Archbishop Vaughn, Westminster, is elevated to the cardinalate, also Archbishop Logue, primate of Ireland—in all six Italian, two French, two Prussian, one English, one Irish, one Hungarian, and one Spanish.

The Pope announced in addition that the creation of two cardinals was reserved.

Moved by Councillor McKee, seconded by Councillor Richard, and resolved, That the Finance Committee at the first session in each year report the surplus of each parish collection of rates for the last preceding year as against the amount of assessment warrant for that year, and that the different parishes be credited or debited with such surplus or deficit in the parish assessment warrant's next issued.

Bill for \$10.00 for services of the Public Wharf Committee read. On motion that the same be paid.

Councillor Richard thought that no charges should be made for such services. He contended that the honor of the position ought to be enough for any one.

Councillor McAlmon said Councillor Richard could have his place on the committee and have all the honor he could find in the position.

Councillor Johnson said he had since he was elected a councillor, been on several committees. He had done a great deal of work and lost a great deal of time, and had never asked nor received a cent for

doing so. He was against granting pay to committee-men.

Councillors McAlmon, Smallwood, Murphy and Wathe favored the motion.

Motion carried in a division.

Councillor Curran wished the Council to instruct the Public Wharf Committee as to their duties.

Resolved, That the committee have full power to act in the matter as they think in the best interests of the county.

List of parish officers for the parish of Harcourt for the ensuing year submitted and approved.

Moved by Councillor Johnson, seconded by Councillor Leger, and ordered, That \$8.68 be added to the assessment warrant of Dundas, and \$37.70 to that of Richibucto, as an extra assessment for taxes refunded ratepayers of these parishes.

Resolved, That Caleb Richardson be appointed auditor for the ensuing year at his old salary.

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Councillor McKee addresses Council in reference to the Buctouche lockup. Informs the board that the old lockup was burned in the fire there last summer, that the people at once erected a new building for that purpose for which they paid upwards of \$300.

The building was on the old site, and therefore on county land. He contended that the municipality ought to bear at least a portion of the expense of erecting the building, and promised in case it did so that the building would be insured for the benefit of the county.

Buctouche, as the terminus or the B. & M. Railway, could not do without such a building, and it saved the county the expense of carrying offenders to the county jail. He, therefore, moved that \$110 be added to the county assessment for contingencies to go towards paying for the lockup.

by Councillor McKee, and resolved, That after the next election of councillors in this county, elections of councillors shall be held biennially and not annually as heretofore.

Moved by Councillor Murphy and seconded by Councillor Smallwood, That the summer meeting of the Council be held on the fourth Tuesday in June instead of the third Tuesday in July.

Councillor Richard said this matter had been discussed time and again, and different times for holding the second session proposed, but it had been found that the third Tuesday in July was the most convenient for everybody. The week proposed by Councillor Murphy contained a holy day of the Roman Catholic church and the councillors of his religion did not care to sit on a holy day.

Councillor Murphy said his reason for proposing the change was that the time now fixed was just about in the middle of the haying season and as most of the councillors were farmers they found it difficult to leave off work to attend Council. If some change were not made it would be found difficult to induce men to offer their services to the county.

Councillors McKee and Gesner said it was immaterial to them when the session was held. They would vote to accommodate the majority.

Councillor Johnson said that there was another reason why the change should not be made and that was that the Council would probably last till the first of July and that was a public holiday.

Motion lost in a division.

Moved by Councillor Richard, and seconded by Councillor Leger, that \$50 be fixed as the amount for a retail liquor license and \$75 for a wholesale license for the year 1894.

Moved, by Councillor Smallwood, in amendment, and seconded by Councillor Wathe that \$100 and \$175 be the amounts fixed for retail and wholesale liquor licenses respectively.

Question on the amendment, yeas: Councillors Murphy, Curran, Wathe, Smallwood, Coates—5. Nays: Councillors McKee, Gesner, McMaster, Richard, Johnson, Pineau, Barriau, Leger, Simon Bourgeois, Poirier Daigle, S. D. Bourgeois, McAlmon, Ferguson—14.

Amendment rejected.

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
