SMELTS.—The weather continues hard and the smelt business is still booming. It is estimated that upwards of \$50,000, had been paid out up to date, this season in Richibucto for smelts. The fishermen's boats are light and their pockets heavy.

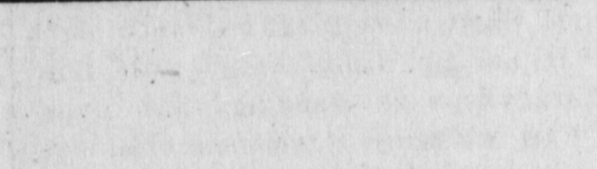
