VAUDREUIL.

The election in Vaudreuil last week, resulted in a decisive victory for the Liberals. Mr. Harwood, the successful candidate, was elected in the general election of 1891 by a small majority. He was unseated by the Election Court, and a new election was held in which the government candidate was elected by a majority of thirty-five. The new member elected was in turn unseated by the Courts and the Liberals have again captured the constituency with a majority of about two hundred. Vaudreuil was, up to the last general election strongly conservative, and in that contest it was carried by the Liberals by only a small majority. The large majority secured by the Liberal candidate in the late contest, is therefore, a matter of surprise to both parties and government organs are busy trying to explain away the defeat. The Liberal candidate and his friends made tariff reform one of the main issues of the contest, and Liberal journals claim the result as an indication that the tide of popular opinion has begun to set in that direction. Conservatives however, declare that the Manitoba school question which was used in the contest for all it was worth, had more to do with their defeat than any sentiment in favor of tariff reform. The result may be taken as an indication that the government is losing its hold in the province of Quebec, and that the compatriots of Mr. Laurier are enrolling themselves under his political banner.

ADDITIONAL TAXATION.

The lunatic asylum bill introduced and passed by the local government last week, is another step in the direction of direct taxation, and imposes a new burden on the municipalities of the province. It is provided by this act that on and after the first day of next January, the county from which a pauper lunatic is sent, shall pay the sum of \$1.25 per week for his maintenance. The opposition members condemned the measure as an unjust imposition on the municipalities, but the Attorney General called upon his friends to stand by the measure and it was passed by the usual government majority. The county of Kent will perhaps feel the effect of this act in a greater degree than any of the other counties. A number of the inmates of the provincial lunatic asylum from this county are paupers, and when the municipality is called upon to pay the sum of \$65.00 per year for each and every pauper lunatic sent from here, the rate of municipal taxation will be found to have very materially increased. The expenditures unloaded on the municipalities by the acts of the past session will make a big hole in the municipal revenue next year, and additional taxes must necessarily be levied to meet them. Each session the provincial load is being lightened at the expense of the municipalities, and yet the financial condition of the province is becoming rapidly worse. Our annual expenditure is far beyond our income, and our provincial indebtedness is steadily increasing.

We would advise those who are dissatisfied with the county of Kent and contemplate leaving it, to read carefully the letter of "an old Kent County boy in Alberta" published this week. There is no one more competent to give good advice in this matter than the writer. He has been in every province in the Dominion and perhaps in every state in the Union, and his profession has led him to give a careful study to these countries and their conditions, and while he admits that Alberta is one of the best countries he has visited, he can find no place superior to Kent County. We have more than once endeavored to point out to our young men the fine natural advantages of this county, and to urge them to stay at home. The writer very truly declares that if the county of Kent could be removed bodily and plumped down in the heart of one of the prairie countries it would be considered one of the greatest prizes that could be offered. Then why leave it for a less favored locality? Boys stay at home; it will pay you in the end.

Mr. Blair has at various times sought to pose as the friend of the working man, but his course during the past session does not prove him to be a very strong protector of the rights of wage-earners. He introduced a measure to provide for the payment to members of a certain profession of increased fees, for attending and giving evidence before the courts, but, when Dr. Stockton introduced his lien bill, intended to protect the laboring man

and to secure to him his hard earned wages, the Attorney General was most pronounced in his opposition to the measure. Through his efforts the bill was stood over till next session, but it is safe to say it will be before the House again next year, and so strong is the feeling throughout the country in its favor, that not even the Attorney General's opposition will prevent it from becoming a law.

Legislature of N. B.

FREDERICTON, April 14.—This forenoon Mr. Smith (Westmorland) committed a bill authorizing the Moncton City Council to provide a system of lighting for said city. Mr. Smith explained that the bill proposed to give the power to the City Council of Moncton to erect its own lighting system.

Mr. Killam supported the bill. The Moncton Council were unanimous in its favor. The bill proposed that the Council have power to take over the plant of the existing company.

Mr. Stockton thought in justice to all concerned the bill should stand till next session.

Mr. Powell said he would support the bill as amended.

Hon. Mr. Emmerson strongly supported the bill and Mr. Smith (Westmorland) spoke in its favor.

Mr. Wells would support the bill but would have preferred that it had been allowed to go through in its original shape. Agreed to with amendments.

Mr. Powell committed a bill to lessen the registry fees and to provide for the payment of salaries of Registry of Deeds. Mr. Powell spoke at some length as to excessive fees obtained by registrars. In Westmorland County the receipts of the registrar amounted to \$4500, and the actual work was done by a clerk, who received \$500; in Kings the registrar received in fees over \$2000, though he was a non-resident and his work was performed by an assistant at a salary of about \$300 or \$400. It was absurd that these officials, who did nothing but clerical work of the most mechanical kind, should receive more than the judges of our superior courts. Even the fees he proposed were above those paid in the province of Nova Scotia.

Hon. Mr. Blair agreed that there were anomalies in respect to the fees received by the registrars in some of the counties. But the bill did not meet the difficulty. The government had obtained accurate information from all the registrars a few years ago and it appeared that in one or two of the larger counties the fees received were excessive. They had considered the idea of appointing registrars at a fixed salary in the counties, the registry fees to go into the provincial exchequer. But the representatives from Westmorland had objected to this proposal and demanded that the fees should be paid to the county. The subject was a large one and while some remedial measure was necessary it was too late to deal with the subject now. He moved that progress be reported.

Mr. Hill thought something would have to be done in the larger counties at least in the direction advanced by the hon. member for Westmorland. Progress was reported upon the following division:

Recess.

Mr. Killam recommitted a bill to provide for the supplying of Moncton with water.

Mr. Stockton said the interests of the bond holders should be protected. He doubted the wisdom of considering such an important bill at such a late hour in the session.

Answering Messrs. Stockton and Alward, Mr. Killam said he was willing to amend the bill so that the bond holders might be protected under any purchase by the city.

After supper Hon. Mr. Emmerson supported the bill and moved an amendment providing that in the event of a purchase the city should retain a sufficient sum to pay any lien or encumbrance against the property.

Several amendments were made and the bill as amended was agreed to.

Mr. Killam committed a bill renewing the charter of the Moncton Tramway company. Agreed to.

Hon. Mr. Blair announced that the House would prorogue at 10 o'clock tomorrow morning.

Adjourned till 9.30 to-morrow morning.
