Servants to Chicago.

Boston, May 3.—The servant girl problem may become a serious one for Boston house keepers to solve on account of the exodus of domestics to Chicago. One employment agency sent out 800 of them Monday, another seventy-five, and still another fifty. The same agency, however, which sent out 800 young women to Chicago Monday, had 500 on its list Tuesday morning waiting for places in families in Boston. A visit to a dozen employment offices Tuesday showed that their combined forces of servant girls aggregate 1,970, or fully up to the average supply at these places. The girls thus far sent to Chicago are not the kind that are desired to work in families, but are from the class employed as waitresses in cheap hotels and restaurants. The manager of one of these employment agencies said that she had refused repeatedly to fill orders from Chicago for girls, and advised all the desirable girls with whom she had dealings not to go there.
