

LOCAL NEWS.

THE WEATHER.—The weather during the past week has been cold and stormy. Saturday evening a snow storm set in and about five inches of snow fell. Tuesday another heavy storm set in and a heavy wind prevailed. About six inches of snow fell, and the snow is again in use.

CATECHIST APPOINTED.—At the last meeting of the Miramichi Presbytery, Mr. A. W. K. Herdman was appointed to act as catechist in Kouchibouguac, during the summer. He studied in Edinburgh last winter, arrived in Halifax last week, and is expected to enter upon his duties on Sabbath first.

COLLIER CREEK BRIDGE.—We are sorry to find that the petition which the inhabitants of Kouchibouguac lately signed asking that this bridge be repaired has not had the desired effect. We are of opinion that until some animal gets its leg broken nothing will be done towards reconstruction. May be the petition was not presented to the members for Kent.

I. S. S. COMPANY.—Commencing Monday, the steamers of this company will make three trips a week to Boston and the intermediate places of stopping, except that the Wednesday steamer will not go into Portland. The steamers of this line are in splendid condition, and the public can rely on a first class service between the provinces and New England during the coming season.

POOR PROSPECT FOR DEALERS.—Senator Snowball is home. He reports the deal market very unsatisfactory. There is no demand in Ireland, in consequence of the curtailing of business in view of the probable adoption of the Home Rule Bill, and heavy stocks are held in England. With a market twenty-five per cent less than last year, we have twenty-five per cent more lumber to sell. What to do with it all is the question yet to be answered.—Chatham World.

LOSS BY FIRE.—The loss to Mr. David McIntosh occasioned by the burning of his dwelling house as reported last week, is very severe. Mr. and Mrs. McIntosh were in Buctouche attending the funeral of the former's sister when the fire occurred, and the children were with their grandfather in the house. The fire had gained considerable headway before it was discovered and it was with difficulty that the children were rescued. The furniture was totally destroyed. Building and contents un- insured.

THE LUMBER OUTLOOK.—Lumber operators feel blue on account of the unsatisfactory outlook for getting their lumber to the mills. The snow has not been very deep at any time this winter, and as it has been gradually melted by the sun, the streams are very low and stream-driving impossible in many places. The late snow storms have not done much to remedy this state of affairs. Unless there is a heavy rain, the greater number of the logs got out this winter will remain in the streams.

FISK JUBILEE SINGERS.—Remember the grand concert to be given in the Temperance Hall by the Fisk Jubilee Singers Thursday evening. This is the original company that started from Fisk University, Tennessee, twenty-three years ago. They have sung in nearly all the large cities of the civilized world, and before nearly all the crowned heads of Europe. They have been greeted with packed houses in their tour through Nova Scotia and in Moncton. This will probably be the only opportunity the people of this county will ever have of listening to these famous singers, and every one should turn out to hear them.

DEATH OF MR. THOMAS ROBERTS.—The death of Mr. Thomas Roberts as reported last week, removes one of the oldest and best known residents of Buctouche. Mr. Roberts was born in West Branch, Kent County, and removed to Buctouche about thirty-five years ago, where he engaged in mercantile business with his grandfather, Thomas Johnson. He afterwards built the Roberts House, and has been engaged in the hotel business there nearly ever since. About sixteen years ago he sold out and removed to Collingwood, Ontario. He remained there only a short time and on his return built and ran the Union Hotel which was burned down a few years ago. He has lately been the proprietor of the Bay View Hotel. He leaves surviving him a wife, two sons and four daughters. He was fifty-five years of age. The large concourse of people that followed his remains to the place of interment in the Presbyterian burying ground, Buctouche, sufficiently attests to the respect and esteem in which the deceased was universally held.

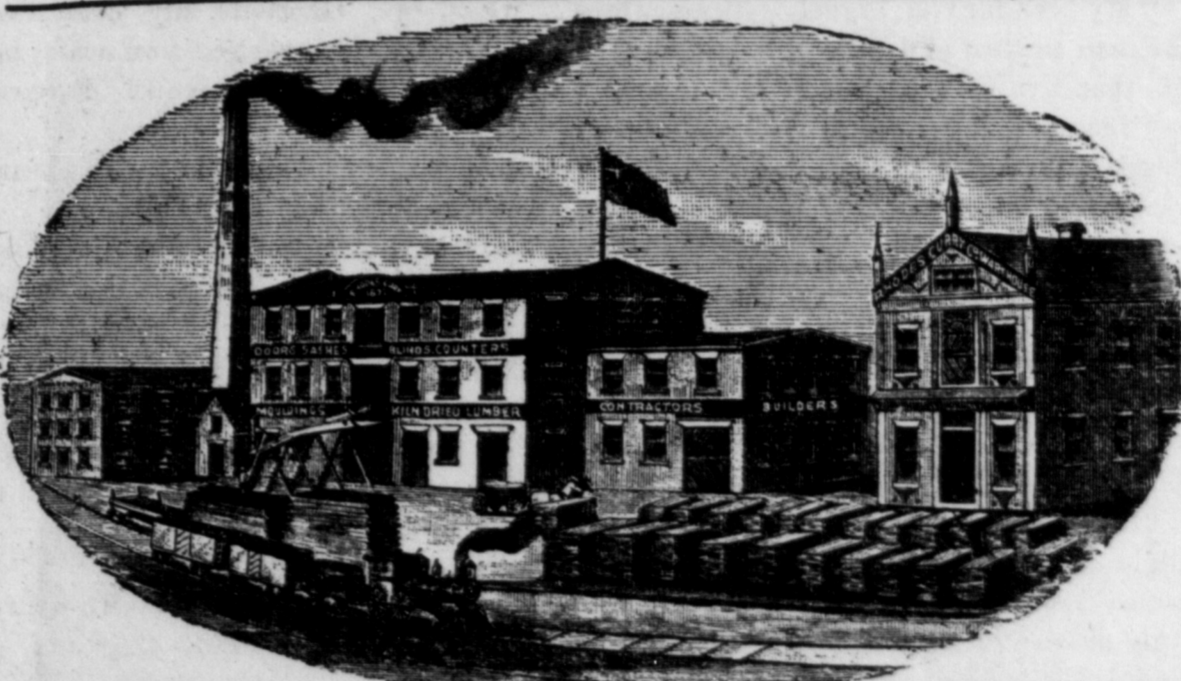
