DEATH OF MRS. PARKHILL.—The death of Mrs. Parkhill, widow of the late Joseph Parkhill, at Galloway, last week, removes one of the oldest inhabitants of this county.

Loggie, received a telegram Tuesday morning informing him that the Loggie fishing establishment and buildings in connection at Black Brook, containing tins, fishing gear, shooks and a large quantity of smelts had been totally destroyed by fire Monday evening.

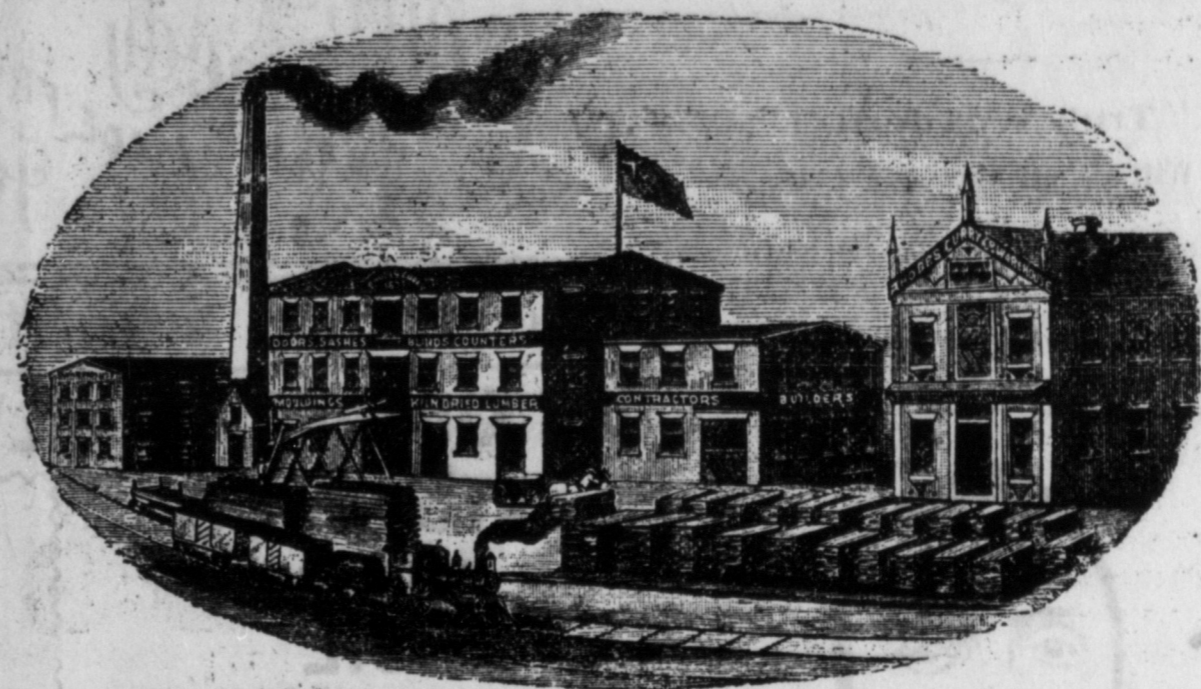
