THE MONITEUR AGAIN ON DECK. Our esteemed contemporary the Moniteur Acadian has evidently taken umbrage at our remarks concerning Mr. Phinney and the Acadian vote of the county, and has some hard things to say about him and his English friends in this county. After setting forth several statements we did not make, it advises us to seek for other reasons for Mr. Phinney's attitude in the late election. We are not aware that we attempted to give any reasons in the article referred to. certainly did not mention the bye-election of 1891. Mr. Phinney took occasion on nomination day to give his own reasons for his support of Mr. McInerney, and we are of opinion that he gave very good ones. About 1400 electors of the county including 400 Acadians appear to have been pretty well satisfied with the reasons given. In the article which has so excited our contemporary, we stated that the Acadians of Kentlowed more to Mr. Phinney than he did to them. We also stated that in the general election of 1890 and again last fall, the majority of the Acadian votes of the county were given against 1887, and declares that on that occasion Mr. Phinney secured a majority of the Acadian votes of the county, while a majority of the English votes were given to his opponent Mr. Sayre. Our contemporary is in error. In that election Mr. Phinney secured a majority of both the French and the English votes. We stated further that but for the support of Messrs. Phinney, Brait, Jardine and their friends in Harcourt and Weldford, Hon, P. A. Landry would have gone back to Westmorland a defeated scandidate, and that Dr. Leger had to thank them for his election in 1890. The Moniteur cannot deny this; yet because they saw fit to refuse their support in the late contest to a candidate who was distasteful to them, it has nothing but abuse for them. It is true the Moniteur has always given Mr. Phinney a generous support. From the tone it assumes now, however, we can only infer that in future it will oppose him. No doubt Mr. Phinney would be pleased to have the support of our contemporary. If that is denied him, however, he will simply have to get along without it. It is well for all parties interested to understand just how matters

stand, and govern themselves accordingly.

In this issue we conclude our report of the proceedings of the Municipal Council and also publish a list of the bills allowed by the finance committee and passed by the Council. The municipal accounts laid before the board by the treasurer show that the receipts for last year were \$15,158.07; the expenditure \$14,381 51, leaving a balance on hand of \$776.56. At the end of 1891 the balance in the hands of the treasurer was over \$2,000, but in that year the total expenditure was only \$12,045.60. The expenditure for criminal business last year was much larger than in 1891. In the fishing bounty forgery cases, for instance, there were no less than ten distinct indictments against the parties charged, and costs run up pretty high in such cases.

The debenture debt of the county at the end of the year was \$16,000, bearing interest at four per cent. The county also owes for temporary loans the sum of \$760, bearing interest at 7 per cent. The returns show that in some places, for instance in Richibucto and Kingston, taxes have been pretty well paid up, while other districts show heavy delinquent lists. The returns from collectors of delinquent taxes show that very little has been done towards cutting down the amount of the delinquent tax list. Next week we will publish an itemized statement of the receipts and expenditure for the past year.

Since the last session of the Dominion parliament thirteen elections have been held. The standing of the House is now

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#### PARLIAMENT OPENED. Mesars Chesley and McInerney In-

troduced and Take Their Seats. Ottawa, JAN. 24th .- The opening of parliament this afternoon was the most brilliant spectacle of the kind for many years, the glorious weather permitting the ladies to grace the senate chamber in unusual force. His Excellency's mounted escort was supplied from the Princess Louise Dragoon Guards under Captain Gordeau. Lord Stanley delivered the following speech .

Honorable Gentleman of the Senate:

Gentlemen of the House of Commons: In meeting you at the commencement of another session of parliament it affords me pleasure to congratulate you on the continued progress which the history of the past year unfolds with regard to Canada. The increase in trade as illustrated by the exports and imports during the period for which the official returns have been prepared has been most gratiand that increase has continued down to the present time, with promise that the volume of trade during the current year will exceed that of any year in the history of the dominion. The revenues of the country have likewise provided for all the services for which parliament has made appropriation and the operation of the government railways has been less burdensome as regards the difference between income and expenditure than has been the case for a long term of years previously.



Measures will be laid before you for the improvement of the franchise act, for the amendment of the laws relating to the civil service, and the superannuation of civil servants, for regulating the admission of evidence to causes and matters under the control of the parliament of Canada, for extending the system of voting by ballot to the Northwest territories, and for simplifying the laws relating to lands and land transfers in the territories.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons: The public accounts of the past year and the estimates for the ensuing year will be laid before you without delay, and I trust it will be seen that ample provision may be made for the public service without increasing taxation.

Honorable Gehtlemen of the Senate: Gentlemen of the House of Commons: I have every confidence that all these



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matters will receive your best attention, and that, your deliberations will keep in view, above all other considerations, the welfare and stability of the country.

On the return of the commons to their chamber twelve me nbers all liberal conservatives elected during the recess, were introduced, among them Mr. Chesley, by Hon. Mr. Foster and George F. Baird and Mr. McInerney, by Hon. Mr. Costigan and Hon. Mr. Foster. Messrs. Chesley and McInerney were greeted with loud applause as they took their seats.

On motion of Sir John Thomson, who expressed regret that the leader of the opposition was absent through illness, the consideration of the address was postponed till Monday.

The house adojurned at four o'clock. Seven new senators including Hon. Messrs. Bowell and Angers, took their

seats in the upper chamber to-day.
OTTAWA, JAN. 27.—The house only sat a few minutes to-day before adjourning till Monday, when the address will be taken up as Mr. Laurier's health has so far improved that he will be able to take his seat by that time.

Several annual reports were submitted, including that of the department of justice by Sir John Thompson; report of the marine and fisheries department by Hon. John Costigan; report on food adulteration by Hon. Mr. Wood, and the public accounts and auditor general's report by the finance minister.

OTTAWA, Jan. 23.—The address in reply to Lord Stanley's speech was moved this afternoon by Mr. McInerney of Kent, in one of the most eloquent addresses heard for years within the walls of parijament, and the young orator added another to the long list of triumphs achieved on these floors by New Brunswich men. Apart from the nervousness incident to a first appearance, Mr. McInerney's form was beyond criticism. The dignity of his bearing being tempered by that degree of modesty most becoming a debutante. After a graceful introduction, Mr. Mc. the several items in a manner that showed an intimate acquaintance with the great services of the country, and in concluding his speech drew a glowing picture of Canada's natural wealth, and pointed out that the task now before Canada's statesmen was the fusing together and moulding into one nationality the descendants of the greatest people the world has ever seen. The speaker was repeatedly cheered as he expressed the fervent hope that the demon of bigotry and religious intolerance might be downed for ever.

Mr. LeClaire of Terrebonne, seconded the address in French.

Mr. Laurier, who followed, moved the following amendment: That the following words be added to the address: We feel bound to represent to your excellency that on the present

conditions of the people of Canada substantial reduction should be made in the taxation which presses so heavily upon the great bulk of the community and would regret that in the speech graciously delivered from the throne, your excellency was not advised to hold out promises of reductions in the oppressive duties now

Sir John Thompson, Sir Richard Cart-wright, Hon. Mr. Foster and Mr. Mills continued the debate until 10.40 p. m. when the amendment was rejected.

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
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
