from Judge Landry, revising officer, in which he is inclined to dispute our statements concerning the Kingston electoral lists, and does not hesitate to inform us that we have wilfully misrepresented the matter. It would have been much wiser on Judge Landry's part to have taken the trouble to acquaint himself with the facts before making use of such strong language. It certainly would have been better had he waited until the names were properly brought before him on an application to have them added to the list before declaring that they "had no legal right to be on the electoral list." We will not say that Judge Landry's remarks are "false,' "exaggerated" and "misleading;" we will assure him, however, that he is entirely mistaken as to the facts. Had he given the matter any consideration whatever the absurdity of his contention must have made itself apparent to him. The Electoral Lists.

Mr. Editor .

You published over eighty names of persons who, you say, were entitled to vote in Kingston district at the last election; which names were not on the list. To give absolute proof of the falsity of your statement-as I believe can be given-I wrote to Richibucto for the assessment roll of 1891. I am answered this that. With the consciousness that I allowed no one to go off or on without proof giving legal justification for so doing, the number already doing business here. I cannot allow your exagerated, misleading statement to go unchallenged. I will venture this assertion, and I hope to get the roll of 1891 yet to back it up. The roll of 1891 will show conclusively that your whole list of upwards of eighty names had no legal right to be on the electoral list, except perhaps, such a percentage as unavoidable oversight would warrant.
