ten commandments would have been needed, nor even a "Gutenberg System" or "Scientific Temperance" in the schools. It is a great pity L. was not produced at an early stage of the world's history. I have always been under the impression that the narcotics mentioned by L. are as much prohibited as alcoholic drinks would be under prohibition "as at present proposed," but even if not, suppose they were doing anything like the terrible work which alcohol is, and were allowed to be sold in the same way, I rather think the humane people of the civilized world would cry out for more immediate relief than a "Gutenberg System" or "Scientific Temperance" taught to the children which means, wait a whole generation for results from your experiment. As reasonable to advise against the removal of a gangrenous limb or a tumor, contra to the pronounced opinion of the best surgical experts. The emancipation of the Negro is not generally regretted, nor is it a fact that the "physical wrecks" are more frequent among those who are forced to give up the use of the ardent than where the Gutenberg or scientific temperance teaching style is used, both of which savor of "putting off until to-morrow what should be done to-day." The nature is on fire to a great extent through the improper use of intoxicants, and to stand off and try experiments when the people are of the opinion that the sale of liquors as a beverage in bar rooms is one of the greatest of curses, would be very like not calling out the fire department in case of a house on fire, but instead to go about and tell people to be more careful of fire. The old story of not being able to enforce the Scott Act is now seldom put forward since the very proper and sensible plan of employing detectives as in the case of the prevention of smuggling and other lawless practices, has been adopted. Give us "prohibition pure and simple as at present proposed" as a very practical experiment. For the present.

Miss Edith Black has been visiting her sister at the residence of Richard Warman. Sorry to report that Miss M. Black has been ill for several days, and unable to attend her school.

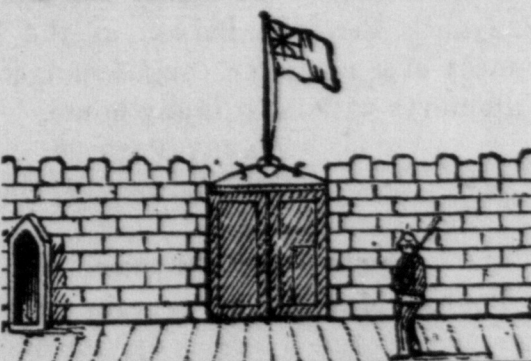

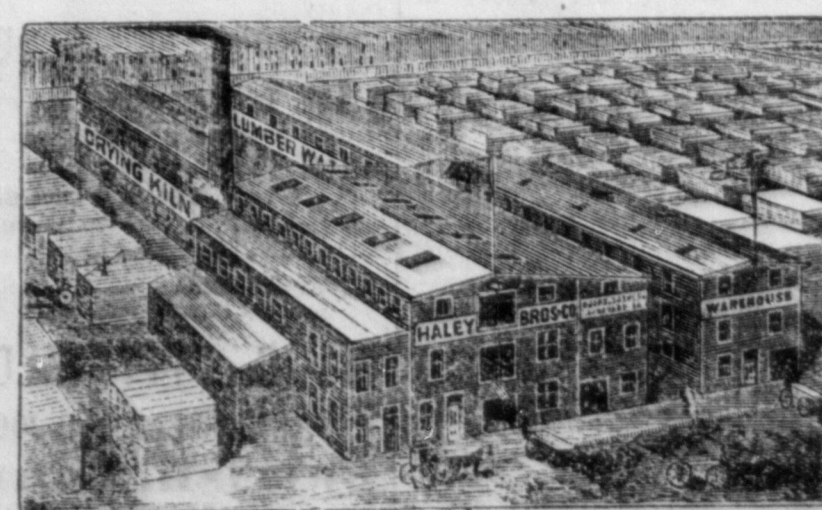
