## PROVINCIAL NEWS

The Waverley Hotel at Newcastle was destroyed by fire last Saturday morning. It was insured for \$8000.

Nearly all the municipalities, in the meetings of their County Council, generally held this month have followed the example of Kent Co. and adopted the system of biennial election of Councilors.

Principal Mullin of the Normal school has received an invitation from the national commission of education of the World's Fair, to attend the educational congress to be held in Chicago in July next as a delegate and honorary vice-president of the department for the professional training of teachers.

A sad fatality by fire occurred at Petecodiac last Friday. While Mrs. James Fawcett was out the house in which she lived took fire in some way, and her little three year old boy, whom she left behind in the building perished in the flames. The fire had made such headway before being discovered that it was impossible to recover the body of the child until after the house had burned down. The remains were taken from the ruins at 3 o'clock, about two hours after the fire was first discovered. The mother is nearly frantic with grief.

GENERAL NEWS.

In thirty years the proportion of Protestants to Catholics in Ireland has changed; then it was 22 to 78, now it is 25 to 75.

The second reading of the coal combine bill passed the Nova Scotia legislature by a vote of 24 to 9.

Ex-secretary Blaine died at Washington last Friday.

Nova Scotia was allotted 800 feet in the mineral building of the World's Fair for the provincial mines exhibit. New Brunswick, Prince Edward Island and Manitoba get one hundred each.

The Louisiana State Lottery has been granted a charter from the Republic of Honduras, and on the expiration of its present charter on January 1, 1894, the business will be removed to that country.

A well to do farmer of Queens county N. S. died and left his estate to his son John, disinheriting another son Patrick. John was already well off and Pat was poor. The injustice of the father drove Pat insane and his one cry was: "I will break that will." Pat's ravings preyed upon John, who feared that he would lose the bequest, that he too lost reason.

Both were sent to the same lunatic asylum.

The hostility between Parnellites and anti-Parnellites is assuming an acute phase. Pierce Mahony, the former Parnellite M. P. for North Meath who was defeated in late election by Michael Davitt, since unseated, had an encounter Tuesday in the Four Courts with Matthew Joseph Kenny, Nationalist M. P. for Middle Tyrone. Kenny received a black eye. Mahony was arrested and committed for trial bail being accepted.
