The Bark Atlantic of Tellefesen, from Chatham, N. B., Oct. 8 for Liverpool has been officially posted at Lloyds as missing.

The McMichaels, father and son, charged with the murder of Fred Titus, of St. Mary's, were found guilty by the jury at Fredericton last Thursday. The Chief Justice sentenced them to two years each in the penitentiary.

It appears that when the recent fish seizure of trout was made in the market, Fishery Warden, R. A. Chapman overlooked a full barrel of trout brought down by the same party and scized two thirds of a barrel only. The full barrel was spirited away and carried to the mountains and what became of it is known only to the purloiners. The two thirds of a barrel seized was distributed among the poor on Telegraph and Vulcan streets.—Transcript.

Last Thursday Dr. E. C. Randall and C. B. Welton were taken before Judge Peters to receive sentence. After stating the duty of the court in the matter his Honor said that strong representation for leniency had been made on behalf of the prisoners but he contended there was not in the evidence any justification for the court to exercise clemency. Therefore, he sentenced the prisoners to the penitentiary for a term of five years each. In the meantime, the prisoners are remanded until the Supreme Court meets, when an argument on a writ of error will be heard

In the United States circuit court in Boston last Thursday an attempt was made to obtain the extradition of Narcisse Dupont with several aliases who was charged by the Canadian government with stealing \$110 from a clerk in the employ of the Intercolonial railway at Fraserville, N. B., Nov. 16th. Dupont formerly lived at Fraserville. A witness testified he had been in Fall River since September last and Judge Nelson ordered his discharge.

W. C. Winslow appeared before the Northumberland county Council last Thursday and protested formally against the payment of counsel fees and travelling expenses charged by the Scott act inspector. He gave a notice of injunction to restrain the payment. W. R. Robinson spoke in the name of the Good Templars. The council voted to pay the bills, less \$150 for fees in undefended cases. A motion was passed unanimously without debate to hold biennial elections in future for councillors. The Scott act inspector will be retained at \$500 salary as before.

Warren D. Walker, a former resident of Moncton, who left N. B. about a year ago, was arrested near the town of Burke, N. Y., by Detective Carroll. His arrest is made on a charge of having defrauded the Moncton agency of the Bank of Nova Scotia out of a sum of money, said to have been \$1,300. 
