THE GOVERNORSHIP.

Notwithstanding the numerous and conflicting dispatches from Ottawa to the New Brunswick papers concerning the governo ship of this province, it appears that the government have not yet taken the matter under serious consideration. If we may judge from the number of names mentioned in connection with the position, the delay is not owing to lack of applicants. A Toronto paper a few days ago announced that Kennedy F. Burns, M. P., had been selected to fill the position, and that his appointment would be gazetted within a week. More than a week has passed since this announcement was made, and Sir Leonard Tilley still occupies the place. Mr. Davies brought the matter up in the Commons last week, and urged the premier to take the House into his confidence and state when the appointment would be made. This, however, Sir John Thompson refused to do, and the matter dropped. The two most prominent names mentioned in this connection are those of Mr. Burns and Senator Boyd. Hon, Peter Mitchell appears to have no support among the members from this province. Those opposed to the appointment of Mr. Burns are resurrecting the old charge against him of having fraudulently dealt with the Caraquet railway stock. This charge has more than once been put forward, and so far as we can learn there has been no attempt made to prove that Mr. Burns' conduct in the transaction was in any respect open to getting out their wood and poles. condemnation. No attempt has been charge was first put forward. If his con- suppers. neccion with the Caraquet railway matter does not interfere with him holding his seat in the House, we cannot understand why it should stand between him and the governorship. If he is not eligible for governor for the reason advanced, he certainly should not be allowed to sit in the Commons. The objections put forward by Mr. Burns' opponents are clearly insufficient.

His acceptance of the position makes it necessary for him to again face his constituents. Nomination has been fixed for Wednesday, the 15th instaut; polling on tha 22nd. It is understood that the speaker's chair will be filled by Mr. Hill, of Charlotte. The legislature will meet on the first Thursday in March.




