Miscellaneous Recipes.

POTATO SCONES.—Mash boiled potatoes very smooth, adding a little salt, then knead with flour until quite stiff, brown on a griddle with a very little butter, pricking them to prevent blistering. Serve with butter.

POTATO ROLLS.—Beat three eggs and one cup of lard in two cups of well mashed potato, a little salt and one cup of yeast. This is the sponge; let it rise and then make up with flour to a dough stiff enough to roll out. Let rise again, then make out in the baking pan; let rise again and bake in a quick oven.

POTATO SNOW.—Peel and boil six or more good-sized potatoes until tender; drain and dry thoroughly and season with salt and pepper and a tablespoonful of butter. Place a few at a time in a potato strainer and press them into the dish from which they are to be served. Do not disturb them after the straining. Serve while hot.

POTATO FRITTERS.—To two cups of warm mashed potato add one teaspoonful of salt, a slight grating of nutmeg and a few grains of cayenne; add three eggs and two yolks well beaten, and beat till cool; then one-half cup of flour, and drop by the spoonful into hot lard. Fry light-colored and drain on paper. Add one tablespoonful of salt to six medium-sized potatoes in boiling. These fritters are very nice.

POTATOES AU GRATIN.—Cut a quart of cold boiled potatoes in half-inch squares. Heat a pint of milk and thicken smoothly with two tablespoonfuls of flour rubbed with the same amount of butter; add a teaspoonful each of salt and chopped parsley; when well cooked, remove from the fire. Place part of the potatoes in a pudding dish, pour over them some of the sauce, then the rest of the potatoes and sauce and cover with a layer of bread crumbs moistened with a little melted butter. Bake to a nice brown in a quick oven.

Cholera Raging in Europe.

Cholera has made its appearance again in St. Petersburg, and it is known that fatal cases are of daily occurrence, although the authorities have not resumed their policy of last year of making regular daily announcement of the new cases and deaths. At present the authorities are pursuing a policy of suppression and withholding from the public all information as to the spread of the disease. Very disquieting rumors have been received from the interior of Russia, and the Minister of the Interior is taking action which indicates that the Government must possess special information of the gravest character. The Minister has ordered the reopening of the medico-sanitary stations in the Volga provinces, where the cholera carried off many thousands last year, and special steamers with sanitary staffs will cruise in the river, stopping along the Volga to pick up any cholera patient or any dead from cholera-stricken vessels plying on that stream. The Government is also causing to be formed sanitary commissions which will look after the health of the people at the points to be reached through the railway system of Russia.
